Spring is upon us with the sound of music and speech arts competitions winding up at the 49 festival units in this province. We have many celebrations planned this year.

Doris Covey Lazecki, Chair of the SMFA 100th Anniversary Celebrations has been very busy

planning the production of the Re-enactment of the May 1909 concert held in Regina. This historic concert will be held on Sunday, May 24, 2009 at St. Paul's Anglican Cathedral in Regina. Singers from across Saskatchewan will form the Centennial Choir. This gala event will honour the thousands of volunteers who have kept the festival movement alive for over the century.

The Ministry of Tourism, Parks, Culture and Sport is assisting SMFA in celebrating 100 years of festivals in our province by providing a grant of \$1200 to each of the 49 District Music Festivals, through the "Building Pride" program. These funds will allow each festival to host a commemorative gathering and to establish "Centennial Legacy" Scholarships. We are ever so grateful to the Ministry for this grant to SMFA.

Last year, 40 out of 49 festivals were represented at the Provincial Finals Competitions, providing a great opportunity for each of the competitors from across the province to showcase their talent. The 2009 Provincial Finals will be held in Regina from June 5 -7 at the University and the McKenzie Art Gallery. At this time the Saskatchewan Team will be chosen to represent our province at the National Music Festival Competitions. In addition, the Centennial Classes will take place on Friday evening in the Education Auditorium. We gratefully acknowledge SaskEnergy and SaskTel for their sponsorship and support.

Joanne Messer and Penny Joynt have preparations well underway for the National Music Festival to be held in Saskatoon, August 13 - 15, 2009. We are

looking forward to the help of many volunteers from around the province. Saskatoon is central in this province and it is my hope that everyone will consider attending this showcase of Canadian talent and cheer on our Saskatchewan participants.

On behalf of the SMFA I invite all 49 festival units to attend the Saskatchewan Music Conference that will be held in Regina, November 6 - 7, 2009. The theme is "Riding the Wave of Change" and we are encouraging delegates to dress in blue and white.

Past President Gloria Nickell and the Syllabus Committee have been working hard to complete another three-year (2010, 2011, 2012) Syllabus. The Syllabus is to be used in conjunction with the annual SMFA Directory.

Mark your calendars for these upcoming events: Sarah Vardy and Jordie Houghton, winners of the 2006 and 2008 Wallis Opera Competition respectively, will perform in the Regina Symphony Orchestra's *Messiah* on December 16 & 17, 2009, and Raymond Ko, winner of the 2007 Concerto Competition, will be the featured guest artist with RSO on January 23, 2010.

A special thank you goes out to the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation; SaskCulture, and the Saskatchewan Arts Board, who support and grant substantial funding to the Association for our programs.

On behalf of the SMFA Board of Directors I thank Executive Director, Carol Donhauser and assistant Sandra Kerr for their support of our many projects.

We hope everyone interested is able to join in the many events that are planned at the Provincial and District levels this year.


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Centennial Re-enactment Concert

One hundred years ago great excitement was in the air for the people of Saskatchewan. An organizational meeting had been held in Regina's City Hall on May 28, 1908 for the purpose of establishing a musical organization that would hold annual Competitive Music Festivals. We tend to think of Saskatchewan in 1909 as a south of bald prairie, a north of bush and water and in between a few settlements clustered near the railway lines which linked them to civilization. While all living conditions were primitive enough, the people were not. These very cultivated people from other parts of Canada, Great Britain, Europe or the United States brought with them their talents, their education, their skills, and their customs. And there were some professional musicians along with enthusiastic amateurs ready to enter the Provincial Festival too.

Sessions were held in Metropolitan and Knox churches and the first festival was a triumph! The newly formed Regina Orchestral Society directed by Frank Laubach was on hand to play the Overture and other numbers at each of the two evening programs. The last night, the orchestra was part of the "Ensemble Concert of Massed Choirs, Full Chorus and Orchestra". The Auditorium Rink was the only place large enough to accommodate the audience of 1500. The tiny eight-page program listed the following program – Overture from Tannhauser by Wagner, Festgesang by Mendelssohn and the May Queen, a Pastoral by Sterndale-Bennett. The massed choir consisted of singers from Indian Head, Saskatoon, Wolseley, Regina, Condie, Moose Jaw, and Prince Albert.

