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Cultural Impact Statement

In 1905, Saskatchewan became a province. Since 1908, the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) has grown with our province, always in step, always in tune. The SMFA reaches out to people of all ages and all backgrounds across the province of Saskatchewan. The Saskatchewan structures and programs have been modelled throughout Canada.

Our mandate, which is *"to promote excellence in music and speech arts by providing performance and educational opportunities through competitive festivals,"* requires us to work closely with the many people who come together to keep the festival movement in Saskatchewan alive and well. These people include music and speech students, teachers, parents, volunteers, donors and audiences. There are 48 annual festivals across the province, therefore the impact that is created in all these 48 festivals and surrounding areas is significant.

These communities have embraced the festival concept because it provides:

- an element of educational growth as well as entertainment that brings their community together
- the opportunity for communities to acknowledge and support the success and endeavours of their young people
- encouragement for students to set goals and showcase their abilities while receiving constructive adjudication from professional musicians
- local volunteers an opportunity to be involved with young people in their community in a positive way
- participating students with the performance opportunity to develop confidence and selfdiscipline while demonstrating positive role models for their peers

Since its early days, the Association has provided competitive and non-competitive classes for not only solo and individual competitors, but for community and schools in choruses, bands and orchestras. SMFA's continued expansion encouraged the formation of other provincial music organizations. Saskatchewan was not only the first to form a Provincial Music Festival Association, but also the first to use a common syllabus for all its member festivals. The use of the common syllabus assures that a high standard is maintained.

SMFA partners with the other music organizations across Saskatchewan to ensure that the programs we develop are relevant to the needs of our young people. Accessibility to programs and recognizing changing demographic circumstances within the province is a high priority. The broad-based volunteer component of SMFA allows the organization to operate at the grass roots level thereby closely monitoring these changes and adapting to them. Every attempt is made to ensure that the experience attained by participants is beneficial and works in concert with the SMFA vision which is *to develop individuals with positive life and performance skills*.

SMFA believes that the need for a culturally aware society is of increasing importance given the pressures exerted upon us by the rapid, electronic environment in which we live. Our organization is committed to cultivating that awareness by providing information, education, opportunity and a clear vision of the role we play in this task.

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From the establishment of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) in 1908, the mandate has been to provide young Saskatchewan musicians with opportunities to perform and compete with their peers and be adjudicated by professional musicians. We are deeply grateful for the thousands of volunteers who support our 48 District Music Festivals.

The 2014 SMFA Annual Fall Conference and AGM took place within the Saskatchewan Music Conference in November. Wendy Thienes and Kelly Stein were elected to the Board of Directors for three-year terms. Joy McFarlane-Burton was appointed as Ad Hoc member for a one-year term.

The Shurniak Concerto Competition was held at the University of Saskatchewan in February, with 13 competitors. Congratulations to William Boan, violinist, who captured first prize. The SMFA wishes to acknowledge the generous support of Mr.

William Shurniak, as well as the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras for providing performance opportunities for the winner of this prestigious competition.

The SMFA takes great pride in our network of District Festivals which, after more than 100 years, still provides the richest learning experience for young musicians and families, teachers and schools, volunteers and communities. District Festivals were held in 48 communities from February to May. Thank you to the local volunteers and sponsors who make their Festivals possible and to the adjudicators who travel the province sharing their knowledge and expertise.

Provincial Finals were held in Saskatoon at the University of Saskatchewan, where judges heard almost 300 entries by competitors from 29 District Festivals. The Grand Award winner was Bryan Allen, percussion. We appreciate the support of the Saskatoon volunteers who have helped ensure a smooth-running Provincial Finals for the past four consecutive years.

Saskatchewan representatives to the 2015 National Music Festival achieved their most impressive showing in history. Congratulations to Godwin Friesen (1st place in Piano) and Bryan Allen (1st place in Percussion). Saskatchewan delegates to the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals (FCMF) AGM were Carol Donhauser, Karen MacCallum, Sherry Sproule and Nancy Toppings. We are pleased to announce that Joy McFarlane-Burton was elected Vice-President of FCMF, and Karen MacCallum was elected as a Director for a two-year term. Gloria Nickell, a Past-President of SMFA, has retired from the FCMF Board, and we thank her for her years of service on both the Provincial and National Boards.

We are pleased to present the 2016-2018 SMFA Syllabus, and I congratulate Karen Unger, Syllabus Chair, and her committee on the tremendous job in producing this document. The changes in this new syllabus reflect a concerted effort by our Board to grow and change with the needs of our member Festivals and changing demographics, and every decision was reached with a great deal of thought and deliberation. Many thanks go to the selectors and proof-



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readers, and to Dianne Swanson and Darren Schwartz for their valued contributions.

Promotion of Speech Arts is ongoing with SMFAsponsored workshops, facilitated by Heather Macnab, in the communities of Assiniboia, Estevan, Unity and Meadow Lake in 2015. The workshops are made possible through a grant from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund, and more communities will receive this opportunity in the coming year.

Countless hours have been invested in typesetting the syllabus, working with partners in the Music Alliance, contributing to the Summer Music Camps...all in addition to the day-to-day operations of the SMFA. Thank you to Sandra Kerr, Administrative Assistant and Adjudicator Liaison, for her roles, in keeping the SMFA ship on course, and for her efficiency in the office and support to our District Festivals.

2014 Saskatchewan Music Conference

Our sixth annual Saskatchewan Music Conference was held at the Saskatoon Inn, November 14-15. "Music for For All, Live It, Love It, and Learn It" was the theme of this event, a joint partnership between the Saskatchewan Choral Federation (SCF), the Saskatchewan Band Association (SBA), the Saskatchewan Music Educators Association (SMEA), the Saskatchewan Orchestral Association (SOA), and the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA). Members of each organization had an opportunity to participate in a variety of relevant workshops provided during this event.



The Awards Banquet was held on Friday evening, emceed by Amber Grant and Chad Huel from SBA. Greetings were extended on behalf SaskCulture from James Winkel, Vice President.

Individuals were honoured by their respective organizations for their contributions and achievement. Karen MacCallum, President of the SMFA honoured the following with SMFA Volunteer Recognition Awards: Esther Bangsund (Estevan Music Festival), Stacy Grunert (Estevan Music Festival), Leigh McIntyre (Kindersley Music Festival), Brenda Nightingale (Meadow Lake Music Festival), Terri Prete (Meadow Lake Music Festival), Maren Hantke (Melfort Music Festival), Jane Graf (Naicam Music Festival, Karen Unger (Naicam Music Festival), Gayle Brown (Rosetown Music Festival), Helen Few (Saskatoon Music Festival), Faye Anderson (Shaunavon Music Festival), Judy Tamke (Watrous Music Festival), Karen Muir (Yorkton Music Festival), and Sandra Baron (Yorkton Music Festival).

