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History of the SMFA



The SMFA is one of the province's oldest organizations and has influenced all Saskatchewan music. Its structures and programs have been followed throughout Canada. Inspired by Governor General Earl Grey's vision of a Dominion-wide festival, the SMFA was established in 1908 in Regina by Fred Chisholm and Frank Laubach. All Saskatchewan musical groups were invited to the first Provincial Festival in 1909 in Regina. The annual festival moved to Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw, and then continued the rotation. Excellent railway service allowed participants, including large ensembles, to come from all parts of the province. To satisfy increasing demands, District Festivals were added, beginning at Unity in 1926. Expansion continued until there were fifty-one in 2002, including one fully bilingual event at Gravelbourg. An early president, Chief Justice Brown, secured a government grant to be administered by the University of Saskatchewan under its president, Walter Murray. Murray, another early SMFA president, provided office space for the SMFA secretary and a car to facilitate festival fieldwork.

Adult vocal ensembles and solos were eligible for the first


festival, with other categories added gradually. Provincial awards kept increasing until several hundred performers competed through a system of District winners. This model has since been used by the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals in all provinces. The continued growth of large ensembles encouraged the formation of many provincial associations to accommodate various categories such as choral and band. The SMFA occasionally commissions works for special celebrations.

The Concerto Competition (established in 1979) and the Gordon Wallis Opera Competition (2000), administered by the SMFA, are held in alternating years. In addition to cash prizes, the winners are featured as guest soloists with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras.

In 2009, the SMFA celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the first Provincial Festival with a Centennial Reenactment Concert held in Regina. In addition, special Centennial classes were heard at the SMFA Provincial Finals and the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals AGM/Conference and National Music Festival Competitions were held in Saskatoon.

In 2019, SMFA celebrated 110 years of festivals in Saskatchewan in conjunction with the National Music Festival in Saskatoon.







Cultural Impact Statement

In 1905, Saskatchewan became a province. Since 1908, the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) has grown with our province, always in step, always in tune. The SMFA reaches out to people of all ages and all backgrounds across the province of Saskatchewan. The Saskatchewan structures and programs have been modelled throughout Canada.

Our mandate, which is *"to promote excellence in music and speech arts by providing performance and educational opportunities through competitive festivals"*, requires us to work closely with the many people who come together to keep the festival movement in Saskatchewan alive and well. These people include music and speech students, teachers, parents, volunteers, donors and audiences. There are 47 annual festivals across the province, therefore the impact that is created in all these 47 festivals and surrounding areas is significant.

These communities have embraced the festival concept because it provides:

- an element of educational growth as well as entertainment that brings their community together
- the opportunity for communities to acknowledge and support the success and endeavours of their young people
- encouragement for students to set goals and showcase their abilities while receiving constructive adjudication from professional musicians
- local volunteers an opportunity to be involved with young people in their community in a
 positive way
- participating students with the performance opportunity to develop confidence and selfdiscipline while demonstrating positive role models for their peers

Since its early days, the Association has provided competitive and non-competitive classes for not only solo and individual competitors, but for community and schools in choruses, bands and orchestras. SMFA's continued expansion encouraged the formation of other provincial music organizations. Saskatchewan was not only the first to form a Provincial Music Festival Association, but also the first to use a common syllabus for all its member festivals. The use of the common syllabus assures that a high standard is maintained.

SMFA partners with the other music organizations across Saskatchewan to ensure that the programs we develop are relevant to the needs of our young people. Accessibility to programs and recognizing changing demographic circumstances within the province is a high priority. The broad-based volunteer component of SMFA allows the organization to operate at the grass roots level thereby closely monitoring these changes and adapting to them. Every attempt is made to ensure that the experience attained by participants is beneficial and works in concert with the SMFA vision which is *enhancing lives through an appreciation for music*.

SMFA believes that the need for a culturally aware society is of increasing importance given the pressures exerted upon us by the rapid, electronic environment in which we live. Our organization is committed to cultivating that awareness by providing information, education, opportunity and a clear vision of the role we play in this task.

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As a member in good standing of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals (FCMF), we have one seat at the table for their meetings and attend a yearly conference which is held in conjunction with the National Music Festival. This year, Karen Unger was our representative on the FCMF Board of Directors. She attended monthly meetings, and more frequent meetings, as FCMF shifted into crisis mode with the withdrawal of the Alberta Music Festival Association in October 2018. Karen chaired the Governance Committee for FCMF. Many thanks to Karen for so capably handling what turned into a big role on the Board this year.

In January, SMFA hosted an Adjudicator Professional Development Day at the University of Regina. Thanks to our Adjudicator Liaison, Karen Klassen for organizing and facilitating this event. Twenty-nine adjudicators attended. Dr. Katherine Dowling, Dr. David Dick and Dr. Dominic Gregorio acted as panelists, and Cherith Alexander was on hand to moderate the panel. This is always a good event and adjudicators left with the challenge to make sure every participant in our festivals had a good experience, without compromising the SMFA standards of excellence.

The Shurniak Concerto Competition was held at the University of Regina, with judges Mark Turner, Preston Hawes, and Laurel Swinden. There were eleven participants with Jonathan Craig Penner chosen as the overall winner.

Things really started happening in March and April with the rollout of 47 District festivals. There was a web of musical performances crisscrossing our immense province! Support from SMFA for our festival committees was capably handled by our festival liaison, Nancy Toppings. Thank you for all you do! SMFA Provincial Finals were hosted by the Moose Jaw Festival Committee. Thank you for welcoming us to your historic downtown on a most beautiful weekend in June!

Executive Director's Report

SMFA can attribute its long cultural history to the steadfast support of the amazing volunteers and to the onging financial support received from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, administered by SaskCulture. The association's unique structures and programs have placed Saskatchewan at the forefront of Canada's music festival community.