One hundred years later the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) is poised to present a Centennial Re-enactment Concert on May 24, 2009 at historic St. Paul's Anglican Cathedral, a heritage building of Regina, Sunday afternoon at 2:00 p.m. Singers from across Saskatchewan will form the Centennial Choir, under the direction of Robin Swales, accompanied by Alison Purdy (whose great-aunt was in the 1909 concert!). A commissioned work by Elizabeth Raum, *Festival Fanfare*, the *Overture from Tannhauser* by Wagner, and a pastoral by Sterndale-Bennett, the *May Queen*, will be performed by members of the Regina Symphony Orchestra, directed by Victor Sawa. Soloists for the *May Queen* will be Saskatchewan Music Festival alumni, Soprano Robyn Dreidger-Klassen (Victoria), Contralto Lisa Hornung (North Battleford), Tenor Michael Harris, and Bass-Baritone Garry Gable, (Saskatoon). The MC for this historic event is Dr. Lynda Haverstock, also a festival alumnus.

This gala event will honour the thousands of volunteers who have kept the festival flame alive over the past century. Our 49 Music Festival members will attend, as will many of our former presidents, honourary life members, and current and former provincial board members. Since our beginning, our distinguished patrons have traditionally been the Lieutenant-Governor, the Premier and the two University Presidents, and we hope they will all attend. A reception will be held at the Hotel Saskatchewan following the concert.

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
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Scholarships

A small number of classes have been deleted and several new classes have been incorporated. The SMFA Board Members, Committee Members, and various colleagues throughout the province have been very helpful in this process.

A major feature of this edition was the renumbering of classes in the entire book. I know this has not been done since the three-year syllabus was first initiated and should not have to be addressed again for many, many years. District Festivals may need to look at re-numbering their Addenda Classes. Provision has been made for more flexibility and should serve the syllabus needs well into the future.

A Workshop detailing the many Syllabus changes will be offered at the SMFA Fall Conference.

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Apparently, when I was an infant, my father predicted that I would be a singer! I don't know if I cried a lot or if I simply hummed tunes as an infant, but I do remember that growing up as a child I sang and whistled constantly while shipping along at the same time. My parents had a "pump"organ that they eventually replaced with a piano so that we could take lessons. Since there were no music teachers in our town I played "by ear" and also taught myself to read music, first picking out tunes with my right hand, and then incorporating the left hand (how proud I was of this!). I inherited a very good musical ear and perfect pitch from my father, his mother, and a greatareat-aunt.

My first experience at a music festival was in Fort Bu'Appelle while I was in my last year of High School.

Upon my graduation, I came to Regina to study piane, singing, theory, etc. at the Conservatory, where I eventually obtained my A.R.C.T. In Regina I entered vocal competitions at the music festival where I earned first-place awards -- Seprane A, opera, oratorio, concert, Lieder, as well as the Rose Bowl, the Justice Brown Shield, and the provincial Lieder Class. I also won the CRCK Kinsmen Scholarship Auditions top vocal award. It was because of these many awards that I made the decision to continue my studies in Europe, first at the University of Munich, Germany (where I received a Bavarian Government scholarship), and then in Milan, Italy (where my teacher gave me a bursary). While in Europe I did radio programs and concerts, and upon my return to Canada I sang in Toronto (opera, concerts, etc.), gave various performances in Saskatchewan, and in Regina did a CBC radio program and the Johnny Sandison "Night Mayer" TV program.

Then, in 1998, J returned to Regina to live fiere permanently. J wanted to "give back" something to the city and province that had given me so many opportunities, so a Bursary, in my name, was established at the University of Regina and the Conservatory which would assist talented singers. An Award in my name has also been set up through the Saskatchewan Music Festival, and this Award is presented to the ovcal representative going to the Nationals. J have also taught music and adjudicated, so my musical career has indeed come fall circle!

2009 SMFA CONCERTO COMPETITION

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is pleased to announce the continuation of the SMFA Concerto Competition, celebrating its 28th Biennial competition, in co-operation with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras.

Note: The competition will be held on November 14 in Regina. Each competitor will play a complete concerto. Final competition dates and times will be confirmed after the entry deadline (October 15, 2009). Information will be posted on the website www.smfa.ca after October 31.