The SMFA provided workshops on Friday and Saturday specific to the organization. Our first presenter, on behalf of the SMFA, was Glen Gillis. His session focused on adjudication. Glen took us through some practical information each adjudicator should consider before, during, and after the adjudication process. Glen shared some of his own experiences as well some of the experiences he has observed throughout his years.

Saturday was a full day for the SMFA, starting with the SMFA Networking session. We had some time together to meet and greet the people from each district while sharing a continental breakfast.

Larry Johnson was the first presenter on the agenda for Saturday and was a return presenter from the previous year. Larry designed and operates the Music Festival Organizer (MFO) which has a built-in online registration component. There were a handful of festivals that used this program last year and this session was dedicated to sharing their experiences. Although there were some learning curves, and a few kinks to work out, the overall consensus was positive. As more and more festivals start using the MFO, it will be easier to pool our resources for ongoing training and knowledge of the software. We hope to be able to use it to our advantage by reducing volunteer time and easier accessibility to our programs for our users.

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The keynote speaker for the Conference this year was Tom Allen, host of the CBC Radio program 'Shift'. Mr. Allen, a musician, broadcaster, author, and concert host, spoke about the power of music and showed us clips from a documentary of which he was a part. He also gave us a brief but powerful demonstration on what television, movies, and life in general would be like without music. Tom Allen can be found on YouTube. It was an honor to hear him speak live.

The SMFA Annual General Meeting was chaired by President Karen MacCallum with 22 out of 48 District Festivals represented. The 2013-2014 Annual Report was presented and 1st Vice-President Nancy Toppings gave a clear and concise presentation of the financial statements. Leander Dueck, Beyond Wealth, reported briefly on the performance of the SMFA Investment Fund over the past year.

The attendance of Honorary Life Members, Doris Covey Lazecki, Penny Joynt, and Janet McGonigle, were acknowledged.

Carol Donhauser, Executive Director, presented the 2015 Directory information (with Syllabus changes). She explained that this year, the Directory will only contain the "Regulation and Scholarship" Information and will be renamed accordingly. The festival contact information will be updated and maintained on the SMFA website (www.smfa.ca) on each individual festival page. She also reminded everyone, that this is the last year of the 3-year Syllabus. The 2016-2018 Syllabus is coming along nicely and will be available for purchase by late summer of 2015.

A motion was passed to increase the adjudicator fees from \$300 to \$350 and travel compensation rates for adjudicators, board, and staff from 40¢/km to 42¢/km, effective 2015/2016 operating year (August 1, 2015 to July 31, 2016). Please note that his motion will

be in effect for the 2016 Festival year, so plan accordingly.

Anita Kuntz made a brief presentation on 'scholarships and fundraising'. She pointed out the importance of keeping individual District Festivals financially viable so in turn they can be a part of the larger festival organization. Supporting young people in the arts is a great investment for both community and province.

Laureen Kells, President of the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers Association brought greetings as a Representative Organization of the SMFA. She noted how closely the two organizations work together and thanked the volunteers of the SMFA who work tirelessly to provide SRMTA members' students the educational performance opportunity through competitive music festivals.





The winner of the Best Program Award for 2014 was presented to Unity Music Festival. They received a \$50 cheque.

Karen MacCallum thanked the outgoing board of directors, Joy McFarlane-Burton and Anita Kuntz, and presented them with parting gifts. A very special welcome was extended to the newly elected board members - Kelly Stein from Simpson and Wendy Thienes from Shaunavon.

The afternoon session began with educator Lisa Packet who shared her knowledge of Speech Arts and how to revive it in our schools. As a parent, school teacher, and performer herself, she reminded us of the importance of the 'art' of speaking which is a lifelong skill every single one of us will use throughout our lives.

Joy McFarlane-Burton spoke to us about the National Musical Theatre Class and how that affects us at the Local and Provincial level. Since Musical Theatre is now a National Class, it is a separate discipline from voice. That means, in order to enter the Provincial Musical Theatre class, competition in both Musical Theatre Classes at the Local level is required in order to qualify for a recommendation. It is possible to be recommended for one or both of those classes at the Provincial level. There was ongoing discussion on what is acceptable for props, speaking, and song choices.

District Festivals are also reminded that the National Class is a separate competition from the Provincial classes. The National Class must be entered at the District Festival in order to proceed on to Provincial Competition and National Competition (please refer to the FCMF Syllabus found at <u>www.fcmf.org</u>).

Our last session of the day was a 'Question and Answer' session led by board members Karen Unger and Nancy Toppings. Each table was given a quiz with questions and examples of situations encountered at the District Festivals in regard to rules, classes, and disciplines. Delegates were then encouraged to find the 'rule' in the directory or syllabus, in an attempt to become more familiar with those books. This proved to be very valuable as we all learned where to find answers when we are not sure!

The final item on the agenda was outgoing President Karen MacCallum's presentation of the gavel to our incoming President, Nancy Toppings. We look forward to working with Nancy as she takes this leadership role.

Once again we need to remind each of the District Festivals of the importance to have representation at the annual meeting. This is where your voice can be heard and you can be part of the decisions we need to make year after year. We hope that your festival will make this a priority in 2015.

2014 AGM Minutes

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association Annual General Meeting November 15, 2014

The meeting was called to order at 12:30 pm by President Karen MacCallum.

'O Canada was sung, led by Joy McFarlane-Burton, accompanied by Karen Unger. A moment of silence was observed in memory of all those who have been an integral part of our music festival journey.

Karen MacCallum introduced the SMFA office staff, Carol Donhauser and Sandra Kerr and current Board members.

Karen MacCallum appointed Donna Kreiser as recording secretary.

Motion: Cheryl Leptich/Janet McGonigle to accept the agenda as circulated. CARRIED

Joy McFarlane-Burton conducted the roll call of District Festivals. Representatives from the following districts were present: Biggar, Carnduff, Estevan, Humboldt, Kindersley, Kipling, Lafleche, Maple Creek, Meadow Lake, Naicam, Prince Albert, Quill Plains, Regina, Rosetown, Sask. Valley, Saskatoon, Shaunavon, Swift Current, Twin Rivers, Unity, Watrous, and Yorkton.

Joy McFarlane-Burton reported for the Nominating committee that Sherry Sproule has been selected as 2nd Vice-President and there are two Board member positions to be filled. Two nominations have come forward. They are Wendy Thienes from Shaunavon and District and Kelly Stein from Watrous and District. Joy made the first call for nominations from the floor.

The minutes of the 2013 AGM as recorded in the circulated Annual Report were read by those members present and declared approved by the President.