Since 1905, when Governor General Earl Grey proposed a Canada-wide festival for drama and music, SMFA has expanded across the province and is now associated with 47 District Music Festivals, as well as provincial and national competitions. Over 16,000 talented Saskatchewan musicians rehearse for, and participate, in these events held in centres across the province. Over 4,000 volunteers and 150 adjudicators work to keep the festivals running smoothly each year.

The SMFA is proud to mark 110

years of providing music festivals across the province. To commemorate this significant milestone, the SMFA Provincial Board of Directors launched a car raffle for a Nissan Versa Note in order to raise funds to host the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals National Music Festival in Saskatoon. At the time of our year-end, July 31, 2019, car raffle tickets were selling and plans for Nationals were being finalized. A detailed report on the car raffle and Nationals 2019 will appear in next year's annual report. I would like to thank everyone who participated in the car raffle; whether it was selling tickets or purchasing tickets, your support was gratefully appreciated.



2018 SMFA Fall Conference

The theme for the 2018 Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) Conference & AGM was "110 Reasons to Celebrate!" Representatives from 21 of the 47 affiliated District Music Festivals gathered on October 26 & 27 at the Kerry Vickar Centre in Melfort to network, learn and share experiences.



Presentations, the Annual General Meeting, and roundtable discussions took place with the theme revolving around events in celebration of SMFA's 110th year. Guest speakers and presenters included Lyndon Linklater (Cultural Inclusivity Through the Arts), Barb Keck (solarislive!), and Joel Windsor (Music Festival Suite). Karen Unger presented the new 2019-2021 SMFA Syllabus, and board and staff shared information on risk management, fundraising, the 2019 National Music Festival, creating an impactful festival program, festival reporting, and guidelines for musical theatre repertoire.

The Volunteer Award Luncheon is a Conference highlight, and this year Todd Goudy, MLA (Melfort) was the keynote who spoke about the importance and the benefits of volunteering. Karen Unger, SMFA President, presented volunteer awards to:

Darren Schwartz was awarded a Distinguished Service Award (posthumously) for his dedication to the music festival movement. Darren was instrumental to the operations of Saskatoon Music Festival and served a three-year term on the SMFA Provincial Board of Directors, acting as Public Relations Chair for the 2009 Nationals Host Committee.

Delegates were entertained by young Melfort musicians, Angela Hoffman and Stephanie, Baylee and Lucy Turner. The Melfort Host Committee, chaired by Dawne Glanville, went above and beyond with theme decorations, treats, gift bags and a variety of door prizes.



Two new directors, Krista Brost (Prairie Sunset Music Festival) and Valentina May (Mainline Music Festival), were elected for three-year terms at the AGM.

Krista Brost graduated from the University of Saskatchewan in 2016, with a Bachelor of Music (Vocal Performance) and Bachelor of Education (Music Education). She teaches in the school system and privately. Krista is an experienced competitor in the SMFA system, both at local and provincial levels.



Valentina May began her musical studies in Oshawa, Ontario and moved to Saskatchewan in 1993, where she began teaching piano and voice and has maintained an active studio for the past 25 years, with many students participating in Mainline Music Festival, as well as at the provincial level. Valentina is President of the Mainline Music Festival.

Valentina and Krista are excited to join SMFA board members: Sherry Sproule (President), Karen Unger (Past President), Tammy Villeneuve (1st Vice President), Jeri Ryba (2nd Vice President), Bonnie Nicholson (Director), Dianne Gryba (Director), Kari Mitchell (Director) and Carol Donhauser (Executive Director). Past President Karen MacCallum (Swift Current) and retiring Director, Kari Mitchell (Carnduff) were thanked for their service on the Provincial Board. (*Kari Mitchell subsequently replaced Wendy Thienes as Director, following Wendy's resignation during the* 2018-2019 year.)

SMFA, now in its 110th year of operation, is funded by grants from Sask Lotteries Trust for Sport, Culture & Recreation, administered by SaskCulture Inc. The 2019 FCMF Conference/AGM/National Music Festival will be in Saskatoon from August 8-12.

Karen Unger acknowledged the continuing support of the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, administered by SaskCulture.

Patricia Niekamp of the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers' Association (SRMTA) brought greetings from their association. SRMTA will begin to record presenters and videos will be available via their website. SRMTA and SMFA are exploring the possibility of a joint fall conference, and invited suggestions for possible host sites.

Greetings from the following representative organizations are found in the Conference Program: Saskatchewan Band Association (SBA), Saskatchewan Choral Federation (SCF), Saskatchewan Orchestral Association (SOA), Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers' Association (SRMTA) and the Saskatchewan Music Educators Association (SMEA).

Greetings from the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals (FCMF) President, Iov MacFarlane-Burton, are found in the Conference Program. Joy is a Past President of SMFA. Joy brought personal greetings to the delegates and noted the excitement of FCMF to host Nationals in Saskatoon in 2019 during SMFA's 110th Anniversary. Karen MacCallum was the Saskatchewan representative on the FCMF Board of Governors. Karen acknowledged their contributions to the music festival movement at the local, provincial and national levels and thanked Joy for her contributions at all levels.

Karen MacCallum made the third and last call for nominations from the floor. There were none.

Karen Unger welcomed the new board members. Karen thanked the office staff for their dedication and contributions, as well as the passionate team of board members.

Karen Unger thanked outgoing Board member Kari Mitchell for her service over the past three years. Karen Unger then thanked outgoing Board member Karen MacCallum, who has served for 12 years in a row on the Board of Directiors. Kari and Karen each shared a few words with the delegates.

Karen Unger adjourned the meeting at 11:40 am. Karen Unger presented incoming President Sherry Sproule with the President's gavel. Sherry Sproule introduced the 2018-2019 Board: Directors – Dianne Gryba, Jeri Ryba, Bonnie Nicholson, Valentina May, Krista Brost; 2nd Vice President – Tammy Villeneuve; 1st Vice President – Wendy Thienes; President – Sherry Sproule; Past President – Karen Unger.

