History of the SMFA

The Association, envisaged and organized as a provincial body in 1908, was highly successful in achieving its objective; to unite musical societies, individual musicians or groups in Saskatchewan, into one organization for the purpose of holding annual music festivals. But the size of Saskatchewan (about that of Texas), along with its expanding population and transportation system, made District Festivals inevitable, with Unity being the first in 1926.

The SMFA is very proud of its place in history as one of the province's oldest cultural organizations. Its structures and programs have been followed throughout Canada. Inspired by Governor General Earl Grey's vision of a Dominion-wide festival, with support from Fred Chisholm and Frank Laubach, all Saskatchewan musical groups were invited to the first Provincial Festival in 1909, in Regina. The annual festival moved to Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw, and then continued the rotation. Excellent railway service allowed participants, including large ensembles, to come from all parts of the province. Expansion of District Festivals continued until there were fifty-one in 2002, including one fully bilingual event at Gravelbourg. Today, there are 47 affiliated District Festivals.

The Concerto Competition (1979) and the Gordon Wallis Opera Competition (2000), administered by the SMFA, are held in alternating years. In addition to cash prizes, the winners are featured as guest soloists with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras. With the increased popularity of Musical Theatre, SMFA established a biennial competition in 2020, held parallel to the Opera Competition.

In 2009, the SMFA celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the first Provincial Festival with a Centennial Reenactment Concert held in Regina. In addition, special Centennial classes were heard at the SMFA Provincial Finals, and the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals AGM/Conference and National Music Festival Competitions were held in Saskatoon. SMFA also hosted the FCMF National Convention in 2019 at the University of Saskatchewan. It was a moment of great pride when Saskatchewan competitor, soprano Emma Johnson, was chosen as the Grand Award winner.

At the annual Fall Conference in 2019, SMFA celebrated 110 years! Delegates at this conference were unaware of what was to come with the cancellation of most festivals in the 2020 season due to the threat

of the COVID-19 Global Pandemic. The past 3 ½ years have been very challenging. We can proudly report that the organization worked together to deliver many safe and successful District Festivals in 2021 and 2022, with a return to live Provincial Finals in 2022. We have survived, adapted and are stronger as a result of this challenge.



Cultural Impact Statement

In 1905, Saskatchewan became a province. Since 1908, the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) has grown with our province, always in step, always in tune. The SMFA reaches out to people of all ages and all backgrounds across the province of Saskatchewan.

Our mandate, which is "promoting excellence in music and speech through competition, performance, and educational opportunities for people of Saskatchewan", requires us to work closely with the many people who come together to keep the festival movement in Saskatchewan alive and well. These people include music and speech students, teachers, parents, volunteers, donors and audiences. There are 47 annual festivals across the province, therefore the impact that is created in all these 47 festivals and surrounding areas is significant.

These communities have embraced the festival concept because it provides:

- an element of educational growth as well as entertainment that brings their community together
- the opportunity for communities to acknowledge and support the success and endeavours of their young people
- encouragement for students to set goals and showcase their abilities while receiving constructive adjudication from professional musicians
- local volunteers an opportunity to be involved with young people in their community in a positive way
- participating students with the performance opportunity to develop confidence and selfdiscipline while demonstrating positive role models for their peers

Since its early days, the Association has provided competitive and non-competitive classes for not only solo and individual competitors, but for community and schools in choruses, bands and orchestras. SMFA's continued expansion encouraged the formation of other provincial music organizations. Saskatchewan was not only the first to form a Provincial Music Festival Association, but also the first to use a common syllabus for all its member festivals. The use of the common syllabus assures that a high standard is maintained.

SMFA partners with the other music organizations across Saskatchewan to ensure that the programs we develop are relevant to the needs of our young people. Accessibility to programs and recognizing changing demographic circumstances within the province is a high priority. The broad-based volunteer component of SMFA allows the organization to operate at the grass roots level, thereby closely monitoring these changes and adapting to them. Every attempt is made to ensure that the experience attained by participants is beneficial and works in concert with the SMFA vision: *"enhancing lives and community through music and the spoken word"*.

SMFA believes that the need for a culturally aware society is of increasing importance given the pressures exerted upon us by the rapid, electronic environment in which we live. Our organization is committed to cultivating that awareness by providing information, education, opportunity and a clear vision of the role we play in this task.



President's Report

SMFA programs reach lands covered by Treaties 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 10, the traditional lands of the Cree, Dakota, Dene, Lakota, Nakota and Saulteaux peoples, as well as homeland of the Métis. We acknowledge all the many First Nations, Métis, and Inuit whose footsteps have marked these lands for centuries.



We started the 2022-2023 year with the Fall Conference and AGM, which saw forty-two delegates from twenty-four of the forty-seven affiliated District Music Festivals gather at the Zion United Church in Moose Jaw. Three new directors, Heather Macnab (Maple Creek Music Festival), Penny Miles (Mainline Music Festival) and Karen Frandsen (Regina Music Festival), joined the SMFA Board of Directors.

The 35th SMFA Concerto Competition was held at the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon on February 26, 2023 and was won by Saskatoon pianist Alice Li. We look forward to seeing Alice perform with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras in an upcoming season.

Throughout March to May, forty-three of the forty-seven District Festivals were held across the province with over \$186,000 awarded in prizes. Volunteers spent over 20,000 hours delivering these festivals and 109 adjudicators were hired by the Provincial Office to provide their expertise.

On June 1 to 4, 450 performances by winners from District Music Festivals across Saskatchewan were heard at the Conservatory of Performing Arts in Regina. What a great achievement for so many of our young music students! The 2nd Annual Canada West Performing Arts Festival, in partnership with Alberta Music Festival and Performing Arts BC, was hosted by Alberta Music Festival on July 21-22, 2023 in Allard Hall at the downtown Edmonton MacEwan University campus. Over 140 entries competed for \$34,000 in prizes.

In addition to all of the programming, SMFA Board of Directors continued to meet via Zoom in order to achieve our strategic goals. Keeping SMFA relevant and increasing participation is our main goal for which we continue to strive.

I have enjoyed serving as President of the SMFA and would like to thank the SMFA Board of Directors for their work as well as our staff Nancy Toppings, Mariel Unger, Kari Mitchell and Carol Donhauser.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association gratefully acknowledges funding received through the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation.

The SMFA Board would also like to thank the many stakeholders that support festivals in our province. We are grateful to see the past few years of pandemic life leave us, as we embrace the unprecedented changes and new challenges in the year to come.

Executive Director's Report

Festivals are a celebration of culture and community and hold a significant place in human society serving as a platform for indivduals to come together and celebrate various aspects of culture.

Beyond their cultural significance, festivals also play a pivotal role in connecting individuals and fostering a sense of community. They create spaces for people to interact, exchange ideas, and build new relationships. In a world that often seems disconnected and fragmented, festivals provide a platform for individuals to come together and celebrate joy, creativity, and togetherness. SMFA festivals have been entertaining, connecting communities and building relationships for over a century.

We continue to recover from the past two years with several of our festivals teetering on dissolution. The good news is that 43 of our 47 affiliated District Festivals hosted festivals in 2023. This is an increase of 9 from our 34 festivals in 2022. We are still rooting for those festivals who have not returned to normal operations.

Saskatchewan has been recognized as the province with the highest per capita rate of volunteerism for several years in a row – higher than the national average. Our volunteers are the backbone of the cultural sector and help many non-profits accomplish some of the most innovative, not to mention cost-effective, community programming in the country.

Bravo, to our SMFA volunteers! Your commitment and dedication is simply amazing.

