FESTIVAL FOCUS

Fall Conference & AGM

Members of the SMFA gathered in Swift Current on October 28 & 29, 2016 for the Annual Conference and AGM. The theme of the conference was "Classical Connections". After several years of holding the conference in conjunction with the larger Saskatchewan Music Conference, a return to our more intimate conference setting made this an appropriate theme. Delegates were greeted by board and staff, with registration beginning on Friday evening at the Days Inn.

The first session opened on Friday evening with Harvey Linnen, as he cultivated common ground throughout the group by having each delegate share their roles in their local festival and existing knowledge of governance. He clarified the job and purpose of our District Festival Boards and committees and how governance works on both levels to improve each District Festival's effectiveness, efficiency and sustainability. A President's Reception followed with an ice-breaker to further connect delegates. Michael Eckert-Lyngstad provided entertainment on his guitar and lute, while delegates and board members mingled.

Saturday began with a continental breakfast and a time of networking. The second session had Sherry Sproule, 2nd Vice-President, report on Diversification. Two weeks earlier, the SMFA Board walked through the first steps of a Diversification Strategy sponsored by SaskCulture, Inc. Sherry reported on the process, emphasizing this as an opportunity for SMFA to reach out to, and include, our newcomers and Aboriginal people in our programming. There exists a tremendous opportunity for growth in our programs, in so doing. Dean Kush, bringing greetings from SaskCulture, also spoke to the value and opportunities of diversity from the SaskCulture perspective.

Wendy Thienes, Director, educated the members on artVest, a sponsorship training and matching incentive program which assists arts organizations in developing new and mutually beneficial partnerships with local businesses, and how it can also expand and improve our programming through financial assistance.

Session #3 was presented by Greg and Marcia McLean, giving a festival perspective from an adjudicator's point of view. For the most part, they were both very appreciative of how they have been received and cared for by festivals in their history of a combined 40 years of adjudicating. Practical suggestions were given and questions from festivals were answered.

The final session of the day saw delegates split into small groups for festival roundtables. Scenarios were enthusiastically discussed and shared. A Trade Fair and Silent Auction was held throughout the weekend.

An Adventure in Music

Godwin Friesen

I, Godwin Friesen, am a musician, a student, an artist, a brother, and most notably, a Christian. Although I am all these things, my musicianship is becoming more and more the best known aspect of my character. The main reason for this is that I am now in my first year at the Glenn Gould School of Music in Toronto, studying piano performance with John O'Conor, in the four-year Performance Diploma Program. I started taking piano lessons at age seven, with the hopes of eventually becoming a saxophonist. But I quickly grew to love the piano so well that the two years of playing saxophone in school band were enough to satisfy that desire, and piano became my main instrument. Although I love all other instruments, it is the piano's ability to emulate the harmonies and fullness of an orchestra which makes it my definite favourite.

Those early lessons as a seven-year-old were certainly not the beginning of music for me, but only one step along the adventure. My music-learning began before I could speak, and I am told that as a baby I would bob my head to any rhythm, including my dad's sawing. Because both my parents are very musical, there was already a foundation of music before I or any of my five siblings were born, and as young children we were already practising our singing, harmonizing, and other music-making just by doing it for fun with family. This family music became more significant when my dad started teaching us songs he composed or arranged, and we became the Friesen Family Band – recording three albums and performing over a hundred concerts of this music we call "eclectic faith-folk for heart, mind, and soul".

Another step was having an amazing piano teacher in Edmonton, Sheila Wright, who had each of her students compose a piece for a recital each year. This taught me that composing wasn't something only done by old, ancient people, but could be done by anyone. Since then I have composed mostly solo piano pieces, but this past summer I finished composing my first piece for orchestra, entitled Pilgrimage, which won the Saskatoon Youth Orchestra's Young Composers Competition. Because of this, they will be performing it in their next season!