Carol Donhauser presented Karen Unger with an engraved gavel and thanked her for her service as President of SMFA. A Board Meeting will take place on Sunday morning at the Canalta Hotel Meeting Room.



Adjudicator Liaison Report

In 2019, 145 assignments were contracted to 112 musicians from six different provinces and three states to judge our District Festivals, the Shurniak Concerto Competition and Provincial Finals competitions.

Hiring for the 2019 season began in August 2019 and continued through the fall. It is important for District Festivals to have their dates and disciplines planned as firmly as possible (before the June 30 deadline for the 'Time-Frame' form) so as to avoid requesting changes in the fall. Larger festivals who wish to have adjudicators from out of province might also consider requesting their dates even earlier, as it some of the best adjudicators are being booked as much as two years in advance. The total number of assignments was slightly down from 2018 (145 as compared to 153), but the number of adjudicating days was up (416 from 414).

All of the adjudicators have now been evaluated by the district festivals and the vast majority of these range between 'excellent' and 'positive'. This appreciation was returned by the adjudicators who were generally also very positive in their evaluations of the District Festivals.

In January 2019, an Adjudicator Professional Development day was held at the University of Regina. Approximately 30 people were in attendance, despite the poor weather that day. Cherith Alexander facilitated the session with panelists from the U of R – David Dick, Dominic Gregorio and Katherine Dowling. Cherith also presented four webinars in February and March to an additional 27 people: one focused on adjudicators who were new-to-Saskatchewan (but with experience elsewhere); another on adjudicators who were about to have their first assignment; the other two were refresher sessions for current adjudicators. The training sessions over the past few years (both in person and online) have acted as an excellent recruitment tool – there have been many new applications and many new (or new-to-Sask) adjudicators have been hired. Additionally, there are quite a few other prospective adjudicators still waiting for their first assignments. Overall, the 'newcomers' have been received very well, the majority getting excellent reviews - a great reflection on the training that the SMFA has offered in the form of an annual training session, webinars and shadowing opportunities.

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Shurniak Concerto Competition

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA), Sherry Sproule, President is pleased announce that the 33rd SMFA Concerto Competition was won by Regina cellist Jonathan Craig Penner, with his performance of Tchaikovsky's Variations on a Rococo Theme, Op. 33. He was accompanied by Clark Schaufele. Jonathan received the first prize of \$2,000 and the opportunity to be a featured soloist in an upcoming season with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras.

Jonathan Craig Penner is an 18-year-old cellist from Regina. He has studied cello under Simon Fryer since 2012 and is currently principal cellist with the South Saskatchewan Youth Orchestra. He is also a member of the Fiearro String Quartet which placed first in the chamber music category at the National Music Festival in 2018 and is a utility musician for the Regina Symphony Orchestra. Jonathan plans to pursue cello studies at the post-secondary level in the coming year.

Eleven young musicians competed on Saturday, February 23, 2019 in the Riddell Theatre, University of Regina, Regina.

Pianist Bradley Little, formerly

from Saskatchewan and now living in Vancouver, earned the second-place prize. Shion Tamashiro, a young violinist from Saskatoon placed third.

The competition was judged by Preston Hawes (Head of Strings and Director of Orchestral Studies at the Washington Adventist University in Takoma Park, MD, and Artistic Director and Concertmaster of the New England Symphonic Ensemble and a former finalist of the competition); Laurel Swinden (Principal Flute of the Stratford Symphony Orchestra and Assistant Principal Flute/Piccolo of the Scarborough Philharmonic); and Mark Turner (Executive Director of the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra).

The next Concerto Competition will be held in February of 2021.

I have played piano for twenty years now and have learned so much from music. It's my passion, and the perseverance and attention to detail that it has taught me is invaluable. My most recent venture was performing with the New Westminster Symphony Orchestra in BC for a "Symphony at the Oscars" concert in 2017, as well as their annual Christmas concert in 2017 and 2018. This was an incredible experience and a goal of mine. I learned a lot about playing and listening as part of a group of musicians. My next ambition is to play a piano concerto with an orchestra.

I have had success at many competitions over the years, including placing first in various solo piano categories in the Saskatchewan Provincial Music Festival, second place in the piano category at the Saskatchewan Music Festival Grand Awards Competition, and first in the Florence-Bowes and Gordon

C. Wallis competitions. I also held a concert fundraiser for Camp

fYerfly Saskatchewan, and organized and performed in a collaborative concert entitled Music and Medicine as part of the Regina Symphony Orchestra's first piano festival. The concert entirely consisted of solo pieces by living Canadian classical composers.

Outside of music, I am a practicing family physician in downtown Vancouver. I work at a clinic called Spectrum Health, which focuses on caring for HIV + individuals and other vulnerable members of the community. I have come to appreciate the art of medicine and have been surprised that many concepts I learned from music are applicable in my current work. I completed my licentiate in piano performance through the Royal Conservatory of Music in 2016, the year I graduated from the University of Saskatchewan College of Medicine. I am continuing my music studies at the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra School of Music under Bogdan Dulu. Bogdan is a performing concert pianist and completed his PhD at UBC studying with Jane Coop and Marc-Andre Hamelin.

Music will always be a part of my life. I draw inspiration from Thomas Yu, an accomplished pianist from Saskatchewan who is a regular performer with a full-time career as well. In the future, I hope to compete in the amateur stream of international competitions, complete my fellowship in piano performance, and find any opportunity I can to perform. I hope my path can be an inspiration for others who are split between a career in the arts and other career routes.