I would like to thank the SMFA staff; Nancy, Mariel, and Kari who worked hard under some pretty tight deadlines. Provincial Finals is one program that we have little time to prepare for, and I appreciate the efforts that are extended during those few short weeks.

We are very fortunate to have stable operational funding, through the Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, dedicated stakeholders, generous supporters and our corporate sponsors like SaskTel and SaskMusic. These sources of funding enable SMFA to deliver programs and services to the people of Saskatchewan.

This year marked 20 years since I joined SMFA as Assistant to Doris Lazecki. Thank you to the SMFA Board of Directors for putting your trust in me as we work together on the SMFA mission of providing performance and educational opportunities through our network of festivals. Let's continue "Celebrating the Joy of Youth Performance".

Chelsea Mahan and **Olivia Adams** were recipients of the Adjudicating Excellence Awards based the evaluations submitted by the District Festivals. A provincial scholarship of \$300 will be presented at the 2023 Provincial Final Competitions (June 1 - 4, 2023 in Regina) in honour of their outstanding work.

2022 AGM Minutes

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association, Annual General Meeting, Zion United Church 423 Main Street North, Moose Jaw, SK November 19, 2022 @ 10:00am

Tammy Villeneuve, President, welcomed everyone to the 2022 Saskatchewan Music Festival Association Annual General Meeting and appointed Carol Donhauser as recording secretary.

The roll call was conducted by Sherry Sproule. Representatives from 24 District Festivals were present: Battlefords, Borderland, Estevan, Gravelbourg, Humboldt, Kindersley, Kipling, Lafleche, Lanigan, Mainline, Maple Creek, Meadow Lake, Melfort, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Quill Plains, Regina, Rosetown, Sask Valley, Saskatoon, Twin Rivers, Watrous, Weyburn and Yorkton. Not attending were Assiniboia, Biggar, Carnduff, Central Sask, Eston, Hafford, La Ronge, Last Mountain, Lloydminster, Moosomin, Nipawin, Outlook, Parkland, Potashville, Prairie Sunset, Qu'Appelle Valley, Redvers, Sand Hills, Shaunavon, Spiritwood, Swift Current, Unity, and Vanguard.

Tammy recognized that SMFA programs reach lands covered by Treaties 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 10, the traditional lands of the Cree, Dakota, Dene, Lakota, Nakota and Saulteaux peoples, as well as homeland of the Métis.

The meeting was called to order at 10:05 am.

Delegates enjoyed the singing of *O Canada* followed by a moment of silence in memory of volunteers and committee members departed.

Motion: To approve the agenda. Krista Brost/Jean Fetsch CARRIED Sherry Sproule announced three board positions (1 one-year, 2 three-year) to be filled: Heather Macnab (Maple Creek), and Penny Miles (Mainline) have been nominated for the three-year positions and Karen Frandsen (Regina) for the one-year position. Sherry called for further nominations from the floor. None were forthcoming.

The minutes of the 2021 AGM as recorded in the Annual Report were presented.

Motion: That the minutes be approved. Yvonne Sutherland/Penny Miles CARRIED

Business Arising

Finance Chair, Jeri Ryba, presented a summary of the Investment Report.

The total market value of the funds managed by Beyond Wealth is \$431,651.75 as of July 31, 2022. For the period of August 1, 2021 ending July 31,2022, the rate of return was -3.10%. During the same period, the Canadian Balanced Portfolio Benchmark was -7.52%. The priority for the portfolio has been to reduce volatility by investing in multiple asset classes. SMFA portfolio contains approximately 27% Canadian Equity, 25% US equity, 11% International Equity, 24% fixed income, and 10% Real Estate. We diversify the portfolio in these asset classes to limit the volatility over complete business cycles, not just over 1-year periods.

The SMFA also owns 375 BCE shares valued at \$37,267.



Financial Statement Presentation

Statement of Financial Position (Page 70)

The statement of financial position reports on the total assets, liabilities and net assets of the Association. Cash has decreased mainly due to first payment for the 2022/23 year from Saskatchewan Lotteries was not received early like the prior year and the deficiency of revenue over expenditures. Prepaids include a deposit placed on the new office. Assets held in trust have decreased due to a decrease in the markets. Deferred revenue has decreased over prior year due to not having received the 2022/23 funding early and having no deferred affiliation fees. Funds held in trust are the funds for the Mainline Music Festival that closed during the 2016/17 year. These funds will need to be held in trust for 5 years. Total assets for the July 31, 2022 year are \$704,204; total liabilities are \$113,854; and the net assets are \$590,350.

Statement of Operations (or statement of loss) (Page 71)

The statement of operations reflects the revenue and expenditures from the day to day activities of the Association. Revenue has decreased from the prior year due to several factors. The biggest factor is the market decrease in the investments. The Association received approximately \$38,000 in a wage subsidy from the Canada Revenue Agency in 2021 that was not received in 2022. This was offset with the receipt of affiliation fees in the amount of \$36,082. The new Canada West Performing Arts Festival brought in income of \$45,935. Total expenses have increased. The majority of the increases over last year come in the program expenditure category. The costs of the Canada West Performing Arts Festival were \$53,133. Program enhancement was the project headed by Lenora Bells in the amount of \$21,154. In 2022 we were able to have a larger provincial finals competition which led to increased costs over the prior year.

Statement of Changes in Net Assets (Page 72) The statement of changes in net assets shows the changes during the year for the various categories of net assets.

Cash Flow Statement (Page 73)

The cash flow statement shows how changes in the statement of financial position accounts and statement of operations affect cash and breaks the analysis down to operating, investing, and financing activities. It outlines the flow of cash in and out of the Association.

Notes and schedules to the financial

statements (Pages 74 to 80) The notes are additional information added to the end of the financial statements. The notes help explain specific items in the statements as well as provide a more comprehensive assessment of the Association's financial condition.

The schedules are also additional information which provide a more detailed breakdown of the revenue and expenditure items presented in the statement of operations.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association's Concerto Competition is held in conjunction with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras. Originally an annual event, the competition is now held every two years, alternating between Saskatoon and Regina.

The 35th SMFA Concerto Competition was held at the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon on February 26, 2023 and was won by Saskatoon pianist Alice Li, with her performance of Chopin's Piano Concerto in e minor, Op. 11. She was accompanied by Sofia Mycyk. Alice received the first prize of \$2,000 and the opportunity to be a featured soloist in an upcoming season with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras.

Alice Li, 22, is a Saskatoon-based pianist and a recent Bachelor of Science (Honours) in

Psychology graduate from the University of Saskatchewan, where she studied under the George and Marsha Ivany President's Scholarship. Alice is the recipient of numerous accolades at provincial and national levels. She holds an ARCT diploma (Piano Performance) from the Royal Conservatory of Music and has worked as the collaborative pianist for the Saskatoon Strings since 2016. Alice has performed in masterclasses for artists such as Jan Lisiecki, John Perry, Janina Fialkowska and Ian Parker. Five young musicians competed in the competition. Connor Elias, pianist, placed second and Brandon Johnson, violinist, placed third. The competition was judged by Darryl Friesen of Winnipeg, MB and Maria Medlow, Calgary, AB.

Testimonial – Vanessa Klassen, DMA

It all begins with a supportive community that recognizes the value of music. It takes a village to raise a child, and for me, my village included my supportive family, teachers, collaborative pianists, and the countless volunteers who keep Saskatchewan's music festivals running.



At eleven years old, I participated in my very first music festival in my hometown of Kindersley. I had been playing the clarinet for a year and a half at that point, and I already loved it. I still remember working hard to learn my pieces for the festival. I loved the feeling of making my teacher proud as my hard work paid off and I took home my first win!