BUSINESS ARISING

Nancy Toppings introduced Leander Dueck, the founder and manager of Beyond Wealth, which manages the SMFA Trust Funds and various other non-profit organizations. Leander Dueck stated that they are the custodians of the portfolio, working towards the preservation of the capital and minimizing the down risk. He reported that the portfolio is doing extremely well and exceeded the TSX by 3% last year. Leander Dueck recommended that the portfolio be rebalanced in the next 60 days to protect its diversification.

Nancy Toppings referred to the Audited Financial Statement found in the 2014 Annual Report on pages 61-75. She stated that the SMFA was successful in maintaining a balanced budget and that \$10,000 was transferred to a reserve fund for unexpected cash flow shortages.

Total Assets for 2014 = \$633,709 Total Liabilities = \$147,230, Net Assets = \$486,479

MOTION: Anita Kuntz/Robin Swales to appoint Marcia Herback as Auditor for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. CARRIED

MOTION: Sandra Senga/Robyn Rutherford to rescind the motion relating to changing the SMFA year-end from July 31 to August 31 effective 2012-2013 operating year. CARRIED

Nancy Toppings referred to the SMA Summer Music Camp report, provided encouragement and an invitation to become a "Festival Friend" and acknowledged the generous support of the Sponsors of SMFA.

Nancy Toppings also noted that if a local festival district is not registered as a non-profit, it is important that this be done.

Joy McFarlane-Burton made the 2^{nd} call for nominations from the floor.

Karen MacCallum presented an overview of the 2014 Annual Report.

MOTION: Linda Alberts/Claire Seibold to ratify the motions of the board from the past fiscal year. CARRIED

NEW BUSINESS

2015 Shurniak Concerto Competition will be held on February 21-22, 2015, in Saskatoon at the Quance Theatre at the University of Saskatchewan. The judges will be Jasper Wood (violinist, teaching at UBC), Karen Finnsson (Woodwinds, Professor at the University of Regina), and Mark Turner (Executive Director of the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra).

2015 Provincial Finals Competition will be held June 5-7, in Saskatoon at the University of Saskatchewan.

Carol Donhauser made reference to the Syllabus and Directory Changes and Corrections that were distributed. These changes would be beneficial to be included in the adjudicator's briefing. Carol Donhauser also noted that the Directory will no longer include the local festival information, this will be found on-line. Also, this is the last year of the current 2013-2015 Syllabus.

MOTION: Robin Swales/Diane Swanson to increase the adjudicator daily rate from \$300 to \$350, effective the 2015/2016 operating year. CARRIED

MOTION: Sherri Singer/Linda Alberts to increase travel compensation for adjudicators, board, and staff from \$.40/km to \$.42/km, effective 2015/2106 operating year. CARRIED

Anita Kuntz spoke to the need to fundraise to make our local festivals viable and to look into the possibility of raising entry fees. Scholarships are also important at the local level and how, with simply approaching people regarding scholarships, you may find they do want to donate. In return you need to acknowledge them as they wish, and have recipients send them thank you notes. Anita also suggested that locals or regions could entertain the idea of providing a provincial scholarship.



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Laureen Kells, President, brought greetings from the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers' Association (SRMTA).

Joy McFarlane-Burton made the 3rd call for nominations from the floor. There were none. Joy declared, "If not, nominations are closed." Joy declared the election by acclamation of both nominees, Wendy Thienes and Kelly Stein.

Wendy Thienes outlined her involvement locally in the Shaunavon area which highlights children, community, and culture. Kelly Stein outlined her involvement locally in the Watrous area which involves Music for Young Children and teaching piano.

Sandra Kerr presented the Best Program Award to the Unity Music Festival. Sandra

noted that it fulfilled the criteria of having the SMFA logo on the front cover and the program had included all the mandatory advertisements and logos.

OTHER BUSINESS

Acknowledgements were given by Karen MacCallum to the staff of SMFA, Carol Donhauser and Sandra Kerr for all their tireless and amazing work for the SMFA.

Retiring Board members, Anita Kuntz and Joy McFarlane-Burton were thanked for their contributions to the SMFA and parting gifts were presented.

Karen MacCallum adjourned the meeting at 1:20 p.m.





Saskatchewan Music Alliance





This past year saw continued collaboration among the five Eligible Cultural Organizations (ECOs) - Saskatchewan Band Association (SBA), Saskatchewan Choral Federation (SCF), Saskatchewan Music Educators Association (SMEA), Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) and Saskatchewan Orchestral Association (SOA). While the formation of a formal structure had hit a standstill, the five groups operated, on partnership projects, as the Saskatchewan Music Alliance (SMA).

In August, SaskCulture presented a proposed framework for an amalgamated Provincial Music Organization which envisioned the advantages of a single organization with a broad music mandate. SaskCulture recognized that making such a change would have many challenges, but firmly believe the potential for strength and growth of the programs and services currently being provided by the five music organizations, as well as new opportunities, would be worth the effort of making such a change.

SaskCulture also believe that the potential of a larger organization with a broader mandate and more diverse skillsets at both the staff and volunteer level is something that could potentially see a more versatile, responsive and far reaching music organization, one that builds on the strengths and history of the five organizations and creates tremendous community impact throughout the province. SaskCulture's volunteers and staff understand the concerns of the five organizations in regard





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to such a change. The five organizations run very good programs and have a strong history of community volunteer engagement.

SMFA Executive, along with board members and staff from the other music ECOs, met with SaskCulture representatives on October 14 and 15, along with the SaskCulture appointed mediators. The meeting allowed everyone to share perspectives of the events, over the last number of years, involving the SaskCulture funding review, the Sask. Music Alliance Proposal for a Federated model, and the proposed amalgamation framework presented by SaskCulture.

The SMFA Board of Directors have concerns that the framework proposed by SaskCulture will not meet the needs of our unique, diverse members and provide the same level of programming to the residents of this Province that has been provided through SMFA. There has been no evidence to indicate that our organization provides similar representation, mandate, governance, or programs and services, to any other music organization. In fact, there is ample evidence to support that SMFA's distinctive programming is complementary to that which is already being produced. The representatives of SaskCulture were very understanding and supportive of the SMFA Board of Director's decision to opt out of the exploration of creating a large music organization. We look forward to continuing to collaborate with other music groups to meet the needs of the province's community and building upon our rich music heritage.



Adjudicator Liaison Report

In 2015, almost 170 assignments were contracted to musicians from 5 different provinces and 1 state to judge our District Festivals, the Shurniak Concerto Competition, and Provincial Finals competitions.