I grew up playing in festival here in Saskatchewan, and those experiences were foundational for me – festival season not only provided goals for my practicing, but it also provided the majority of my performing experiences, and was the only time I received feedback from someone other than my teacher. It was also a great time for camaraderie and friendship amongst my fellow young musicians – something that is rare for young pianists. It has been a great adventure to be on the other side of the room as an adjudicator, both here in Saskatchewan and elsewhere.

A colleague of mine, now a professional pianist, fondly remembers playing in the Medicine Hat Rotary Music Festival when he was twelve years old – it was the exact moment that he felt he was a 'real' pianist. What is remarkable about this experience is that he did not win any classes – he will tell you, with chagrin and with only a hint of bitterness, that his friend Jason ALWAYS won everything (Jason is now a doctor) – but the experience of performing and receiving feedback and encouragement was so powerful that it, in fact, changed his self-perception and cemented his life goals and his educational and career trajectories. Similarly, I can remember every detail of the moment that an elderly adjudicator, now deceased, praised



my performance of a Debussy prelude by comparing it to Debussy's own recorded piano rolls. I can recall his tone of voice, the temperature in the room, what he was wearing, and of course his exact words, though this was at least twenty years ago.

These stories and anecdotes serve to illustrate what is perhaps the most important lesson that I have learned, and is the cornerstone of my own work: the adjudicator has the power to set the tone, to define the energy within the room. It is our responsibility as adjudicators to create, and to continuously cultivate, an atmosphere that promotes learning and a love of music.

I'd like to encourage you all to recognize and to fall in love with the unique qualities and flavours of your particular district festivals and those of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association at large. If we are accustomed to our local festival within this province, we might mistakenly assume that our experiences are the norm throughout the country. Know that we are participating in a heritage that forms a vital aspect of both public life and cultural life within the province and was for many of our fellow citizens, their introduction to music performance.

Assiniboia & District Music Festival March 17 – 19, 2019

Battlefords Kiwanis Music Festival March 31 – April 7, 2019

The 88th consecutive Battlefords Music Festival was held March 31 - April 7, with the Gala Concert of award winners on Tuesday, April 9. Our festival is fortunate to be well supported by businesses and service clubs in our community, including substantial sponsorships from the Kiwanis Club and the Jim Pattison Broadcast Group. We were able to pay bussing costs for school groups entering the festival and travel costs for performers recommended to the provincial level of competition. Competitions took place at Third Avenue United Church, North Battleford Comprehensive High School and the Kinsmen Band Hall.

The festival began with vocal and choir classes, which were adjudicated by Janice Paterson. Small ensembles and some solo entries were heard in the sanctuary of the church on Sunday, March 31, and the rest of the classes were held in Logie Hall on Monday, April 1. There were



86 entries in solo vocal and 3 small ensemble/choral entries. (Total: 89 entries)

Musical theatre and speech arts participants performed on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 2-3 in Logie Hall. The adjudicator was Janet Nichol. There were 31 musical theatre solos and 5 duets, as well as 3 large ensembles. Ms. Nichol heard 31 speech arts solo entries, as well as 1 group of classroom choral speaking. (Total: 71 entries)

Rick Lett was the band/instrumental adjudicator. 19 bands entered the festival, some performing at the North Battleford Comprehensive High School, and others at the Kinsmen Band Hall. 21 solos and 10 duets and small ensembles were performed. (Total: 50 entries)

String players were heard by Wingtak Nova Wong. There were 39 solo entries, which included 8 fiddling performances. We were excited to welcome 2 school-based string ensembles to the festival. The students played in the sanctuary of Third Avenue United Church. (Total: 41 entries)

Piano participants were adjudicated by Laurel Teichroeb. The soloists played in Logie Hall, while duet and concerti entries were heard in the sanctuary. Laurel heard 118 solos, 10 duets and 2 concerti. (Total: 130 entries)

Total number of entries was 381, which is an increase of 17 from the 2018 festival. Admission to sessions was by donation. Programs were sold for \$8. We are working toward increasing our numbers again in 2020.

The winner of the cover art contest was Matthews Antony from John Paul II Collegiate.

The Gala Concert on April 9 at the Dekker Centre was an excellent evening showcasing fine performances. \$9400 in scholarship money was awarded to students. A rehearsal was held at the Dekker Centre for the performers in the afternoon between 3:30 and 5:30, which was helpful to everyone. Tickets for the gala were \$10.

Carnduff & District Music and Arts Festival March 10 - 15, 2019

The 60th Annual Carnduff & District Music and Arts Festival was held March 10-15, 2019. We were hosted by two venues again this year - the Carnduff Legion and Oxbow Prairie Horizon School. This year was kicked off with the Diamond Jubilee, celebrating our 60th year, on March 2. We had 33 performers at the Jubilee and 313 entries for the Music and Arts Festival. Our theme this year was "60 Years of Musical Moments".

The Diamond Jubilee is an opportunity for anyone (not just limited to entrants in festival) to have the opportunity to perform at the Legion Hall prior to festival and work out some of those pre-festival jitters. This year, we invited past participants of festival to join us in celebration alongside the current participants.

The mandate of the Art Contest is to promote the arts area of the Festival. The artwork had to reflect the theme, incorporate art elements of

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rhythm, balance, contrast and movement, and be original and creative. We had 224 entries in the contest, with 17 award recipients from K-12. Awards for this were valued at \$380.

The 56th Annual Kindersley & District Festival was held March 18-28. During the two weeks, our community once again hosted a successful festival featuring over 90 musicians from as young as age five, and over 290 performances on a wide range of instruments from the piano to the marimba and everything in between!

One of our volunteers gave us some documents during the festival about the history of our music festival. The documents included minutes from some of the first planning meetings, which were really interesting to read. It was fun to see how many things have changed, but the most important things have remained the same. The Kindersley and District Music Festival came to life on April 16, 1962 due to the work of some dedicated volunteers who wanted to showcase the musical talent of our community. Fifty-six years later, we are still going strong and this festival continues to grow because of the efforts of teachers and students with a desire to excel in their musical pursuits and, of course, due to countless hours put in by so many volunteers, without whom the festival would not be possible.