I was eager to participate each year after that, and I did for eleven years in total. I was never very athletic or into sports, so music was my outlet. Among many things, music taught me the importance of a good work ethic, and it also showed me the beauty of collaborating with others. I would often perform in church and at Kindersley's annual Christmas Carol Festival. I loved connecting with my band friends from across the province when I competed at Provincials or participated in honour bands. The keen interest in music I had from a young age combined with the fantastic, encouraging teachers of a supportive community created the perfect storm for me to pursue music in the long run.

While attending Brandon University for my bachelor's degree, I participated in the Brandon Festival of the Arts. I was surprised to discover that the wind instrument

portion of the festival mostly consisted of a few university student participants, with maybe one high school-age participant and no middle school-age participants. A larger city in Manitoba didn't have the same musical culture that I grew up with in Kindersley where many students took private lessons, and all band students were encouraged to participate in the music festival. I then realized it was quite remarkable to have grown up in a small community so supportive of the local music festival, not to mention the top-notch, supportive teachers that we had in Kindersley, such as Steve Mealey, Colleen Oscar-Swan, Helen Barclay, Clayton Braybrook, and Laura Ewson, to name a few.

I was recommended to Nationals on two occasions: the first as a member of a clarinet quartet representing the province of Manitoba, and the second as the woodwind representative of Saskatchewan. Team Saskatchewan always had the best support! James Campbell—one of Canada's top clarinettists—had adjudicated the year I competed at nationals in Edmonton. He recently remarked to me again that you could always tell when someone from Saskatchewan was competing; the room was full of enthusiastic families and fellow teammates cheering on the performer! There's just something about the team spirit of Saskatchewan that you can't get anywhere else!



Music took me places I never thought I would go. After completing my bachelor's degree at Brandon University where I studied with Dr. Cathy Wood, I received a fellowship to study at The Ohio State University with Dr. Caroline Hartig. I earned both my master's degree and my doctorate at Ohio State. After five years of graduate studies in the States, I moved back home to Saskatchewan to continue the legacy my teachers passed on to me. Last year I found myself in the teacher's seat as I encouraged and supported my own students competing in the Kindersley and District Music Festival. It brings me so much joy to see my students flourish and experience music for the first time just as I did many years ago.

As I write this, I am preparing for my first concert with the Regina Symphony Orchestra as Assistant Principal Clarinet. I am looking forward to also building a music studio in Regina, to continue cultivating a love and legacy of music in my home province. It all begins with a supportive community that recognizes the value of music. It takes a village to raise a child, and for me, my village included my supportive family, teachers, collaborative pianists, and the countless volunteers who keep Saskatchewan's music festivals running.

I couldn't be more proud to be back in the province that helped cultivate my own love for music. Music is about bringing people together from all walks of life, and I am happy to continue being a part of that!







A Testimonial for Our Time

These words are taken from a welcome address to freshman parents at Boston Conservatory, given by Karl Paulnack, pianist and retired director of the Boston Conservatory's Music Division and Dean of the School of Music at Ithaca College. Paulnack is a nationally recognized speaker, writer, workshop facilitator and thought leader on the Power of Music.

"One of my parents' deepest fears, I suspect, is that society would not properly value me as a musician, that I wouldn't be appreciated. I had very good grades in high school, I was good in science and math, and they imagined that as a doctor or a research chemist or an engineer, I might be more appreciated than I would be as a musician. I still remember my mother's remark when I announced my decision to apply to music school – she said

"you're WASTING your SAT scores". On some level, I think, my parents were not sure themselves what the value of music was, what its purpose was. And they LOVED music, they listened to classical music all the time. They just weren't really clear about its function. So let me talk about that a little bit, because we live in a society that puts music in the "arts and entertainment" section of the newspaper, and serious music, the kind your kids are about to engage in, has absolutely nothing whatsoever to do with entertainment, in fact it's the opposite of entertainment. Let me talk a little bit about music, and how it works.

The first people to understand how music really works were the ancient Greeks. And this is going to fascinate you; the Greeks said that music and astronomy were two sides of the same coin. Astronomy was seen as the study of relationships between observable, permanent, external objects, and music was seen as the study of relationships between invisible, internal, hidden objects. Music has a way of finding the big, invisible moving pieces inside our hearts and souls and helping us figure out the position of things inside us. Let me give you some examples of how this works.

One of the most profound musical compositions of all time is the Quartet for the End of Time written by French composer Olivier Messiaen in 1940. Messiaen was 31 years old when France entered the war against Nazi Germany. He was captured by the Germans in June of 1940, sent across Germany in a cattle car and imprisoned in a concentration camp. He was fortunate to find a sympathetic prison guard who gave him paper and a place to compose. There were three other musicians in the camp, a cellist, a violinist, and a clarinetist, and Messiaen wrote his quartet with these specific players in mind. It was performed in January 1941 for four thousand prisoners and guards in the prison camp. Today it is one of the most famous masterworks in the repertoire.

Given what we have since learned about life in the concentration camps, why would anyone in his right mind waste time and energy writing or playing music? There was barely enough energy on a good day to find food and water, to avoid a beating, to stay warm, to escape torture - why would anyone bother with music? And yet - from the camps, we have poetry, we have music, we have visual art; it wasn't just this one

fanatic Messiaen; many, many people created art.

Why? Well, in a place where people are only focused on survival, on the bare necessities, the obvious conclusion is that art must be, somehow, essential for life. The camps were without money, without hope, without commerce, without recreation, without basic respect, but they were not without art. Art is part of survival; art is part of the human spirit, an unquenchable expression of who we are. Art is one of the ways in which we say, "I am alive, and my life has meaning."

On September 12, 2001 I was a resident of Manhattan. That morning I reached a new understanding of my art and its relationship to the world. I sat down at the piano that morning at 10 AM to practice as was my daily routine; I did it by force of habit, without thinking about it. I lifted the cover on the keyboard, and opened my music, and put my hands on the keys and took my hands off the keys. And I sat there and thought, does this even matter? Isn't this completely irrelevant? Playing the piano right now, given what happened in this city yesterday, seems silly, absurd, irreverent, pointless. Why am I here? What place has a musician in this moment in time? Who needs a piano player right now? I was completely lost.

And then I, along with the rest of New York, went through the journey of getting through that week. I did not play the piano that day, and in fact I contemplated briefly whether I would ever want to play the piano again. And then I observed how we got through the day. At least in my neighborhood, we didn't shoot hoops or play Scrabble. We didn't play cards to pass the time, we didn't watch TV, we didn't shop, we most certainly did not go to the mall. The first organized activity that I saw in New York, that same day, was singing. People sang. People sang around fire houses, people sang "We Shall Overcome". Lots of people sang America the Beautiful. The first organized public event that I remember was the Brahms Requiem, later that week, at Lincoln Center, with the New York Philharmonic.

The first organized public expression of grief, our first communal response to that historic event, was a concert. That was the beginning of a sense that life might go on. The US Military secured the airspace, but recovery was led by the arts, and by music in particular, that very night.

From these two experiences, I have come to understand that music is not part of "arts and entertainment" as the newspaper section would have us believe. It's not a luxury, a lavish thing that we fund from leftovers of our budgets, not a plaything or an amusement or a pastime. Music is a basic need of human survival. Music is one of the ways we make sense of our lives, one of the ways in which we express feelings when we have no words, a way for us to understand things with our hearts when we can't with our minds.

Some of you may know Samuel Barber's heart wrenchingly beautiful piece *Adagio for Strings*. If you don't know it by that name, then some of you may know it as the background music which accompanied the Oliver Stone movie, *Platoon*, a film about the Vietnam War. If you know that piece of music either way, you know it has the ability to crack your heart open like a walnut; it can make you cry over sadness you didn't know you had. Music can slip beneath our conscious reality to get at what's really



going on inside us the way a good therapist does.