Hiring for the 2015 season began in July 2014 for the festivals that had submitted their Adjudicator Time-Frame forms. Many of our adjudicators appreciate being contacted early to enable them to fit us in to their busy schedules. It is most helpful for festivals to submit a "wish list" with their Time-Frame form, as it provides a concrete starting point for the lengthy process. Adjudicator hiring was complete by the end of the calendar year, though there were some minor changes, as there always are, due to changes in session dates or other unexpected circumstances. This is followed by frequent communications with each festival and adjudicator, both receiving and supplying information. Thank you to the festivals for their cooperation in keeping the Provincial Office 'in the loop'.

We continue to add new adjudicators to our roster. For those who reside in the province, we try to send a few new people each year on a "training session" to observe an experienced adjudicator at work, at a nearby festival. Plans are also underway to hold an adjudicator session at the Saskatchewan Music Conference in November. For those who reside outside of Saskatchewan, hiring is mostly limited to experienced adjudicators. Of course, there are still copies of The Art of Adjudicating available for purchase to anyone interested! Some District Festivals are experiencing a decrease in entries in some disciplines making it less cost effective - in the current format - to have one adjudicator for each discipline. As a result, the more versatile adjudicators are sought because they can judge more than one discipline. While this arrangement can be a viable solution, we are not always able to accommodate all such festivals. This is a less than ideal situation for students who may want more detailed comments, for example on their technique. In order to hire an adjudicator who specializes in a discipline, perhaps festivals can begin to consider other options, such as including a workshop or masterclass for participants and teachers as part of the festival experience. Whether this is funded by a sponsor(s), extra participants' fees, or by some other means, it could augment the existing music festival format and enhance the educational aspect of music festival for the student (and teacher).

As always, the hundreds of volunteers who are the mainstay of Music Festivals in our province are greatly appreciated for their dedication, commitment to and support of the youth in their community!

He received the first prize of \$2,000 and the opportunity to be a featured soloist in an upcoming season with the Regina Symphony Orchestra and the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra. William is an accomplished musician with extensive training in solo, chamber, and orchestral violin performance. He became the Assistant Concertmaster of the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra at the age of seventeen. He has been Concertmaster of the Saskatoon Youth Orchestra and Saskatchewan Provincial Honour Orchestra for three years. In summer 2014, William attended the Meadowmount Summer Music Institute, New York, where he studied with Sally Thomas, violin professor at Juilliard, and Ivan Ženatý, violin professor at the Cleveland Institute of Music.

For three years William has been the provincial champion for Senior strings and has placed third in the Provincial Music Festival's Grand Awards Competition. William was the 2013 winner of the Kinsmen Competition, Saskatoon's most prestigious competition. He currently studies violin at the University of Saskatchewan, in the studio of Robert Klose.

For the Concerto Competition, thanks to the University of Saskatchewan, William played a Nicolo Amati violin, made in 1637. He is the first ever student at the university to be given the opportunity to perform on the beautiful instrument.

March 16 - 18, 2015

<u>Maple Creek & District Music Festival held</u> <u>its 30th annual event from March 16-20, 2015.</u> The sessions were held at the Maple Creek United Church and at the Maple Creek Composite School. The program indicates 86 entries including solos, four school bands, five school classes, one vocal ensemble, and musical theatre performances, in 81 classes. Twenty-six individual participants performed, several in multiple disciplines.

Two adjudicators presided over seven sessions of piano, strings, voice, speech arts, woodwind, brass, and band ensemble classes. Janet Gieck of Saskatoon looked after two piano sessions and took lots of time to talk with each competitor. She was very encouraging. Adele Wilding, from Medicine Hat, adjudicated voice, speech arts, and band over two days. She worked with each competitor and group, improve suggesting ways to and complementing their performances. She spent about three quarters of an hour with each band at the school, getting them to work on various passages.

To help us celebrate 30 years of festival, we invited former members of the festival committee to the Finales where they were introduced and thanked for their hard work in previous years. Several of them helped present the festival awards and will appear in the



photographs taken during the various presentations. There are only two charter committee members left from 30 years ago and one will be retiring before next season.

\$1900.00 for twenty-eight scholarships was presented at the Festival Finales to individuals and ensembles. Each year we conduct a program cover competition in the district schools. This year Kyra Anton, of Fox Valley and Joel Graves, of Maple Creek, shared the prize for their entries illustrating our 30th year.

Rachel Kay was our district winner in Woodwind competition. She will be joined at Provincials by Chelsea Cox who was recommended for Senior Vocal Concert Group, Senior Operatic and Senior Speech Arts.

The Finale evening concluded with a reception for the participants and the audience. The hall was decorated with a pearl theme to commemorate 30 years of festival in Maple Creek. There were roses in wine glasses, strings of pearls and large flower arrangements to complement the plates of cupcakes iced in pearl colours. Many hands helped with cleanup and we were all done shortly after 10 p.m.

Once again we were fortunate to have many volunteers to assist committee members throughout the week. We are always grateful for the continuing community support for scholarships, program advertising and contributions of time.

We are becoming concerned about the dramatic drop in entries over the last five years. Donations are also down slightly, probably due to the current economic climate. There are not as many young people in the area and we have to compete with many other activities for youth in the schools and community. There are not as many teachers in our area as we used to have and some have fewer students. We are hoping that if we persevere, things will turn around in the future.

We will be preparing in the coming year for our 31^{st} festival of the recent era, to be held near the end of March of 2016.

Major awards (included in the numbers above) are the Cornish Grand Award (Samantha Leech), The Lewis and Elizabeth P. Brandt Scholarship (Rebecca Weger, Simone Ma, Ben Polasek, Alaina Majewski) and the Donald and Claire Kramer Foundation Award (Joanne Peng). The Regina Music Festival also holds three separate competitions across multiple disciplines within the normal course of our events: The Jacqui and Morris Shumiatcher Scholarships, The Queen City Kinsmen Intermediate Scholarships, and the Regina Central Lions Senior Scholarships.

Grants were received from Potash Corporation of Saskatchewan as well as foundations totally \$8,500. These monies directly support the operations of the Festival. Additionally, we run a "Residential Campaign" by mail which adds to our operational donations. Entrance to all events and the final concert is by donation. The 2015 Festival itself operated at a slight loss with receipts of \$83,980 and expenditures of \$85,218 but our investments earnings this past year, brought us to a net profit of \$4,990.

The current board continues to do an amazing job of ensuring all the details of producing the festival are looked after. Putting on our annual festival is an exercise in teamwork at its best. We have 'clocked' over 3000 hours of volunteer time between Board members and the 101 volunteers who act as secretaries to the adjudicators and door monitors.