In addition to having the privilege of listening to hours of wonderful music performed by our talented students, I also had the opportunity to learn about the history of the festival and those who organized it. One thing I learned is that, to our knowledge, only three clarinetists have ever been chosen from Saskatchewan to play in the National Youth Orchestra. Of those three, two of them are from right here - Melissa Hynd, who was selected a few years ago and Vanessa Klassen, who was chosen this year and will be travelling with the orchestra to Spain later this summer.

Thank you to all our volunteers (door people, secretaries and committee members) who make the Festival run smoothly and to the music teachers who recognize and nurture the talents of our students. We look forward to another successful festival in 2020.

Parkland Music Festival (Preeceville & Sturgis) March 31 – April 4, 2019

This year Parkland Music Festival was held in Preeceville and Sturgis from March 31 to April 4 with the final concert on Sunday afternoon, April 7. We had fewer entries than previous years at 181. Although there were fewer classrooms participating than previously, we were delighted to have two classes and three bands come by bus from Kamsack which is an hour away. We hope that, in the future, other classrooms will be in a position to participate again. Due to very low entries in vocal, musical theatre and speech arts we had to cancel our adjudicator for those disciplines and our piano adjudicator graciously consented to adjudicate these entries.

We had top notch adjudicators who were professional and yet so approachable. Caroline Konescni-Christie was our piano adjudicator and spent three days with us. Caroline was so knowledgeable and always encouraging to the participants. Mark Zawerucha was our band/instrumental adjudicator. He also was so encouraging to the students and gave very constructive and helpful, age and learning level appropriate, feedback to the participants.

As always, we had wonderful community and business support both financially (scholarships and patrons totaling more than \$4500) and from volunteers (76 people donating 1200 hours). We have very supportive local press, town advertising, great venues in the United Churches and support from both schools for usage.

Kennedy Kosheluk of Preeceville, who is currently studying music at the University of Saskatchewan, returned home to participate in our festival where she has participated all through her musical life from the time she was very young. She was a district winner in three classes as well as playing a piece of her own Our composition. final concert was meticulously organized, with scholarship presentations and donor recognition integrated with performances which have delightful introductions written for each of them to enhance the audience's understanding of the music. We were so happy to have performers come back to perform in the concert from all corners of our district and we were particularly appreciative that Kennedy Kosheluk came back from Saskatoon to perform at the final concert.







We continue, due to awesome community support, to be able to serve coffee and cookies at each of our sessions and at the final concert. We sometimes wonder about the effort of this unique practice but are encouraged to continue when we hear comments from adjudicators about the hospitality that this shows, or from teachers bringing classrooms say that they *"are always treated soooo well here"* and from students who say *"but if they don't have cookies, when will we visit with our festival friends."*

Even though the entry numbers were down, we were very pleased that the festival provided excellent learning and performance opportunities for this region and an opportunity to encourage camaraderie in the arts community.



Potashville Music Festival (Langenburg) March 11 – 15, 2019

The 50th Annual Potashville Music Festival was held in Langenburg this year from March 11 to 15. It was enjoyable planning for this event as it was our 50th Anniversary; we have a few very dedicated committee members and local volunteers who continue to provide their knowledge and expertise each and every year. We also welcomed two new members to our committee who realize the importance of providing this opportunity to all of the young people in the area.

The festival had 154 entries this year from Langenburg and the surrounding communities of Churchbridge, Esterhazy, Stockholm, Gerald, Saltcoats and Kamsack. It is always a pleasure to see all of the returning participants that grow and improve from year to year; in particular, it was most enjoyable to see the young performers that entered our music festival for the first time. Regina Music Festival April 8 – 11 and April 30 - May 5 – 6, 2019

Musical theatre launched our 2019 Festival running from the 8th of April through the 11th. There were 130 entries, a record for musical theatre at the Regina Festival, adjudicated by David Klassen. Ten (10) scholarships were awarded. Declan Hewitt, Meika Sonntag and Reese Nelson went on to win scholarships at Provincial Finals and Declan carries on to Nationals.

After Easter, all other disciplines began their classes, lead by choral. Our adjudicator, Dianne Gryba, awarded four (4) scholarships across seventeen (17) entries. Melissa Morgan's choirs, the Luther College Sr. Choir and Ave won provincial scholarships. Campbell Collegiate Chamber Choir won a provincial scholarship and was recommended to the Provincial Level of Nationals.

Our largest disciplines, Strings and Piano 2, ran from the 30th of April through the 4th of May. The strings discipline was adjudicated by Christine Bootland who awarded eighteen (18) scholarships in a highly competitive field of 155 entries. Jonathan Craig Penner and Eleanor Hector won scholarships at Provincial Finals; Jonathan moved on to the Provincial Level of Nationals.

Piano 2 was adjudicated by Heather Blakley. There were sixteen (16) scholarships awarded in Piano 2 across 285 entries. Piano 1 had twentyeight (28) scholarships awarded by Claudette Caron to a field of one hundred and ten (110) entries. This discipline ran from May 1 to May 4 with Chenghan Xie, Kevin Trinh and Ameer Abusada winning scholarships at the provincial level. Vocal 1 ran from the 30th of April through the 4th of May, adjudicated by Robyn Driedger

Klassen who awarded thirty (30) scholarships. Vocal 2 was adjudicated by Casey Peden in a competition that ran from the 3rd of May through the 4th with thirteen (13) scholarships awarded. There were a total of two hundred and forty-eight (248) entries across the vocal discipline. Joshua Hendricksen and Emma Johnson won several provincial scholarships and Emma advanced to the Provincial Level of Nationals.