I bet that you have never been to a wedding where there was absolutely no music. There might have been only a little music, there might have been some really bad music, but I bet you there was some music. And something very predictable happens at weddings - people get all pent up with all kinds of emotions, and then there's some musical moment where the action of the wedding stops and someone sings or plays the flute or something. And even if the music is lame, even if the quality isn't good, predictably 30 or 40 percent of the people who are going to cry at a wedding, cry a couple of moments after the music starts.

Why? The Greeks.

Music allows us to move around those big invisible pieces of ourselves and rearrange our insides so that we can express what we feel even when we can't talk about it. Can you imagine watching *Indiana Jones* or *Superman* or *Star Wars* with the dialogue but no music? What is it about the music swelling up at just the right moment in *ET* so that all the softies in the audience start crying at exactly the same moment? I guarantee you if you showed the movie with the music stripped out, it wouldn't happen that way.

The Greeks: Music is the understanding of the relationship between invisible internal objects.

I'll give you one more example, the story of the most important concert of my life. I must tell you I have played a little less than a thousand concerts in my life so far. I have played in places that I thought were important. I like playing in Carnegie Hall; I enjoyed playing in Paris; it made me very happy to please the critics in St. Petersburg. I have played for people I thought were important; music critics of major newspapers, foreign heads of state. The most important concert of my entire life took place in a nursing home in Fargo, ND, about 4 years ago.

I was playing with a very dear friend of mine who is a violinist. We began, as we often do, with Aaron Copland's Sonata, which was written during World War II and dedicated to a young friend of Copland's, a young pilot who was shot down during the war. Now we often talk to our audiences about the pieces we are going to play rather than providing them with written program notes. But in this case, because we began the concert with this piece, we decided to talk about the piece later in the program and to just come out and play the music without explanation. Midway through the piece, an elderly man seated in a wheelchair near the front of the concert hall began to weep. This man, whom I later met, was clearly a soldier - even in his 70s, it was clear from his buzz-cut hair, square jaw and general demeanor that he had spent a good deal of his life in the military. I thought it a little bit odd that someone would be moved to tears by that particular movement of that particular piece, but it wasn't the first time I've heard crying in a concert and we went on with the concert and finished the piece.

When we came out to play the next piece on the program, we decided to talk about both the first and second pieces, and we described the circumstances in which the Copland was written and mentioned its dedication to a downed pilot. The man in the front of the audience became so disturbed that he had to leave the auditorium. I honestly figured that we would not see him again, but he did come backstage afterwards, tears and all, to explain himself.



What he told us was this: "During World War II, I was a pilot, and I was in an aerial combat situation where one of my team's planes was hit. I watched my friend bail out, and watched his parachute open, but the Japanese planes which had engaged us returned and machine gunned across the parachute chords so as to separate the parachute from the pilot, and I watched my friend drop away into the ocean, realizing that he was lost. I have not thought about this for many years, but during that first piece of music you played, this memory returned to me so vividly that it was as though I was reliving it. I didn't understand why this was happening, why now, but then when you came out to explain that this piece of music was written to commemorate a lost pilot, it was a little more than I could handle. How does the music do that? How did it find those feelings and those memories in me?"

Remember the Greeks: music is the study of invisible relationships between internal objects. This concert in Fargo was the most important work I have ever done. For me to play for this old soldier and help him connect, somehow, with Aaron Copland, and to connect their memories of their lost friends, to help him remember and mourn his friend, this is my work. This is why music matters.

What follows is part of the talk I will give to this year's freshman class when I welcome them a few days from now. The responsibility I will charge your sons and daughters with is this:

"If we were a medical school, and you were here as a med student practicing appendectomies, you'd take your work very seriously because you would imagine that some night at two AM someone is going to waltz into your emergency room and you're going to have to save their life.

Well, my friends, someday at 8 PM someone is going to walk into your concert hall and bring you a mind that is confused, a heart that is overwhelmed, a soul that is weary. Whether they go out whole again will depend partly on how well you do your craft.

You're not here to become an entertainer, and you don't have to sell yourself. The truth is you don't have anything to sell; being a musician isn't about dispensing a product, like selling used Chevies. I'm not an entertainer; I'm a lot closer to a paramedic, a firefighter, a rescue worker. You're here to become a sort of therapist for the human soul, a spiritual version of a chiropractor, physical therapist, someone who works with our insides to see if they get things to line up, to see if we can come into harmony with ourselves and be healthy and happy and well.

Frankly, ladies and gentlemen, I expect you not only to master music; I expect you to save the planet. If there is a future wave of wellness on this planet, of harmony, of peace, of an end to war, of mutual understanding, of equality, of fairness, I don't expect it will come from a government, a military force or a corporation. I no longer even expect it to come from the religions of the world, which together seem to have brought us as much war as they have peace. If there is a future of peace for humankind, if there is to be an understanding of how these invisible, internal things should fit together, I expect it will come from the artists, because that's what we do. As in the concentration camp and the evening of 9/11, the artists are the ones who might be able to help us with our internal, invisible lives."



47 District Music Festivals

In addition to 47 annual district music festivals, SMFA provides: a provincial Syllabus; entrance to annual Provincial, Concerto, Opera and Musical Theatre Competitions; opportunity to advance to the Canada West Performing Arts Festival with competitors from Alberta and British Columbia; and coordinates training, hiring and scheduling of adjudicators. SMFA also provides workshops, fosters recognition of volunteers, organizes provincial archives and maintains a provincial website. In 2022, SMFA hosted the inaugural Canada West Performing Arts Festival on the beautiful University of Saskatchewan Campus.

Assiniboia & District Music Festival March 22 to 25, 2023

Assiniboia & District Music Festival held its 89th festival from March 22-25, 2023. The sessions were held at the Assiniboia Alliance Church as they have been for many years. There were 138 entries in a variety of vocal, string, musical theatre, speech arts and piano classes. We had 57 participants in the festival from our own community and neighboring communities. Fourteen of them were playing in Assiniboia & District Music Festival for the first time. It was wonderful to see so many new faces, and to reconnect with those who have been to festival in the past.

Our adjudicator this year was Sarah Clark Gregory from Watrous. She was wonderful to work with and great with the students. Sarah had lots of positive comments for the competitors and also gave everyone ways to improve. She really highlighted what each participant was doing well in their music.

The Assiniboia & District Music Festival held an awards concert on the evening of March 30, 2023 also at the Assiniboia Alliance Church. A total of \$1975 in community scholarships were awarded to worthy participants from the festival, many of whom also performed in the program. We had a great concert followed by the presentation of awards and topped with an ice cream social.

Battlefords Kiwanis Music Festival March 13 to 25, 2023

The 91st consecutive Battlefords Music Festival was held March 13-25, with the Gala concert of award winners on Tuesday, March 28. Our festival is fortunate to be well supported by businesses and service clubs in our community. As well, we have funds which were granted to us from the Jim Pattison Broadcast Group in past years, which we intend to continue spending on programs for the students in our area.

We were able to pay bussing costs for school groups entering the 2023 festival and entry fees for performers recommended to the provincial level of competition. In 2022-23, we offered a BMFA Booster workshop program to all teachers. We paid for all the costs of mounting a workshop for students if the teacher organized the event. The stipulation was that the workshop participants would enter the 2023 music festival. As a result, our community saw workshops in composition (Peggy L'Hoir, clinician); Orff instrumental ensemble (Janet Weaver, clinician); spoken word (Heather Macnab, clinician); strings and fiddling (Karrnnel Sawitsky, clinician). The workshops were successful and inspiring for all involved, and the new entrants performing in the festival added much to our event. We hope to expand this program in 2023-24.