The first place winner will appear as a guest artist with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras and receive a \$2,000.00 scholarship. Second and third place scholarships of \$750.00 and \$500.00 will also be awarded.

Regulations:

- ✓ age restrictions are as of December 31, 2008 minimum of 14 years of age
- maximum of 30 years of age
- ✓ eligibility
 - · previous first place winners are not eligible to enter
 - competition open to musicians of amateur status who have previously competed in the National Class or a Senior class in the same discipline of a district member festival of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association
 - must have a valid Saskatchewan Health Card (number required) if studying in another province OR must be a resident student of a resident Saskatchewan teacher
- ✓ a \$75.00 (non-refundable) fee is required
- ✓ all solo instrumental categories will be considered
- ✓ instrumentalists must perform a complete concerto from the standard concerto repertoire
- competitors must provide their own accompanist and page turner
- ✓ competitors are responsible for their own expenses
- ✓ competitors must perform from memory

- photocopied copyright music will not be accepted; failure to comply will result in disqualification
- competitors must provide 2 original scores of music, containing solo and accompaniment, for the judges; the accompanist must perform from another original score; competitors must also number the first bar of each line in their scores
- competitors are encouraged to supply extra copies of their music for the judges' convenience whenever possible
- 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners will be announced following the competition
- the judges' decision is final
- entry must be received by October 15, 2009. Entry form may be sent to our office by fax, mail, or e-mail. If by mail, it must be post marked by October 15.
- Iate entries will not be accepted
- entry fee must be received within a week of the entry deadline

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Let"sDo Lunch

Innovative Ideas from Local Festivals

Local music festivals have wound up for another year. For most of us it was a week where we enjoyed talented performers, expert adjudicators, beautiful music, and ... good food! At many of our festivals lunch means a quick trip to the local restaurants to sample the delicious local cuisine. Other festivals come up with other ideas for lunch, either because they do not have local restaurant options, or because they want to give local groups the opportunity to fundraise for their organization.

Last Mountain Music Festival asks the church ladies in town if they would like to cater. This year, two churches took part. They provided a menu for dinner and supper, as well as snacks for the breaks, and were pleased at how much money they brought in for their church.

Sask Valley Music Festival also often asks local church ladies' groups if they would be interested in hosting lunches for festival week. They then prepare or ask others to donate food, for which they charge a nominal fee.

Quill Plains Music Festival contacted some local clubs, such as the swimming pool, 4-H club, and grade five travel club, about providing a soup & sandwich lunch at the main venue as a fundraiser for their groups. The groups that did the lunches were responsible for their own local advertising, but were also included in the program. Quill Plains found a better response from the public this year by only offering this lunch two days instead of four.

At **Lafleche Music Festival**, both of the local restaurants put on lunch and supper specials specifically for festival week participants. Also, the festival is held in the United Church, and two days during festival week, the United Church ladies put on lunches downstairs in the church

for anyone (festival or otherwise) who wants to attend. This is done as a church fundraiser, and the committee is glad to have them do this since they do not charge the festival anything for the use of the church.

The **Twin Rivers Music Festival** found that planning lunch for the public was difficult due to the difficulty in predicting how many would stay. Instead, they have a soup and bun lunches for the adjudicator and the festival committee. The soup is donated and served by volunteers, and the buns are donated by local bakeries. Festival participants all look forward to purchasing monster cookies (50 cents each) in the lobby of the church after they have finished performing.

The Music Booster parent organization and the School Community Council run daily canteens during Potashville Music Festival. They provide coffee, tea, water, juice and nutritious snacks. The adjudicators are given "meal vouchers" to use at local restaurants. The festival lists all of the restaurants in Esterhazy on a sheet, along with their allotment for meal prices. They also provide a package of restaurant menus for the adjudicators to peruse. Adjudicators then take a voucher with them for their meal, circle the meal they have had, sign the voucher and leave it at the restaurant. At the completion of their festival, the treasurer goes to each restaurant and pays the bill. They have had positive feedback from many adjudicators about this meal plan.

On-site meals and coffee breaks at **Kipling Music Festival**, which celebrated its 55th anniversary in 2009, was initially a fundraising venture by the Kipling Library Board. When the Library Board discontinued this fundraiser a few years ago, the Music Festival Association decided that keeping the project themselves would help cover the rising costs of running their festival. The menu is simple: homemade soup, sandwiches and a variety of desserts. Muffins and fresh fruit are sometimes available as well.