So as a young musician, I realized that composing was a unique talent of mine, but believed that as a performer, I was nothing special. I never competed in any music festivals – except in classes for original compositions – until 2012, after my family moved to Saskatchewan. We lived outside of Saskatoon, but I was able to join the studio of Bonnie Nicholson, who has been an incredible mentor and encouragement for me for the past five years. After the first year of her guidance and inspiration, I entered the Sask Valley district festival – the nearest one at the time – where I played in a few classes and was utterly amazed to receive the Rose Bowl for best pianist of the festival! It was then that I really realized that I do have a special talent for performing, and this was the beginning of many achievements in music festivals over the next few years.

BONNIE NICHOLSON

Bonnie Nicholson is a pianist, teacher and chamber musician from Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. Her degrees include a Bachelor of Music (Performance) and a Master of Arts Degree from the University of Saskatchewan, as well as an ARCT in Piano Performance from the RCM. Teachers and influences are varied and include mentor, Robin Harrison.


Since 1985, Bonnie has served as a Sessional Lecturer in Piano, at the Department of Music, U of S, in Saskatoon. As part of her solo and teaching career, she has received the Florence Bowes Piano Pedagogy Scholarship (1993), the Dwaine Nelson Teaching Award for Excellence from the U of S Association of Student Musicians (2000) and the Sylvia Wallace Award for Sessional Teaching Excellence at the University of Saskatchewan

(2004). In their recommendations and evaluations, students and colleagues have commented on Bonnie's "innovative and insightful teaching methods", and her "enthusiasm and encouragement". In August 2015, Bonnie's student Godwin Friesen was awarded first prize in the piano category at the National level of Canadian Music Festivals.

Bonnie Nicholson appears on CD with Bass-Baritone Henri Loiselle, the Saskatoon Children's Choir, the Saskatoon Fireside Singers, trumpeter Dean McNeill's disc entitled "Melange", and saxophonist Glen Gillis' discs entitled, "SaxSpectrum" and "Saxspectrum 2". Most recently, "Les Quatre Mains 1" was released with Bonnie's long time collaborator and friend, pianist Dianne Gryba.

MICHAEL LYNGSTAD

I am pleased to be involved in the SMFA as a board member and I hope to bring my past experience as a teacher, performer, and committee member to this organization.





Upon graduation from the University of Alberta, I taught at MacEwan University in their outreach department from 2005-2013 when I moved to Swift Current and opened my own private instruction studio.

As a performer, my early experience was in rock and jazz bands in Edmonton from 1995-2010 where I played regularly at nightclubs, cafes, and corporate events. In 2001 I formed the Rosette Guitar Duo with fellow university student Kevin Marsh. The Rosette Guitar Duo went on to record 4 albums which saw regular rotation on CBC radio across the country. We also toured Western Canada 3 times, playing hundreds of concerts across BC, Yukon, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba. This group retired after 12 years of activity when Kevin moved to Shanghai, China to pursue performance and teaching opportunities there and I decided to move back home to Swift Current.

Since moving to Swift Current, I have kept up a busy performance schedule as a solo player on Classical Guitar, Renaissance Lute, and Chinese Zither at local art openings, as support music for local corporate and fundraising events, and at high profile functions such as the Premier's luncheon in honour of HRH Prince Edward's visit in 2014 and the New West Summit in Regina in the same year. I also perform jazz in a number of ad hoc local groups including the Swift Current Jazz Orchestra as a guitarist and bassist.

My board experience began in 2009 as a director on the board of the Edmonton Classical Guitar Society where I also served as the webmaster. Upon moving to Swift Current, I joined the local Registered Music Teachers branch where I have served as a director, Vice President, and President-currently sitting as Past President. As of 2015 I have been a director on the board of the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers where I also work as the webmaster. Since joining the local Swift Current Music Festival Association in 2016 I have contributed through webmaster duties and am currently the Scholarships director.

I look forward to working with the SMFA board and continuing my contributions to music in Saskatchewan!

Canadian Music Festival Adjudicator's Association (CMFAA) - "Duet Challenge"

"The Duet Challenge" - A prize of \$500 to be awarded to the Music Festival with the most duet entries in Canada.