The piano, vocal, musical theatre, choral and spoken word classes moved back to Third Avenue United Church for 2023. Strings and instrumental solos and small ensembles were heard at the Kinsmen Band Hall. We had used the Dekker Centre theatre in 2021 and 2022. We lost some entries because of this. The condition of the piano at Third Avenue United Church in



Logie Hall caused us some frantic concern just before the festival started but Roger Jolly bailed us out with a full day of work on the instrument.

This year's festival began with strings, bands and instrumental solos and small ensembles. Daryl McKinnon was the adjudicator. The classes ran from March 13 - 17. 18 bands entered the festival, some performing at the North Battleford Comprehensive High School, and others at the Kinsmen Band Hall. This number includes Orff ensemble and recorder groups. There were 16 string solos and 57 solos and small ensembles, mostly featuring beginners. It was exciting to hear all the enthusiasm and effort displayed by these young musicians. There was one entrant in the Canada West Brass category.

Vocal, musical theatre and spoken word classes were adjudicated by Marcia McLean. Choral groups and some solo entries were heard in the sanctuary of Third Avenue United Church and the rest of the classes were held in Logie Hall. There were 19 entries in solo musical theatre, as well as one duet. 31 vocal entries, 2 choral entries, and 31 spoken word performances were heard. We had Canada West entrants in classical vocal, musical theatre and spoken word categories. These performances took place on March 20-22.

158 piano entries were heard on March 22-25. This included 13 duets. Maria Medlow was the adjudicator.

Total number of entries was 358, which reflects a steady rise in numbers since the onset of COVID restrictions in 2021, but we are still struggling to attract more teachers and their students. We are also having difficulty filling the executive positions on our committee.

The winner of the cover art contest was Sam Thompson, a Grade 5 student from Battleford Central School. Admission to the sessions was by donation. Programs were sold for \$10. The gala concert on March 28 at the Dekker Centre was an excellent evening showcasing fine performances. \$8,900 in scholarship money was awarded to students. A rehearsal was held at the Dekker Centre for the performers in the afternoon between 2:00 and 5:30, which was helpful to everyone. Tickets for the gala were \$10.

We hope that in 2023-24 we can continue to build our entry numbers and encourage more teachers and students to take advantage of the many opportunities provided both by our local Festival and by the SMFA.

Scott Adelman was in Estevan March 29-30 to work with bands, instrumental and strings entrants. We had a resurgence in the strings discipline and hope to see that grow, as well as the beginning of the rebound of the school band program (heavily impacted by COVID restrictions, of course). There were 65 entries in these combined disciplines and Scott's energy and zest for school music/band was contagious!

All together, we had 409 entries (an increase of 144 from 2022) and very few cancellations. Entrants as young as 3 years old took the stage for the first time and their joyful little smiles lit up the room! We also had quite a few graduating players performing for, possibly, their last time at festival. Thank you for sharing your music with us through the years. We wish them all well in their future endeavors!

Tons of volunteers came out to support the festival and give the gift of their time to our organization. Without their commitment, we have no festival. Thank you could never be enough!

We held two awards and highlights concerts on Sunday, April 2. Participants in spoken word, vocal, musical theater, band, strings and instrumental were featured and awarded at a 2:00 pm concert. Kindersley & District Music Festival March 20 to 28, 2023

Our 2023 Music Festival ran from March 20-28. We hosted 16 sessions over 6 days in 3 venues. Over 320 students were registered, including 2 high school bands and 3 elementary school choirs. In total, 278 registrations were made, with 283 pieces being played. Our numbers may have been a little higher if another nearby festival had not had exactly the same dates, so students who were able to participate in both had to choose one or the other.

Our first adjudicator was Melissa Wood, who came to adjudicate our speech arts, vocal and musical theatre sessions at the Norman Ritchie Community Centre. Though this is one area where our numbers were low this year, two of our participants received recommendations to Provincials: Anika German in vocal and musical theatre, and Macy Boisjoli in musical theatre.

Audrey Watson came to adjudicate our piano sessions. This was a very young group, with our small seniors group at St. Paul's United Church being mostly in the 14-15 age categories. The junior piano, held at the NRCC, was 7 very full sessions. It was exciting to have so many first time participants!

Our second week saw Mark Ward come to adjudicate our instrumental sessions at St. Paul's United Church and the high school bands at the Kindersley Composite School. As band instruction has been able to return to the middle and high schools in the past year, we had many first time participants in all these categories as well. One of those first timers, Beth Summach, was also recommended to Provincials, for her woodwind performance.

We were very pleased to be able to host an "Adjudicator's Invitational Stars of the Festival"

concert. Our adjudicators not only had the responsibility of choosing scholarship winners, but also the participants, and their pieces that would be performed in the concert. As we gave out 49 scholarships, it was not reasonable to have everyone perform, so our adjudicators followed the KDMF suggested number restrictions and put together a program of 26 pieces across all the disciplines. All scholarships winners were also encouraged to attend and we handed out \$3200 in awards, of which \$2,240 was donated by local sponsors.

We are very appreciative to have a number of regular sponsors who have stuck with us even through the slower years, and were happy to be able to add new sponsors, as well as to have some return. The only extra fundraising we have done so far was to host our annual Christmas Carol Festival in December, with a silver collection at the door. This was the first one we have had for a few years, and we look forward to growing it again in upcoming seasons. We are also applying for a community initiative grant (KCIP) from our town.

Another highlight was the ability to have volunteers come to coordinate and serve as secretary for Festival this year, after 2 years of having only the committee fill those roles. A total of 12 people from outside the committee volunteered, and others have already expressed interest in helping out next year.

It is very pleasing to see the interest in Festival renewed and growing. That is not to say that there weren't a few growing pains, as volunteers sometimes fell ill, scheduling had a few tangles, a few entrants were in the wrong class and communication was sometimes inefficient, with emails going to spam folders, etc. We were able to try some new things and to learn from them. Some of those things we will keep and develop, others we will learn from and discard. Our committee, made up of parents, teachers and people who have a desire to see music celebrated in our community, uses their individual strengths to support each other and together make a strong contribution to Make Music Matter in Kindersley.



Kipling & District Music Festival March 13 to 14, 2023

Kipling & District Music Festival was held in person on March 13 & 14 in Kipling United Church, with all disciplines adjudicated by Gillian Rice. Our entries were significantly down (to 65 from 200+) but we are all climbing out of a post-COVID era. Many music students, since COVID, have graduated and moved on, and we are starting over with encouraging new students. Our largest hurdle is convincing the new onslaught of school teachers to enter choral speech and solo speech arts. There were none interested this year and so we lost a very valuable, strong, robust speech department that retired or recently departed teachers had worked so hard to keep going. Our homeschooled students represent a high percentage of entries overall in our local festival.

Our festival encouraged entries this year by offering free entries. This was well received by parents. However, the band teacher withdrew her bands from the festival the last minute, so our costs were even higher as the adjudicator was already booked. This affected revenues typically received on band night and also final concert.

The enthusiasm of the students who DID perform in the Music Festival was at an extreme HIGH this year! Entrants of all ages were so happy to be BACK performing to a LIVE audience! After festival, there were MANY kids who said, 'I Can't WAIT until next year!'. Many positive thank you cards for scholarships were received promptly and even lengthy letters describing how glad they were to be back!

We obviously operated with a loss this year with how the events unfolded. Our sponsors had donated money back pre-COVID, so their donations were held for this festival year. Opening balance July 2022 \$5123.43 and ending balance March 21 2023 after KDMF 2023 was \$2272.86.