Brass had twenty-three (23) entries and woodwinds had sixty-six (66). Derek Stoll adjudicated, awarding ten (10) brass scholarships and five (5) scholarships in woodwinds. Abby Fuller, Graeme Scott, Kristian Vogel and Vlad Kosheliev were recognized with scholarships at Provincial Finals. Abby Fuller was recommended to the Provincial Level of Nationals in brass and Kristian Vogel advanced in woodwinds.

Rosetown & District Music Festival March 18 – 26, 2019

The Rosetown and District Music Festival is proud to have celebrated our 90th festival this year. In 2019, we had a total of 248 entries, performed by 280 entrants in 16 sessions from March 18 - 26. We would like to thank our wonderful adjudicators Laurel Teichroeb (piano), Michael Alstad (band and instrumental) and Adria McCulloch (voice and speech arts) for their expertise and guidance shared with our budding performers.

We are fortunate to have generous patrons (businesses and individuals) in our community who support our festival in the form of scholarships, trophies, and medals. Our adjudicators handed out 54 awards with a total of \$4175, including a new, 10-year memorial piano scholarship of \$100 a year. In honour of our 90th anniversary, all award winners received a donated trophy from a past festival award recipient (with name and address as well as award year attached to bottom of trophy), which was a lovely touch (and a great way to reduce costs).

The cover of our programs was a copy of the 1942 program, with the cover in emerald green, which is a 90th anniversary colour. We included a letter from our 50th anniversary edition, which highlighted the history of our festival and the teachers who planted the first seeds of music in our community. We increased our program price from \$5 to \$10, which did not impact our sales. We typically report a loss, but this year (thanks to the rental of hall space sponsored by Country Rose Inn, the sale of program ads and increased program revenue) we are happy to

report a profit of \$474.16 for our festival. Of special note, we included a letter in our program advertising our need for new volunteers to serve on our executive – stressing that no musical experience is required, and that our festival would not have persevered for 90 years without the hard work and dedication of the volunteers who plan our festival. I would like to note that only one executive position (Vice-President) remains vacant at this time, in large part to this direct advertising to our patrons.

We are pleased to announce that the following students have been recommended to Provincials: Natalie Reed – Intermediate Bach, Intermediate Beethoven, Intermediate 20th/21st Century Canadian; Johanna Wiebe – Intermediate Haydn/Mozart, Intermediate Chopin, Intermediate Recital, Intermediate Woodwind; Erika Mourre – Junior Piano; Shayna Fehr – Intermediate Female Voice; Brenna Dolan – Intermediate Folk Song/Ballad; Cecilia Ledding – Junior Musical Theatre

Our Anniversary Trophy Winners, or Most Promising Performers in each category are: Johanna Wiebe – Piano, Instrumental; Shayna Fehr – Vocal; Allister Merrifield – Speech Arts

Our Festival Association also hosts an annual Carol Festival at the beginning of December every year, where we showcase the talents of local choirs and invite our Anniversary Trophy Winners from that year's festival to perform. This past December, we invited our audience members to stand up if they were taught by any of the teachers mentioned in our 50th anniversary letter, and it was truly heartwarming to see how the seeds of music in our community have flourished.

Sask Valley Music Festival (Waldheim) March 20 – 26, 2019

The 2019 Sask Valley Music Festival took place in Waldheim, using the facilities of Waldheim MB Church. Our final Awards Concert was presented Sunday March 31. We are getting spoiled as all our usual venues have fine grand pianos for our use and considering a venue without one becomes less attractive. Once again, Karen Unger was able to be present for our Final Concert and say a few words of greeting and inspiration.

For the second year, we programmed midweek to midweek with a lapse of several days before our Awards Concert. This made it easy to fully prepare the program (calling participants and printing) and awards (cheques and engraving), but again we found the festival to be rather drawn out this way.

We were blessed to have two fabulous adjudicators, Chelsea Mahan for voice, musical theatre, speech and choral, and Cherith Alexander for piano and strings. A total of 225 entries this year shows a slow gradual decrease from our high of 276 in 2017, but remains above our average from five years ago. Our voice entrants are declining, but they enter many classes and take their studies seriously. Total attendance was 1360 for the week, a slight increase over 2018.

We were able to award \$2910 to deserving participants. Both our Rose bowls, voice and piano, went to Kaitlyn Janzen, who will graduate high school this year. This has happened occasionally in the past that one



musician has won both, but it is rare. Recommended to Provincial Competition were Emma Gillingham (Junior Voice and Musical Theatre), Kaitlyn Janzen (Intermediate Folk Song and Musical Theatre, Intermediate Piano-Recital Class and 20th & 21st Century), and Rosthern Junior College Concert Choir. We certainly approved of the SMFA's move to include junior classes in Provincials. As I write this, I just heard that Emma placed first in Junior Voice. We are very proud and excited for her.

Our entries and program planning were a challenge with our new computer program and website, but whenever a new program is used for this purpose, it can be tricky. Fortunately, our committee person for this task, Corinne Scheetz, stuck to it and worked tirelessly. We had to postpone our entry deadline twice to deal with online issues. She appreciated the support from solarislive! and is confident that many issues have been solved for 2020.

We were worried about finances this year with the increased cost of rental space and the increased cost of online entries as we ventured into *solarislive*!. It initially looked like our donations were also down, but our treasurer was pleased to report that some late donors contributed, so that we pretty much broke even. We are grateful that we can carry on planning as in the past without cutting corners too much.

We very much appreciate the workings and support of the SMFA Board and office staff, their new endeavours and patience in reminding us of unfinished tasks.

Saskatoon Music Festival March 12, March 26 – April 12 and April 29 – May 5, 2019

The Saskatoon Music Festival ran five distinct sessions this year. The first session was the Heart of the City Piano Program, hosted at McClure United Church on the morning of March 12. Gaye-Lynn Kern provided excellent adjudication for the 19 students who participated in this session, and we were once again able to provide the top student with an award. In past years Yamaha Piano Centre generously donated a brand-new keyboard for this purpose - however, as they closed their doors this year, we were instead able to donate a used upright piano to the deserving student. Thanks to the Arts Education Department at Saskatoon Public School Division for helping to coordinate this donation!