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In recent years, some of the Dads have concocted some impressive desserts; people have been known to hide a portion of dessert before it all disappears! Thanks to the generosity of those who donate food and time to work in the kitchen, profits are usually around \$400.00 for the week.

Hafford & District Music Festival has its venues in the Hafford School, where there is a wonderful Home Ec. person (who is also on the Festival Committee). She runs regular lunch programs on a daily basis, but during Festival week she goes all out and provides hot lunches for people who wish to stay. There is a sign up sheet and there is a different menu every day, such as hamburger soup and egg salad sandwiches on one day, spaghetti with meat sauce, caesar salad, and garlic bread on another, etc. This is a fund raiser for the school and provides a great option for festival attendees.

Whatever the reason for serving lunch at the festival venue, there are many benefits beyond the convenience and fundraising. As Nancy Toppings of Kipling puts it, "Lunches and coffee breaks on-site provide an opportunity for social time and relaxing between sessions. Audience members often use this time to chat with performers and give them encouragement. Performers have the opportunity to get to know one another during the breaks. Children of all ages look forward to their snacks!"

So, in whatever way it works best for your local festival, let's do lunch!

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Hiring Adjudicators for our Saskatchewan Festivals



After the festivals have sent in their Adjudicator Time-Frame Form (before the end of June each year) and included their wish list (and their "not" wish list) the task of hiring adjudicators for the next festival season can begin. In Saskatchewan, unlike our sister provinces, all the adjudicators are hired

by the Adjudicator Liaison from the provincial office. Over the years this has proven to be an excellent way to hire professional musicians for our festivals. This system ensures that local festival committees have an "arms length" relationship with the adjudicators coming to their festival.

The Provincial Office of SMFA has an extensive data base of adjudicators who work for your festivals. This list is constantly changing, and expanding. The criteria for an adjudicator at a Saskatchewan Music Festival as written by our Mossie Hancock in <u>"Music for One...Music for All"</u> follows:


- We expect competence in at least one area: voice, piano, strings, wind instruments. For general adjudicating we should expect only a good general background with emphasis on musicianship in the adjudications.
- 2. Constructive criticism. Fault-finding without giving help is useless and even damaging.
- We have the right to expect kindness and common courtesy. Under no circumstances should any performer suffer humiliation in an adjudication. Any adjudicator guilty of such behaviour should be reported to Provincial Office.
- 4. Someone who can keep to a reasonable time-table, but is not to be blamed if adequate time has not been provided.
- 5. Consistent marking, using the marking system provided by SMFA. If adjudicators mark lower at the beginning of a festival than

they do at the end, it shows up when scholarships are to be awarded.

- 6. A clear voice that is used to speak to the audience as well as the competitors in the front row. A microphone may be provided for smaller voices.
- 7. The adjudicator is not expected to be an entertainer (although some of them are) but should make an attempt to include the audience in speaking; people attend to hear adjudications as well as performances.
- 8. Appropriate dress. Ideally someone who looks professional without being overdressed, and has a sense of humour and a smile.

A few thoughts for your June meeting – please get comments from the local music teachers regarding the adjudicators you have just heard in your local festivals. These comments will help in preparing the **Adjudicator Evaluation Form**. These comments should represent a group opinion from your festival meeting, not just one person's opinion.



Meagan Milatz is presently 15 years old and receives piano instruction from teacher Cherith Alexander. Meagan received her ARCT in 2005 at the age of 12. In June 2007, Meagan competed in the Canadian Music Competition which was held in Sherbrooke, Quebec. She won first

place in her age group and was asked to come back to perform Prokofiev's Concerto No. 1 in the Gala concert with the Sherbrooke Symphony Orchestra. In August of 2007, Meagan represented Saskatchewan at the National Music Festival which was held in Moncton, New Brunswick. In June 2008. she was recommended on to the provincial level of Nationals from the Weyburn Music Festival. named Meagan has twice been Most Outstanding Intermediate Piano Performer at the Provincial Music Festival. The first time she won this award she was only 11 years old.

In July of 2008, Meagan attended the Morningside Music Bridge program at Mount Royal College in Calgary, AB.