Sask Valley Music Festival (Waldheim) March 22 - 27, 2015

Our Festival this year was held in Waldheim from March 22-27 with our Final Concert and Awards on Sunday March 29. We were pleased that total entries were 216 up from 202 in 2014. We appreciated our adjudicators Kim de Laforest in strings, Heather Macnab in voice, choral, and speech and Michael Langlois in piano. They chose district winners in Intermediate Strings, Intermediate Piano, Senior Piano, Senior Musical Theatre, Senior Speech Arts, as well as Choral, both Provincially and Nationally. Unfortunately not all of those were able to attend Provincial Competitions.

After a well-performed final concert, featuring a representative sample of all ages and disciplines, we awarded 46 scholarships totaling \$3010. We also assisted an interested student to attend the Summer School for the Solo Voice in North Battleford.

It seemed serendipitous this year that Speech Arts Specialist Heather Macnab came to us as we had a Senior student entered in 4 Speech classes. We have not had such in recent memory. Heather was very helpful, and we were so impressed with our experience with her that we are busy making preparations for her time in our District at the end of November arranged through the SMFA office. So far our schools are showing great interest in her Speech Arts Workshops.

Another new endeavor for our Committee this year was sponsoring a Master Class for students in our district prior to our Festival. This was held in February at The Station Arts Center. We were fortunate to obtain the services of Deborah Buck for a Saturday. Her varied talents allowed us to offer piano, voice and Musical Theater options. While we were a little disappointed in the numbers participating, it proved very beneficial to those who did. One of the participants was invited

We have such a reliable group of regular supporters in our District, that other than contacting businesses and scholarship donors yearly, we are spared much fundraising activity. Saskatoon Music Festival March 17 - 27; April 20 - May 5, 2015

The Saskatoon Music Festival ran five distinct sessions for the festival this year. The first session was Schools. This was organized by Gary Loy with assistance from Terry Clark. The School section ran for two days, March 17 & 18. One adjudicator was hired and heard, 14 choral groups, 4 Hand Bell choirs, 5 Recorder solo and 2 Recorder ensemble entries. Seven trophies were presented along with seven, \$100 cheques to School trophy recipients, courtesy of Potash Corporation of Saskatchewan.

The next session was held on March 23 to March 27. This was the Band section and was organized by Cody Appleton and Mike Kurpjuweit.During this week three adjudicators were hired, one for Grade 6 bands, one for Grade 7/8 bands and another adjudicator for High school and Jazz bands. One hundred and five (105) bands were heard throughout the week. Fifteen (15) trophies were presented along with fifteen, \$100 cheques to band trophy recipients, courtesy of

Potash Corporation of Saskatchewan. This year we decided to have keeper plaques made up for each Band award and have retired the large trophies which have become too cumbersome for most schools to display. This change was well received by Band directors and we plan on continuing this practice. The cost of the plaques and engraving were covered by the trophy sponsors. Finally, a huge thank you goes out to Karen MacKenzie for finding a new home for the Band competition. The Cathedral of the Holy Family on Nelson Road will be the new home for our Band section of the festival for the next five years. Karen made the initial contact with Father David Tumback and he was thrilled to see the church help with the week-long Band festival. Not only will they provide the facility for the Elementary Bands but they will also provide door people, assistants and co-ordinators to help move children from the buses, to the practice rooms to the performance rooms.

Our third session was the Heart of the City Piano Program Festival. Shirley England adjudicated this year and the Yamaha piano center presented a Keyboard to the Adjudicators Choice for Best Overall Performance. Nineteen (19) students competed at McClure United Church, who helped host the event and a number of residents that live in the care home as well as the McClure Place Tower attended the morning session.

The Musical Theatre session took place April 20 - 23. Adjudicated by Kim Mattice Wanat, 158 entries were received. With the help of Terry Ross, the Kiwanis Club of Saskatoon booked the Lighthouse Victory Church (formerly Persephone Theatre) for the Music Theatre competition and paid for the venue rental. They also provided all the staffing for door people at the church. After seeing the success of the Musical Theatre competition they offered up another \$250 in Musical Theatre Scholarships. You could say that 2015 was a year of two new relationships made with the Saskatoon Music Festival Committee. The Kiwanis are on board for the next year and many more to come. They will also provide



door people, assistants and co-ordinators to help move children from the buses, to the practice rooms to the performance rooms.

The General Session followed, April 26-May 2. We had a most memorable Sunday morning when we woke up to a late winter blizzard and over 12" of snow. Thanks to understanding teachers, parents and adjudicators, we managed to reschedule the morning classes and by Tuesday we were back on track with a regular schedule. As always, our sincere thanks to the University of Saskatchewan for allowing us to use the Education facilities for this week. We had, 365 vocal entries, 684 piano entries, 141 String entries, 6 Guitar entries, 31 Woodwind entries, 27 Brass Entries, and 15 Percussion entries. We hired 9 adjudicators to hear the above disciplines - keeping in mind that Piano is divided into three divisions and vocal is divided into two divisions. \$27,200 was given out in scholarships with all disciplines combined (including Schools, Bands and Musical Theatre). A highlight of the end of this week-long festival is the Kinsmen Competition. This is a separate competition celebrating its' 50th anniversary. This evening had 4 Instrumental competitors, 2 Vocal competitors and 2 Piano competitors. These final competitors were selected from a preliminary round held previously in the week. In each discipline the first place winners received \$2000 each, second place winners \$600 each, third place \$400 and fourth place \$300.

Such a large event can never happen without the dedication of many volunteers. A sincere thanks to the entry taking volunteers, the programming committee, the school and band organizers, the band venue managers, the proofreaders, the office helpers, the drivers, the adjudicator liaison, the setup and cleaning helpers, the door venue helpers, the adjudicator assistants and all the committee coordinators that do their jobs so well and efficient.

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Testimonial



My name is Sherry Sproule, I am 2^{nd} Vice President of the SMFA. I would like to share a story that illustrates the impact that the SMFA has had on the people of Saskatchewan over our long history as an Association. Many people, across the music community in this province, would have similar stories to tell, but here is mine:

I grew up on a ranch in the hills south of Fir Mountain, a remote area of south central Saskatchewan, 30 miles north of the US border. In the '70's, when I was a music student, our district festival was only 10 years old, but the local teachers and community knew that they had an event worth the effort. Our music festivals have always been in March and March is calving time. My mom and dad would load me in our four-wheel-drive truck, my mom often drove, and plow winter roads for 45 miles so they could give me this cultural experience. We had a rich folk music tradition in our area and you can be sure that the RSO has never been asked to give a performance at the Fir Mountain Hall. But volunteers would brave the March blizzards to work at the festival so there would be a Lafleche and District Music Festival and we could hear the solo works of Schubert and Beethoven. I learned to play works by Debussy and Chopin so I could compete at the festival, receive a constructive critique from a visiting adjudicator, and therefore prepare for a music exam. To take those music exams, I would have to travel to Regina or Moose Jaw, 2-3 hour road trips. But the Festival was mine...right here in my community.