CMFAA has launched a new initiative! We want to find the Duet Capital of Canada! We know "the loneliness of the long-distance runner" applies to piano students, as they practice alone. They have fewer opportunities to be part of ensembles in the way singers and instrumentalists do. We believe in the value of duet playing, and hence this award.

Requirements: Any Music Festival in Canada (belonging to the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals) is eligible. To apply we need two pieces of information: the total number of solo piano entries, and the total number of duet entries in the Festival for a calendar year. The festival with the highest ratio of duet entries to solo entries will be awarded the Duet Capital of Canada and receive a \$500 scholarship.

The Application form is available at CMFAA.ca. It must be signed/dated by a member of the Executive of the Festival, and submitted to our Registrar by June 1, 2017. (This date accommodates all "local" Festivals which are completed by the end of May. For Festivals that are held in the Fall of 2017, they can submit as soon as their Festival is over.)

Beware of Phishing



Phishing is a general term for e-mails, text messages and websites fabricated and sent by criminals and designed to look like they come from well-known and trusted businesses, financial institutions and government agencies in an attempt to collect personal, financial and sensitive information. It's also known as brand spoofing.

Be suspicious of any e-mail or text message containing urgent requests for personal or financial information (financial institutions and credit card companies normally will not use e-mail to confirm an existing client's information). In some cases, the offending site can modify your browser address bar or email address to make it look legitimate.

Contact the organization by using a telephone number from a credible source such as a phone book or a bill. Never e-mail personal or financial information. Avoid embedded links in an e-mail claiming to bring you to a secure site. Get in the habit of looking at a website or email address line and verify if it displays something different from the address mentioned in the email.

Regularly update your computer protection with antivirus software, spyware filters, e-mail filters and firewall programs.

Shurniak Concerto Competition

February 25, 2017 - Regina, SK

The SMFA's Concerto Competition is held in conjunction with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras; University of Regina - Music Department, and sponsored by William Shurniak. Originally an annual event, the competition is now held every two years, alternating between Saskatoon and Regina. This year's competition will be held February 25, in Regina (U of R, Riddell Theatre).

The first place winner receives a \$2,000 scholarship and has the opportunity to appear as a guest artist with the Regina Symphony Orchestra and the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra. Second-place and third-place scholarships of \$750 and \$500 may also be awarded.

The competition is open to non-professional* musicians, between 14 and 30 years of age. Age restrictions are as of December 31 of the year preceding the competition. All solo instrumental categories will be considered. Previous first-place winners of the Concerto Competition are not eligible to enter. Only those of talent and industry, who have the necessary potential for a possible career in music, should consider entering the competition. - Keep ALL competitors' marks (in a program, database, or equivalent) and, immediately following your festival, send to the Provincial Office.
- Updated District Winner Charts can be found on our website. Send the charts to our office immediately following your festival.
- Complete the Adjudicator Evaluations as soon as possible. These evaluations are required in our hiring process.
- The People Stats Form will look a bit different this year. It will be available in Excel format for easier calculations. Please do not leave information blank. If the answer is "nil" indicate it with a "0". If you don't have actual numbers, please estimate. Your estimate will be a much better guess than ours. We will be gathering newcomer information on this year's People Stats Form (How many participants are Aboriginal, or newcomers to Canada in the past five years?). Please have a system in place to capture this information. The information gathered from our People Stats Form helps us acquire sponsorship, award donors, and is required for our Lottery grant.
- Appoint a committee member to write the festival report and submit it to our office as soon as your festival is completed. Tell us an interesting story about something unique that happened at this year's festival!
- Revenue and Expense Forms can be completed after we have sent you the statement (by the end of May) with the affiliation dues and supply invoices...not before! These expenses must be included in your current year-end.
- Choose dates for 2018, if you have not already done so. Follow up with the Adjudicator Time Frame Form.
- Notify us of the date and location of your AGM so that we can post it on our website.