We look forward to Festival next year!

Lanigan & District Music Festival April 19 to 27, 2023

The 46th Lanigan and District Music Festival took place at Christian Fellowship Church in Lanigan, April 19-21 and 24-27, with a final concert on the evening of Thursday, April 27. The first week consisted of vocal, musical theatre, ensemble and spoken word classes, adjudicated by Louella Friesen. Piano, guitar and violin classes, adjudicated by Sharon Rodney, took place the following week. There were 251 entries this year, up a bit from last year, including 145 piano solos, 2 piano duets, 31 vocal solos, 4 vocal duets, 24 musical theatre, 19 spoken word, 5 groups (including 2 from schools), 14 guitar solos and 1 guitar duet, and 7 violin solos. The largest increase in entries was seen in spoken word. Our committee was very pleased to see this growth and appreciates SMFA's assistance in promoting classroom spoken word through the entry fee rebate. In total, 88 students and 37 school students participated in the festival. They were taught by 10 different teachers, and represented 12 communities. They ranged in age from 5 years & under to 18 years & under. While many of the participants had been performing at the festival for years, there were also several beginners for whom it was their very first festival experience!

Huge highlights this year were the masterclasses held by each of our wonderful adjudicators, in which students received specific technical and musical instruction in group classes held on the final afternoon that each adjudicator was with us. These were well



received, we hope to offer masterclasses again in the future, as the schedule permits.

As was done for the past two years, sessions were live streamed to our Facebook page for the viewing enjoyment of friends and relatives. This requires more volunteers, and has now culminated in the creation of a new position (volunteer coordinator) and a new festival committee member. Another highlight was the daily soup and sandwich lunch in the basement of the festival venue, offered at a very reasonable cost. Students, families, teachers and volunteers also enjoyed the refreshments served at the coffee breaks held mid-morning and midafternoon in between sessions.

Four students advanced to provincial finals: Nirel Ryan Doromal (piano), Molly Evans (musical theatre), Geri Lon Valdesimo (vocal, msical theatre and piano) and Jenevieve Melin (vocal, spoken word and piano). Jenevieve received a provincial scholarship in spoken word. Congratulations to all of these students!

The final concert was held on April 27, at which a large audience enjoyed performances by students in all disciplines. Following the concert, a draw was held for a door prize of donated items for students, and then awards were presented, with scholarships totalling over \$2,600.

Revenues for the year, as of the annual meeting, were \$9,551,67 and expenses were \$7,225.59, for a balance of \$2,326.08. The Lanigan & District Music Festival relies on the generosity of sponsors to operate, and we gratefully acknowledge the SMFA corporate sponsors, Sask Lotteries, SARCAN and SaskTel, as well as our local supporters: Village of Drake, Drake Meats, Bruce Elke, Jansen Players, Renee Nunan-Rappard, Pound-Maker Agventures, St. Mary's Catholic Women's League, Lanigan Advisor, Long Lake Insurance, Humboldt Coop, Eva Elke & Al Shumaker, and Nutrien – Lanigan Potash, We are also thankful for the many sponsors of awards, which encourage so many students.

The Lanigan & District Music Festival Executive is composed of four volunteer officers: Nata Kline (president), Angel Liebrecht (entry secretary), Heidi Craig (treasurer) and Laura Melin (corresponding secretary), all of whom are continuing in their roles. Volunteer committee members were: Amy Ewert (awards), Michelle Foster (patrons & donors), Amber Yaskiw (member at large) and Nata Kline & Angel Liebrecht (program). Rodney and Linda Liebrecht were in charge of refreshments (the daily lunch offered at the festival venue). Amy Ewert has resigned her position on the committee; we are thankful for her many years of great work. The position of scholarships & awards will be combined with that of donors, filled by Michelle Foster. The new position of volunteer coordinator will by filled by Kaylyn Bartel. Nata Kline represented Lanigan & District Music Festival at the 2022 SMFA Conference & AGM.



Last Mountain District Music Festival (Strasbourg) April 17 & 18, 2023

After a three-year span without a music festival in our district, we were so excited to once again be up and running and in "almost pre-COVID" fashion! It was a small festival, with only 85 entries over two days. Our wonderful and very capable adjudicator, Cherith Alexander, adjudicated all disciplines. There were 36 participants (not including band and choir) with 23 of those being first time participants. This is very exciting for us, as we see the potential for growth and revitalization in these new young musicians. As encouragement and special recognition for these young musicians, they

Mainline Music Festival (Wolseley) April 3 to 5, 2023

Mainline Music Festival successfully held a three-day event, April 3-5, 2023, in Wolseley's historic Town Hall/Opera House. Heather Macnab of Maple Creek served as adjudicator for all disciplines. This was the first fully inperson festival since 2018, with 2018 marking the return of Mainline Music Festival to Wolseley, after a 35-year hiatus. Total entries in 2023 were 147, which was a decrease in comparison to the 2018 entries, which numbered 209. Twenty-three performances made a return to the stage for the Festival Finale on April 16, where \$1,760 in prizes were awarded. Mainline sent two representatives to the Provincial competition: Abbeygail May (vocal and musical theatre) and Julia Miles (piano and musical theatre).

Mainline ends the 2023 festival season with a financial surplus, thanks in part to five generous patrons who stepped up to be Elite Sponsors, each donating over \$300. In return for their donations, each business/organization received a full-page ad in the festival program. Patrons that donated \$150-\$299 were recognized with banner advertising within the festival program. We have found that offering advertising in the program has incentivized patrons to be just a bit more generous.

Our volunteer committee received a significant boost in membership, thanks to an aggressive recruitment campaign that we ran in November & December 2022. Through Facebook ads, newspaper ads, postal ad mail, and word of mouth, we were able to recruit 21 new volunteers, many of whom took on committee roles. The expenditure was a risk, but it paid off! We are excited to see our sister committee in Indian Head experience a similar rejuvenation, as they will host the 2024 Mainline Music Festival. Plans are already underway for the 2025 event in Wolseley. Both festivals were represented by Penny Miles at the Fall Conference in Moose Jaw, which marked the beginning of a three-year term on the Provincial Board of Directors.





Maple Creek & District Music Festival April 23 to 25, 2023

Maple Creek was pleased to have a larger festival this year with entries from three private teachers, three elementary school teachers and the high school band teacher!

We began Sunday afternoon (April 23) which was new for us – we found that families did appreciate having festival sessions on Sunday. We continued through Tuesday afternoon with piano, spoken word, voice and musical theatre as well as choral and choral speech. Our band session was held at the high school. Meadow Lake & District Music Festival

April 23 to 26, 2023

Meadow Lake & District happily celebrated its 45th anniversary this year with sessions held April 23-26. Entries increased, albeit slightly, and with all sessions being in-person for the first time since the cancellation in 2020, it was wonderful to feel that things were back to normal. Two terrific adjudicators, Sarah Clark Gregory and Nick Fanner, made our sessions a pleasurable experience for all participants. Two students qualified for provincial competition.

In the month leading up to the Festival, Northern Pride, the local newspaper, ran weekly articles consisting of contributions from past students, teachers, parents and volunteers. Several businesses and individuals donated items for a silent auction, so the evening garnered some income as well.

The finale for this Festival was the Awards Presentations Evening May 1. Each of the 1st place award winners performed one selection, plus Lucas Welsh, the local strings instructor, was invited as a special guest to perform a fiddle piece. Melfort Music Festival March 13 to 20, 2023

This year, Melfort held its **95th annual Melfort Music Festival**! We had 6 days of festival with 254 entries in 6 disciplines. This is all thanks to the 9 area teachers who encourage and support their students to take part.