Fast forward 40 years. Lafleche Music Festival is still alive and well. With the internet, students of classical music can access recordings of the world's top musicians. But they still yearn to and do enter the festival. Students, parents, teachers, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins are still coming out to compete, learn and listen. Community members who have been coming out for 50 years to hear live classical music are still coming out. Music parents and community members want to sit on our board, work at the door and vacuum the church at the end of the sessions.

Because our festival committee hosted a speech arts workshop in our district schools, made possible through the generous support of SaskCulture funding for new initiatives, kids who would have only ever entered the hockey rink are coming to the festival to recite a poem and are discovering a rich classical music cultural event, right in their community. We have, for many years, and continue to, advocate for music education through our grassroots.

What I've learned, through my experience as an SMFA Board member AND delegate to the National Music Festival, is that this is only the beginning of an amazing road of opportunity for our most dedicated musicians. The annual SMFA Provincial Finals brings together the best young musicians, in all disciplines from all 48 district festivals, for a wonderful weekend of sharing, learning and outstanding performances. Several of these musicians go on to represent Saskatchewan at the National Music Festival, and as team designate this year, I can proudly say that the dedication, talent and team spirit displayed by our young people was unsurpassed by any province. This year in Edmonton, Saskatchewan musicians earned their best showing in the history of the National Festival...and it all starts back at the local festivals like Lafleche and District Music Festival, that is right here in my community.

These kids, our festival participants, don't know how the system works. They don't know that the teachers are following a detailed Provincial Syllabus that was created by a team of 30 plus volunteers overseen by a dedicated, knowledgeable Provincial Board, working thousands of hours, and updated every three years. The kids don't know how the local volunteer Committee are guided by the festival Handbook, or that the Committee can call the Provincial office when they have a question about repertoire in a certain class, rules and regulations, or filling out their charitable return. They don't know that local volunteer Committee members are so invested in this system, that they attend the Provincial Conference/AGM to network with the other 48 District Festival committees to help them learn things that will help them run their festival, like the new classes that have been added to the Provincial Syllabus (First Nations

Drumming and Song, Multicultural Traditional Story Telling, Musical Theatre, Royal Conservatory Popular Music, Multicultural National Anthem). The music festival participants don't know that the SMFA functions, at all levels, very efficiently and effectively with minimal office staff, and a volunteer Board of Directors elected from the grassroots festivals, so that the revenues provided can be used for programming. They DO know about the support from SaskCulture and Sask Lotteries, as the logos are visible in every program, award certificate, and verbally acknowledged at every final concert program.

But we know, and many of us in the music community know, that SMFA is a wellfunctioning unique organization that has changed and grown as needed and therefore has worked for 107 years. What over 18,000 kids in little towns like Fir Mountain and cities like Regina and Saskatoon know is that there will be adjudicators arriving, and that they had better practice, because the community hall will be full of family, friends, and community members who come out to hear all disciplines and genres of live music....Right here...in our very own communities.



Program Enhancement

SMA Summer Music Camp

The SMA Summer Music Camps were a huge success again this year. Students in Regina, Saskatoon and Prince Albert had the opportunity to try singing, drumming, trumpet, clarinet and violin under the direction of talented clinicians from across the province.

One of the highlights this summer was watching the progress of two senior students who were attending the camp for the fourth time and hearing how much of an impact this camp has had on their lives.

This year's camp concerts were well attended by parents, friends, and representatives from the sponsorship companies. There were even some previous campers who attended the concerts to support their younger friends and siblings. This camp provided a positive experience for over a hundred students in our province and we are excited to find out how many of these students will sign up for music activities this fall, as a result of attending the SMA Summer Music Camp.

The Music of Opportunity ... the Sound of Potential!

The Saskatchewan Music Alliance has offered Summer Music Camps to students with financial barriers in Regina, Saskatoon and Prince Albert in July 2015. These camps ran for the first time in 2012 and have continued to grow in popularity each year.





Speech Arts Workshops

Meadow Lake

Heather Macnab travelled from Maple Creek to Meadow Lake and spent January 26 – 30 in five schools, teaching the students about Speech Arts. She interacted with nearly 600 students from Grades 4 to 7 during her stay in our city. Her engaging style soon had even the "coolest" person taking part and learning all about the art of speech.

Through her presentation, the students and teachers learned about their voice and the importance of taking care of it. Using many techniques students, both individually and as a group, discovered the skills needed to become a speech artist.

Through her demonstrations, Heather showed everyone the types of classes that are available in the Music Festival and gave the students an idea of what Speech Arts in the Music Festival would look like. (The students' favourite was her presentation of Little Red Riding Hood and the Wolf by Roald Dahl.)

By using excerpts from a number of poems, Heather had the students discover how meaning is given and can be changed by using different emphasis, dynamics and speeds in a piece.

Comments made by some of the participants:

- "We learned not to be afraid to stand in front of everyone and speak." (student)
- "It was a very fun and exciting presentation and I recommend that you watch it." (student)
- "I learned to use more expression when I act and to project my voice louder so everyone in the room can hear. I also learned to enunciate my words more clearly. When I act in front of other people I can use all of these tools to make my performance as good as it can be." (student)
- "We have a lot of presentations in our school. It was wonderful to have this

one because it really enhances the Language Arts curriculum." (teacher)

 "My class was the very first one that you worked with yesterday and they are still talking about it. That shows how much of an impression you made on them." (teacher)

We have no idea if or how much impact Heather's visit will have on the Speech Arts entries in our Festival. Regardless, her presentation was welcomed by all who attended. The students spent a fun-filled hour learning about Speech Arts and we do hope that a few of them will be inspired to join us at the Festival.

<u>Unity</u>

Heather Macnab traveled to Unity on March 25th and spent the next two days interacting with many students from Unity Public School and Unity Composite High School. Students included those in grades three, four, five, six, seven, eight, and one group from grades ten, eleven and twelve. She ran engaging sessions that dealt with voice care, topic selection, and presentation choices and tips for Speech Arts. The students enjoyed her demonstrations and were excited to be able to experiment using her ideas. She also spent time giving them ideas and suggestions on the poems, in both English and French, which they were preparing for this year's Festival. Both days were very busy and students and teachers alike enjoyed the information presented. We hope in the future this will lead to more individual entries in the Speech Arts.

Assiniboia and District Music Festival

Teachers were equally enthused and the teachers from both schools had been given the presentations contacted me to talk about what a fantastic opportunity that had been given to their schools. Hopefully, there will be some follow up in the next year by the schools or our local association from this wonderful presentation!