The second session was Schools, organized by Doug McCosh. The School section ran from March 26-28 and was adjudicated by Catherine Robbins. In total she heard 17 choirs, two handbell groups, and one recorder group – over 500 participants in total! Nine trophies were awarded for this session.

Bands, the third session, was held from April 1-5 at Cathedral of the Holy Family. Dawn Belyk, Larry Pearen, and Mark Ward were our three adjudicators for the week – one for grade 6 bands, one for grades 7/8, and another for high school and jazz bands. In total 108 bands were heard throughout the week – we are grateful to the Cathedral for supplying volunteers and greeters for this session! Over 4,600 students participated in their various bands, and 15 trophies were presented.

Musical Theatre came next, from April 8-12. Once again, the Kiwanis Club under Terry Ross took care of everything this week. The session was hosted at the Frances Morrison Central Library in downtown Saskatoon – our first time in this venue, but we heard favourable reviews





from participants, teachers, and the adjudicator, Marliss Weber. Marliss did a wonderful job with adjudicating 175 entries over the course of the week. 17 awards were presented. We can't thank the Kiwanis Club enough for their work during the Musical Theatre session – this is just another great example of community support in the SMFC.

We ended the festival year with a flourish at the General session, April 29-May 5. We had 310 vocal entries, 668 piano entries, 124 string entries, 8 guitar entries, 36 woodwinds entries, 32 brass entries, 21 percussion entries, and 6 speech arts entries. Scholarships totaling \$21,900 were awarded over the course of the 5 sessions. We enjoyed adjudication from Alan Crane (senior piano), Janna Olson (intermediate and junior piano), Peggy L'Hoir (elementary and primary piano), David Klassen (senior and intermediate voice), Sarah Hall (junior and elementary voice), Ryan Purchase (brass, woodwinds, percussion), and Sonia Klimasko (strings, guitar). As always, we capped off the week with the Kinsmen Competition, and celebrated the 54th anniversary of this collaboration with the Kinsmen Club of Saskatoon. The evening had one instrumental competitor (Fraser Krips, percussion), two string players (Shion Tamashiro, violin; Amos Friesen, cello), three vocalists (Kelsey Ronn, Olivia Guselle, Angela Gjurichanin), and three pianists (Bronte Rawlings, Jerry Hu, Alice Li). Swift Current Music Festival March 1 - 2, 11 – 19 and April 16 – 17, 2019

The Swift Current Music Festival celebrated its 90th Anniversary this year. From 1929 to 1958, the festival was organized by the Orpheus Club, a music-oriented club comprised of teachers and interested persons. A list of past committee members from 1959 to 2004 was included in the printed festival program as part of recognizing when the 75th anniversary was celebrated, thanks to Janet Loeppky. Memorable adjudicators in '04 were Alexandra Munn, piano, and Howard Leyton-Brown, strings. Fifteen years later, the list is even longer. To those many dedicated volunteers who gave of their time and talents, to all the teachers, students and their parents, thank you for a successful ninety years. Tributes to the music festival from past performers and committee members are posted on the website, www.scmusicfestival.ca.

The Festival was spread out this year with six adjudicators for a total of ten days and eight workshops. To accommodate competitors and teachers, the festival proceeded with voice and musical theatre on March 1 - 2 (adjudicator Ron de Jager); elementary to senior piano March 11-12 (adjudicator Claire Seibold); choral March 12 (adjudicator Jennifer Lang); primary piano March 18 (adjudicator Gail Murray); school music, speech arts and guitar March 18 - 19 (adjudicator Lenora Bells); band and strings April 16 - 17 (adjudicator David Dick). I want to express my appreciation to Karen Klassen for sending such great adjudicators.

There were 276 entries with 946 entrants, thanks to the involvement of schools and bands. Some special entries this year were a percussion



bucket trio by three schoolteachers, Celia Hammerton, Amy Collins and Michaila Jersak; and two entries of traditional Japanese instruments – a Shakhachi, a bamboo flute, and a Koto, a harp. If you google these instruments, you will see how interesting they are!

Provincial recommendations went to Soye Ryu, piano; Justine Sletten, voice; Dylan Sletten, musical theatre; Prairie Spirit and SCCHS Chamber Singers, choral.

This was the fifth year for online entries and attempting to go completely digital. We are still experiencing some struggles with computer programs as the position of entry secretary keeps changing and it's a steep learning curve! Having our own website has been a huge improvement for keeping information current. A total of 61 volunteers banked approximately 1019 hours in covering all aspects of the festival. Many bouquets to this year's committee for another great festival: Chanella Thompson, Entry Secretary; Nancy Lake, Volunteers and Hosting; Bruce Pate, Donations; Theresa Soper, Treasurer; Elaine Derksen, Trophies; Alanna Howell, Website; Lois Noble, Provincial Correspondence. As for myself, in addition to my role as President, I covered Publicity, Facilities, and Scholarships. Special thanks go to Janet Loeppky-Mackay for publishing the festival program for the website and the printed program for the Xtravaganza Awards Program; and to Colette Andree for the special calligraphy on the scholarship certificates.

Part of the wonderful community support is the use of facilities such as the Art Gallery of Swift Current, Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church, Ecole Centennial School, All Saints Catholic School, and Central Elementary School. Our Platinum donors were the Kiwanis Club and CKSW Radio (in-kind); Gold donors were the ACT/UCT and Mrs. E. Gibbings, and thirty-two Silver and Friend donors which made it possible to secure 68 awards totalling \$5095. A special medallion award was presented to each solo and small ensemble entrant to mark the 90th Anniversary.