Melfort's adjudicators this year were Scott McKnight, strings; Lynn Ewing, piano; James McCarthy, band; Chris Kelly, vocal, musical theatre and spoken word. We also welcomed Carol McFadden, adjudicator shadow for voice.

Two performers advanced to the provincial level of competition:

Georgia Strasser in the Grade 8 Piano Scholarship Class for her performance of *Song*, by Smetana.

Madison McAvoy with three recommends in the 17 years & under age group: Vocal Solo Recital Scholarship Class with her performance of *June Magic*, by Spencer; Vocal Folk Song Scholarship Class with her performance of *Wellerman*, a Sea Shanty; Musical Theatre, Uptempo Classic Scholarship Class with her performance of *One Hundred Easy Ways to Lose a Man*, by Bernstein, Comden & Green.

We combined our Sefton Memorial Competition with our Festival Highlights and Awards Program on the evening of Thursday, March 23. This allowed a larger audience, plus gave all ages of performers and award winners a chance to listen to and discover what the Sefton Memorial Competition is about.

The Sefton Memorial Competition had three talented competitors this year; two who performed on piano, one on violin. The winner of this prestigious competition was determined

There were 324 entries in total: choral - 5, vocal - 84, musical theatre - 103, piano - 97, strings - 8, guitar - 2, woodwinds - 7, brass - 4, percussion - 1, bands/ensembles - 12.

12 district winners advanced to Provincial Finals in Regina: Isabelle Adams, Jaymeson Bateman, Morgan Capili, Emily Closs, Elizabeth Deans, Alora De Jager, Sierra Downey, Grace Handy, Grace King, Kady Kuntz, Alex Sauer, Natalie Warren and Brooke Zarubin.

This year's awards concert was held on April 2, and we were pleased to award \$7,820 in scholarships to students at our festival.

Jeri Ryba attended the SMFA Conference held in Moose Jaw at Zion United Church.

Our fundraising efforts this year included our regular scholarship and patron requests to longtime donors and sponsorship requests to businesses and service clubs, as these efforts all take place well in advance of the festival. We also had a collection basket at the door for each session for donations. Additionally, we applied for a grant from the City of Moose Jaw to assist with our Festival.

We were very thankful to host a fully live festival this year, with a live audience, for all disciplines.

Moosomin & District Music Festival March 20 to 23, 2023

It was exciting to be back to our regular unrestricted format for festival this year. The audience attendance was up from the previous few years as people adjusted to life without masks and restrictions.

The dates for our festival were March 20-21 for piano and March 22-23 for vocal, speech arts and musical theatre. It was necessary to make adjustments to our scheduled dates because of



Regional High School Drama conflicts for several students entering the festival.

Audrey Falk Janzen of Rosthern was our adjudicator for piano. She was very pleasant, had a positive attitude and offered helpful suggestions for students to make their pieces even better. Sessions were very full, which didn't allow Audrey to demonstrate or bring many students back to the piano.

Terri-Lynn Mitchell of Saskatoon was our adjudicator for vocal, speech arts and musical theatre. We are thankful she could adjust her schedule, allowing us to move this section up a week. Terri-Lynn had a bubbly attitude, lots of energy and expression. Both written and verbal comments were good.

Entries for the festival were up in piano this year, but down in other disciplines (piano - 108, vocal – 12, speech arts – 23, musical theatre – 18, for a total of 194). 17 teachers entered students in the festival. 41 scholarships were awarded for a dollar amount of \$2,185 (\$1,785 for awards and \$400 for camp awards). Camp awards can be used for attending music camp or for private lessons with a teacher other than their regular teacher. Kassie's Jewelry sponsors medals for students age 6 years & under entering the festival. This year, 4 medals were presented in piano and 3 in speech arts. Shaughny Fingas advanced to Provincials in Musical Theatre Solo Ballad Contemporary and Musical Theatre Solo Up-tempo Contemporary. Rosanne Kelly and Sandra Poole arranged the Adjudicators Showcase. Kendra Matheson was MC for the evening. Awards presentations and performances were enjoyed by all. those in attendance.

Prince Albert Music Festival March 1 to 19, 2023

In 2023 we were pleased to mark the 75th anniversary of the Prince Albert Music Festival with many activities. Most importantly, we organized a full music festival - in person, with all disciplines involved – the first since the onset of the pandemic. From March 1-19, 2023 we listened to, and celebrated, music by local musicians. There were 66 piano entries, 53 vocal entries, 6 choral entries, 30 instrumental entries and 18 band entries. District winners were Anthony Stergios (piano), Big Noise Youth Choir (vocal), École Vickers School Choir (choral), Zoe Mortimer (vocal), Willow Vogelgesang (vocal), and Tori Korczak (vocal).

We were fortunate to benefit from in-depth feedback from our adjudicators: Laurel Teichroeb (piano), Marcia McLean (vocal), Anna Marie Bekolay (instrumental) and Aaron Wilson (band). We are grateful for their comments and workshopping that were useful not only for music students, but for the audience who came to enjoy festival performances.

As in previous years, numerous scholarships were offered thanks to the generosity of local donors. We awarded 103 scholarships totalling \$9,030. Donations from Canadian Tire, the Jim Pattison Broadcast Group, the Prince Albert Kiwanis Club, and the Butler Family Foundation allowed for numerous scholarships across disciplines. We appreciate everyone,



from individuals to large corporations, who provide donations to support the hard work and musical growth of youth in our community.

A significant bursary that we administer is the Gladys Strom Memorial Bursary, sponsored by local choral group, the Watsonairs. They support this fund in memory of Mrs. Strom, who was a member and director of the choral group for over 50 years. After her passing in 2006, the Watsonairs created this bursary in her name specifically for the Prince Albert Music Festival. The bursary is used to assist local youth to pursue music education and can help cover costs of music lessons, instrument repair, music camp tuition, and related activities. In 2023 we received 16 applications for the bursary. The bursary was split between 4 deserving recipients: Blake Anderson, Adelaide Bellehumeur, Theodore Enchanh, and Kienna Young.

In 2023 we re-launched our patronage program with a new title, "Friends of the Festival". We were pleased to connect with new and former patrons, who all have become "Friends," in another effort to support our festival activities and provide a stronger music community. We thank all of those who support us. Similarly, the music festival does not run without the dedicated volunteerism of those who sit on the committee and individuals who assist on festival days. We appreciate the many volunteers who ensured, through their unique skills and knowledge, that festival remains an important annual event to perform and learn in the arts.

Finally, to mark our 75th anniversary and attempt to create a sense of community with teachers, students, and parents involved in music festival, we embarked on a variety of activities. On October 30, we provided two complimentary tickets to social media contest winners to attend a concert by Randy Bachman at the local E.A. Rawlinson Centre for the Arts; on February 10, we provided complimentary

tickets to festival entrants to attend a concert by the Edmonton Pops Orchestra at the E.A. Rawlinson Centre, and on April 28, we held a special gala concert where a selection of entrants were invited to perform under the bright lights and on the big stage of, again, the E.A. Rawlinson Centre. All of these activities were possible thanks to a financial surplus. But most importantly, they provided inspiration and community connection for all who participated, underpinned by excellence in music. We strive to be an organization that provides opportunities for learning and growth in whatever way we can, and we were so pleased that this was received with enthusiasm in 2023. We hope to continue the tradition of bringing our community together!

We look forward to Music Festival in 2024 and continuing to nourish the local artistic community.