<u>Estevan</u>

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association sponsored a speech arts workshop in the city of Estevan on January 12-16, 2015. Clinician, Heather Macnab spent 5 days in our community and held workshops in all 6 of our elementary schools.

This interactive workshop allowed the students to experience different aspects of speech arts including solo, small group work and some full classroom exercises.

A total of 18 sessions were held. There were an overall total of 330 students and 10 teachers who were directly involved in the workshops.

In one of the schools – Ms. Macnab worked with a grade 3 classroom for the entire afternoon. At the first session they were introduced to different ways to use their voice, breathing and actions to enhance a performance. In the next session they were split into small groups and by the end of the hour, each group presented a poem/prose to the rest of the class. It was remarkable to see how they used their own creativity as well as the tools that they learned.

The goals of the workshops were not only met but exceeded as the students and teachers were encouraged and inspired to use speech arts as a tool to increase confidence.

The teachers and students ALL expressed their gratitude for an excellent workshop that fit within the learning strategies and outcomes they are required to teach in school. Every single school would WELCOME another speech arts workshop in the future. The students not only had fun but were able to experience listening, speaking and acting in a safe and encouraging environment.

Heather Macnab is truly a specialist in her field of speech arts. She was a delight to work with. Without a doubt this workshop also increased our already strong speech art entries at our local level.

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The Riders may not be having a stellar season, but Team Saskatchewan certainly did at the National Music Festival. In his greeting, Governor General David Johnston stated: "Music has the power to transcend all barriers, with rhythms and melodies that carry us to a thousand different places of discovery. It has that unique ability to stir within us an unimaginable range of emotions in the space of but a few notes."

That is what every member of the Saskatchewan contingent provided in his/her quest for the top at the National Music Festival. From August 13-15, fifty-seven of Canada's best young amateur musicians, ranging in age from 12 to 28 years, gathered in the beautiful city of Edmonton to compete in nine disciplines: piano, voice, strings, classical guitar, woodwinds, brass, percussion, musical theatre, and chamber music. Competitions and master classes were held at the Alberta College Campus of MacEwen University and McDougall United Church.

Competitors and their accompanists arrived on Tuesday prior to the competition, checked in at the Chateau Lacombe and immediately began booking practice rooms in preparation for their performances. A briefing for competitors was held Tuesday evening, where information was shared regarding the competition, and competitors were introduced. Sherry Sproule, designate for Team Saskatchewan, proudly announced our team: Godwin Friesen (piano), William Boan (strings), Brendan Catalano (woodwinds) all accompanied by Bonnie Nicholson; Abby Fuller (brass) accompanied by Maria Fuller; Griffin Hewitt (musical theatre) accompanied by Robert Ursan; and Bryan Allen (percussion). Saskatchewan delegates attending along with Sherry were Carol Donhauser, Nancy Toppings, and Karen MacCallum.

Wednesday was a busy day for competitors and their assisting artists, with each competitor having a rehearsal in the official venue. Team Saskatchewan's solidarity was evident from the very beginning. They followed one another to rehearsals, offering feedback and moral support, moving percussion equipment, and doing whatever was needed to help. That consideration, however, was not limited to our own competitors. Maria Fuller came to the rescue of two competitors from another province when she offered, with only a day to prepare, to accompany them when a replacement was needed. Not many people could learn the repertoire in a day, step confidently on the stage at Nationals and be a rock of support for the soloist – well done, Maria! She simply said, "I wanted to do it!"

Thursday and Friday were competition days, on which every competitor had a maximum of one hour to perform their program. SMFA board member, Sandra Senga, joined our delegates as we followed our competitors from venue to venue and took in as many other performances as possible. One advantage of having Nationals in a neighbouring province is that family and friends are able to attend the competition, and we were delighted to have so many come to Edmonton to support their favorite musicians.

With all competitions finished by Friday evening, competitors were treated to an evening at the West Edmonton Mall, where they could choose to blow off steam at Galaxyland or World Waterpark, or browse the mall. A pizza party followed in the basement of McDougall United Church and after a time of socializing, some very tired young people returned to the hotel.

Saturday morning was back to business, with master classes for every competitor followed by the announcement of winners. We couldn't be more proud of our two first-place winners,



Godwin Friesen in piano and Bryan Allen in percussion. They were whisked off to the Winspear for a sound check in preparation for their evening performances, while everyone else had a free afternoon to explore and get ready for the Grand Awards Concert.

All first-place winners competed for the prestigious Grand Award title and award of \$5,000 at the Francis Winspear Centre for Music on Saturday evening. The winner of the Grand Award was Angela Ryu, violinist from Alberta. A hearty congratulations to the rest of Team Saskatchewan, who ALL placed in their disciplines!

This group impressed the entire competition with their team spirit, as it is a rarity to see a team approach displayed at what is, for the most part, a solo competition. I believe that this cohesive team attitude really did tip the balance for our soloists this year. Aside from what happened around the competition, the real treat for this designate was to hear the incredible performances that our young Saskatchewan performers left on the Edmonton stages. I was inspired. Thank you."

Thank you to the Alberta Host Committee and the City of Edmonton for the kind hospitality shown to our competitors and delegates during our stay. We look forward to returning to Edmonton next August for the 2016 National Music Festival.

Federation of Canadian Music Festival (FCMF) Business Meeting Report

The 65th Annual Federation of Canadian Music Festival Association AGM and National Music Festival Competition was hosted by Kelowna, BC, on August 11 – 13, 2014, at University of British Columbia Okanagan.

Saskatchewan voting delegates were: Karen MacCallum, Nancy Toppings, Sherry Sproule, and Carol Donhauser.

The October 31, 2013 audited Financial Statements were presented: The operating budget showed revenues of \$266,581 and Expenses of \$239,656 with a surplus of \$26,925. The accumulated Net Loss is -\$7,429. The General Reserve fund has a total of \$67,668 and the Restricted Reserve Fund has a total of \$97,822. Operating Reserve Fund – the annual contribution of \$0.10 per entry to the annual reserve fund for 2014 took place in 2015 and totalled \$10,614.80. This amount will be show on 2015 Financial Statements.

The following is a list of relevant motions passed at the FCMF AGM.

NOTICE OF MOTION: DELETION OF PERCUSSION CLASSES [Submitted by the Executive Committee]

The Executive Committee recommends to the AGM that percussion classes at the National Music Festival cease at the end of the 2015 Festival. Carried.

MOTION: To reinstitute percussion classes as recorded competitions under processes and fees similar to recorded choral entries. Rationale: Rather than eliminate percussion entries altogether when a majority of provinces have syllabus classes in percussion, keep percussion at the national level via recorded media. Carried.