A freak April blizzard caused the Xtravaganza & Awards Program of April 28 to be postponed to May 5, which meant a lot of last minute changes for award winners and performers as well as special guests and reception cupcakes! The Art Gallery was still able to accommodate the program and an estimated seating of 80 swelled to around 120 which was very much appreciated. It was at this event that I announced my retirement from 26 years on the festival committee. It's time to pass the torch! Thank you everyone and best wishes.



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Financial Report

Our financial goal is, typically, a balanced budget and this year with increased expenses we are reporting an operating deficit of \$28,108 and \$31,138 overall deficit.

The Finance Committee consists of First Vice-President Tammy Villeneuve (Chair), President Sherry Sproule, Second Vice-President Jeri Ryba, Past President Karen Unger, and Executive Director Carol Donhauser. As members of the Finance Committee, we strive to oversee all financial matters in a manner that will promote the health and well-being of our Association and our programs/services. This includes preparing the annual budget as well as the budgets for specific events such as the Opera competition, Concerto competition, Provincial Finals, and Fall Conference. It involves responding to financial issues that arise, and presenting solutions to our Board.

Our financial goal is, typically, a balanced budget. After over 15 years of reporting a surplus, increased expenses and shortfalls in revenues find us reporting an operating deficit of \$28,108 and \$31,138 overall deficit. Several reasons contributed to this deficit. Revenues from the car raffle were deferred to align with the hosting of Nationals in August of 2019 and will be reported in 2019/2020. The artsVest grant, with its matching sponsorship revenues were not available this year. Provincial Finals were held in Moose Jaw, which increased our costs. Travel and meeting expenses increased due to non-centralized meeting locations Melfort, Sackville, (Shaunavon, NB). Administration increased slightly in office rent, cost-of-living salary increases for staff, and postage.

The SMFA investment portfolio, is managed by Leander Dueck of Beyond Wealth Management in Regina. Leander reports that during August 1, 2018 to July 31, 2019 "the rate of return was 2.71%. During the same period the Toronto Stock Exchange Index was 1.83%." As Leander often reports "Anytime we can exceed the

index it has to be considered a success." We value Leander's expertise and advice, and the balanced asset mix helps to decrease our risk during times of volatility. SMFA also holds 576 BCE shares, which have seen steady growth and quarterly interest payment received and accounted for in restricted income.

We realize the importance of providing our member festivals with monetary support through our Member Funding initiative and are pleased to report that \$10,000 was approved and distributed to several festivals for the third consecutive year.

SMFA is dependent on funding from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, and we are deeply grateful for this support. Annual Global Funding has been approved through to July 31, 2020. We acknowledge the support of SaskCulture Inc., SaskEnergy, SaskTel, SaskPower, the University of Saskatchewan and University of Regina Music Departments, Regina & Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras, and Mr. William Shurniak. We sincerely thank our many scholarship donors and patrons, and our 110th contributors to Anniversary Campaign. Music festivals continue to thrive in communities across this province because of your generous and ongoing support.

I wish to thank the Finance committee, and all Board members, and staff for their dedication and diligent work on behalf of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association and its membership.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (the Entity), which comprise the statement of financial position as at July 31, 2019 and the statements of operations, statement of changes in net assets and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In my opinion, except for the effects, if any, of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as at July 31, 2019 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many non-profit organizations, Saskatchewan Music Festival Association derives part of its revenue from membership fees, donations and other fundraising activities, the completeness and classification of which are not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly my verification of these transactions was limited to accounting for the amounts recorded in the records of the Association and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to the revenues, statement of operations, assets and net assets.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

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SASKATCHEWAN MUSIC FESTIVAL ASSOCIATION NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JULY 31, 2019

1. Status and nature of activities

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan. Under present legislation, no income taxes are payable on the reported income of such operations. The purpose of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is to provide a classical, competitive music festival system of the highest standard at the local, provincial and national levels.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided on a diminishing balance method over the assets' estimated useful lives as follows:

Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting.

Grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are received out of the net proceeds of lottery ticket sales in Saskatchewan. These grants have been recorded as revenue by Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as approved by Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreations. Accordingly, amounts received that relate to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred revenue.

Other revenue is recognized in the period in which the income is earned.

Management estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

8. Funds held in trust

Per the Association's by-laws in the event that a District Festival Association ceases operation or becomes inactive for a period of two consecutive years or more, all funds of that District Festival Association are to be transferred to the Provincial Association and be held in trust for a period of five years. If the District Festival Association is not reinstated within the five year period then the funds become the funds of the Provincial Association.

9. Lease commitment

A lease agreement exists with Niesner Properties Inc. for the premises known as 4623 Albert Street in Regina, Saskatchewan. A 3 year term commenced December 1, 2017 requiring a base monthly rent of \$960 plus GST for the first year and \$1,020 plus GST for years two and three. There is an option to renew for a further five years. The Association is also responsible for their portion of property taxes and operating costs.

10. Economic dependence

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association receives significant revenue in grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. As a result, the Association is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

11. Financial instruments

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association's exposure and concentrations at July 31, 2019:

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a party may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics that could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions, such that the organization could incur a financial loss. The Association is exposed to credit risk with respect to cash, investments and accounts receivable. The Association manages its credit risk by placing cash and investments with major financial institutions. Credit risk for accounts receivable is managed by the credit quality and diverse debtor base and creating an allowance for bad debts where applicable. There has been no change from credit risk exposure from 2018. Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association may not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due or not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The Association is exposed to liquidity risk with respect to its investments and accounts payable but manages its liquidity risk by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash. There has been no change from liquidity risk exposure from 2018. Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is a type of market risk that refers to the risk that the fair value of financial instruments or future cash flows associated with the instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Association is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to its cash and investments and its effect on interest income. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have a significant effect on cash and investments due to the fact that interest income is not a major percentage of total revenue. There has been no change from interest risk exposure from 2018.