NOTICE OF MOTION: APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE(S) TO EXAMINE VARIOUS ASPECTS OF THE FEDERATION OF CANADIAN MUSIC FESTIVALS AND ITS NATIONAL MUSIC FESTIVAL [Submitted by Jerry Lonsbury] THAT the Board of Directors appoint a committee or committees to examine and make recommendations on each of the following topics:

- 1. The goal, vision, and purpose of the Federation and its National Music Festival.
- 2. The organizational structure of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals.
- 3. A sound financial plan that will enable the Federation to meet its future obligations

MOTION #7: That the Notice of Motion to appoint a committee to examine various aspects of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals and its National Music Festival as stated above be accepted. Carried.

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Financial Report

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) is committed to financially responsible decision-making, in order to maintain a strong Festival movement and offer effective programming throughout the province.



Karen Unger, Finance Chair

The Finance Committee consists of First Vice-President Karen Unger (Chair), President Nancy Toppings, Second Vice-President Sherry Sproule, Past President Karen MacCallum, and Executive Director Carol Donhauser. As members of the Finance Committee, we strive to oversee all financial matters in a manner that will promote the health and well-being of our Association and our programs. This includes preparing the annual budget as well as the budgets for specific events such as the Opera competition, Concerto competition, Provincial Finals, and Fall Conference. It involves responding to financial issues that

arise, and presenting solutions to our Board.

Our financial goal is a balanced budget, and we have met that goal in the fiscal year ending July 31, 2015. For the fourth consecutive year, we have been able to transfer \$10,000 from the general fund to the reserve fund. This operating reserve will serve to stabilize our financial position by providing for unexpected cash flow shortages, expense or loss.

The SMFA investment portfolio is managed by Dueck Leander Beyond Wealth of Management in Regina. In June, Leander reported that "Since our January 30, 2015 report, the investment portfolio increased by 4.1%. During the same period, the Toronto Stock Exchange index increased by 3%. Anytime we can exceed the index it has to be considered a success." We value Leander's expertise and advice, and are working with him to balance our asset mix in a way that will help to decrease our risk during times of volatility.

On July 23, 2014, BCE announced that it would privatize Bell Aliant by acquiring the interest of Bell Aliant's public minority shareholders. In September 2014, SMFA completed the transaction of transferring its Bell Aliant shares into BCE shares which changed the total BCE share number from 547 to 576.

SMFA is dependent on funding from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, and we are deeply grateful for this support. Annual Global Funding has been approved through to July 31, 2016. A second year of increased funding for Program Enhancement will enable us to offer the popular speech arts workshops into even more district festival communities. We acknowledge the support of the SaskCulture Inc., PotashCorp, SaskEnergy, SaskTel, Mr. Lube (Regina), the University of Saskatchewan Music Department, Regina Symphony Orchestra, Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra and Mr. William Shurniak. We sincerely thank our many scholarship donors and patrons, and contributors to our Festival Friends campaign. Music festivals continue to thrive in communities across this province because of your generous and ongoing support.

I wish to thank the Finance committee, and all Board members, for their dedication and diligent work on behalf of the Saskatchewan Festival Music Association and its membership. I am incredibly grateful to our Executive Director Carol Donhauser, whose superb preparation and planning are invaluable to the efficiency of our Finance committee! We continue to operate from a position of financial strength, and we look forward to another successful festival season in 2016!

1. Status and nature of activities

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan. Under present legislation, no income taxes are payable on the reported income of such operations. The purpose of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is to provide a classical, competitive music festival system of the highest standard at the local, provincial and national levels.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided on a diminishing balance method over the assets' estimated useful lives as follows:

Equi	pment	10 %
Furn	iture and fixtures	10 %
Lease	cholds	5 year

Full amortization is recorded in the year of purchase.

Revenue recognition

Grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are received out of the net proceeds of lottery ticket sales in Saskatchewan. These grants have been recorded as revenue by Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as approved by Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreations. Accordingly, amounts received that relate to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred revenue.

Financial instruments

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash, investments and accounts receivable. Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Management estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and habilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

6. Investments

Investments consist of the following term deposits: -\$10,037 - 2 year, annual interest rate of 1.36%, matures April 24, 2017 -\$20,083 - 3 year, annual interest rate of 1.55%, matures April 24, 2018

7. Deferred revenue

Funding received relating to specific projects has been deferred and will be recognized as revenue in the year the related project or event occurs.

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8. Funds held in trust

Per the Association's by-laws in the event that a District Festival Association ceases operation or becomes inactive for a period of two consecutive years or more, all funds of that District Festival Association are to be transferred to the Provincial Association and be held in trust for a period of five years. If the District Festival Association is not reinstated within the five year period then the funds become the funds of the Provincial Association.

9. 2013 SMA Summer Music Camp Program

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association, Saskatchewan Band Association, Saskatchewan Music Educators Association, Saskatchewan Orchestral Association and the Saskatchewan Choral Federation entered into an agreement to administer a Summer camp music program. Saskatchewan Music Festival Association was the administrator of this program. See schedule 7 for a breakdown of revenue and expenses.

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association was not the administrator for the 2014 SMA Summer Music Camp.

10. Lease commitment

A lease agreement exists with Niesner Properties Inc. for the premises known as 4623 Albert Street in Regina, Saskatchewan. A 5 year term commenced December 1, 2012 requiring a base monthly rent of \$900 plus GST. This agreement expires November 2017. The Association is also responsible for their portion of property taxes and operating costs.

A lease agreements exists with Pitney Bowes for a postage machine. A five year term commenced April 2011 requiring monthly payments of \$78 plus taxes.

11. Economic dependence

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association receives significant revenue in grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. As a result, the Association is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

12.Financial instruments

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association's exposure and concentrations at July 31, 2015;

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a party may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics that could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions, such that the organization could incur a financial loss. The Association is exposed to credit risk with respect to cash, investments and accounts receivable. The Association manages its credit risk by placing cash and investments with major financial institutions. Credit risk for accounts receivable is managed by the credit quality and diverse debtor base and creating an allowance for bad debts where applicable. There has been no change from credit risk exposure from 2014... Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association may not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due or not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The Association is exposed to liquidity risk with respect to its investments and accounts payable but manages its liquidity risk by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash. There has been no change from liquidity risk exposure from 2014.



11. Financial instruments (continued)

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is a type of market risk that refers to the risk that the fair value of financial instruments or future cash flows associated with the instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Association is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to its cash and investments and its effect on interest income. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have a significant effect on cash and investments due to the fact that interest income is not a major percentage of total revenue. There has been no change from interest risk exposure from 2014.