Regina Music Festival April 23 to May 6, 2023

Festival 2023 was 100% live and in-person. With Easter being early in 2023, we were able to run the festival in two straight weeks without a break, beginning April 23 and ending May 6. We held all classes at the Conservatory of Performing Arts on College Avenue with the exception of the choral competition held at Christ Lutheran Church and the pipe organ competition that we held as virtual classes. The final day of competitions (MLT-Aikins and Lions competitions) was held in Darke Hall, continuing a tradition we started in Festival 2022.

Festival 2023 also saw us experiment with one day of classes in Darke Hall. We chose senior piano and musical theatre to try having competitive classes on stage and with the Fazioli piano. The auditorium/performance space presented some significant challenges for the adjudicators, but these can be overcome and the RMFA hopes to hold more classes in Darke Hall in the future. Our Festival 2023 attracted essentially the same number of entrants and registrations as Festival 2022. This was disappointing, but a new approach to marketing and public relations will help us grow these numbers in the future. The demographics of Festival 2023 changed somewhat, however, with fewer participants over the age of 55. We were blessed, however, with a very strong response from our volunteer door monitors and secretaries. This was due, in large part, by the return of our Festival 2022 volunteers and a new approach to attracting volunteers from other groups such as the Rotary Club. We invited the club(s) to provide volunteers for one day of the festival.

Our adjudicators were as follows: Younggun Kim (Piano 1); Janet Nichol (Musical Theatre); Allison Arends (Vocal 1); Jennifer Lang (Choral); Christine Bootland (Strings); Jeri Ryba (Vocal 2); Peggy L'Hoir (Piano 2); Mark Thompson (Brass/WW/Percussion); Shawn Potter (Pipe Organ). We must extend a special thank you to Gordon Kerfoot, our adjudicator liaison. He has, for more than the past decade, been our "go-to" person for our adjudicators. He ensures that accommodations are up to our standards and provides transportation to and from the hotel to the venues. His wife, Brenda Ziolkowski, provides welcome baskets for each adjudicator. This is an assortment of snacks and beverages for their hotel room and, based upon feedback over the years, is a very welcome touch for the adjudicators who work such long hours supporting our festival.

Thanks to the efforts of our President, Joanne Hillis, we were able to attract Discipline Sponsors again for Festival 2023. Our Festival Sponsor was G. Murray & Edna Forbes Foundation Fund at the South Saskatchewan Community Foundation. These helped us cover our operational costs; registration fees covered the adjudicators' costs (fees as well as travel and living expenses); all scholarships are "pass through dollars" from our annual scholarship donors – a group of extremely loyal supporters



who return year after year. In 2023 we awarded just over \$25,000 in scholarships.

We close our report to thank our Production Manager, Robin Tinani. She has served us so well through all the challenges of COVID and out into the new light of Festival 2023. This was her last festival with us as Production Manager – and all of us thank her for working so hard to make our Festival 2021 (100% virtual), Festival 2022 (hybrid – in person and virtual), and Festival 2023 great successes even though the foundational technologies for each of her three years were significantly different! We wish her "All the Best of Good Luck" with her future endeavours.

Sand Hills Music Festival (Leader) April 17 & 18, 2023

It was an absolute delight to host the 2023 Sand Hills Music Festival. April 17 & 18, 2023 marked the first completely "return to normal" festival since the last in-person adjudication in 2019. The focus and confidence of a festival without interruption and uncertainty fostered the organizing volunteers' commitment to increased engagement and participation.

Leading up to the festival, a speech arts workshop was offered to school students. Teachers were encouraged to return with their classroom entries and a partnership was forged with the Leader and District Arts Council to support the development of a community youth choir. In total, 113 children, ranging in age from 4 to 16, participated in the festival this year. The Grade 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 classrooms recited two poems each.

It is the hope of the festival committee to build on this experience and continue to see the growth, development and appreciation of performing arts within the community.

Through the financial support of the local business community and individual donors, we presented 21 scholarships and award totalling \$1,870. A number of generous donors supported the operational expenses of the festival. We were able to achieve a modest surplus to support the long-term viability of the event.

The festival is a chance for participants to share their talents with an audience and be adjudicated by a skilled professional. Adjudicator Sofia Mycyk's knowledge and feedback benefitted each participant across a broad range of disciplines including choral, vocal, spoken word, piano, guitar and percussion. Ms. Mycyk's practical suggestions and easy manner made it an enjoyable, positive and constructive learning experience for the entrants.

Although the board continues to seek volunteers to support the organization and executive leadership of the festival, they are looking forward to the 2024 festival with optimistic anticipation.

Saskatoon Music Festival March 21 to April 6 & April 30 to May 6, 2023

The Saskatoon Music Festival returned in force for the 2023 festival year. Our numbers were not only up from 2022 and 2021, but also from 2019 – our last "normal" festival before the pandemic. We attribute the rise in numbers to new teachers in the area and a general excitement to be involved in activities once again.

This year, the Saskatoon Festival was made up of 4 distinct sections: schools (March 21 to 23), bands (March 27 to 31), Kiwanis Musical Theatre (April 1 to 6) and general (April 30 to May 6). In total, we had 3,786 participants across all 4 sections.

Kiwanis Musical Theatre is entirely sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Saskatoon. While the Saskatoon Music Festival committee takes care of creating the schedule and getting the paperwork put together, the Kiwanis Club (in an effort led by Terry Ross) takes care of everything else – from venue procurement to volunteer wrangling to adjudicator fees. Our partnership with the Kiwanis Club is invaluable and we are always grateful to them for their incredible support of the festival.

One of the highlights of our festival year is the Kinsmen Awards, which are always hosted on the final day of the general festival. This year, we were pleased to offer nearly \$7,000 in awards to twelve outstanding performers. The top performer in each discipline (musical theatre, instruments, piano, classical voice and strings) went home with a \$1,250 scholarship, courtesy of the Kinsmen Club for the latter 4 disciplines, and courtesy of the Kiwanis Club for musical theatre. Support like this is a big factor in the



decision of senior students to compete in the festival, and our thanks goes out to the Kinsmen Club for sponsoring these awards for over 50 years. Save-On-Foods was also part of the awards this year as they sponsored a small reception during the intermission. The support we get from our community is priceless!

We had 48 volunteers who put in countless hours of work to make the festival run this year, from planning to execution. On Thursday evening, June 1, one competitor chosen from each discipline in the 28 years & under division competed in the Grand Awards Competition. On Friday evening, June 2, one competitor chosen from each discipline in the 17 years & under division competed in the Grand Awards Competition.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA), now in its 115th year, presented the annual Provincial Finals Competitions and the Provincial Level of Canada West Excellence Competition at the Conservatory of Performing Arts/Darke Hall, Regina from June 1 to 4, 2023. Adjudicators for the competitions were: Piano: Jacques Després, AB; Voice: Dr. Christianne Rushton, NS; Canada West Voice: Dr. Chris MacRae, SK; Strings/Guitar/Chamber: Dr. Sasha Weinstangel, ON; Brass/Woodwind/Chamber: Jennifer Tenford, SK; Musical Theatre: Gail Hakala, ON; Spoken Word: Lorna Batycki, SK; Choral: Joan Heels, ON.





The Finance Committee consists of myself, President Jeri Ryba, Past President Tammy Villeneuve, Second Vice-President Alisha Mann, and Executive Director Carol Donhauser.

After recognizing an operational deficit of \$-15,850 last year which drew down on our surplus from the previous year of \$32,886, we show a small operational surplus of \$4,905 for the current reporting year. When this is added to our adjusments made to capital assets, and the move of funds from restricted assets of \$18,300, the year-end balance is a surplus \$40,866.

The SMFA Trust investment portfolio is managed by Leander Dueck of Beyond Wealth Management in Regina. The asset mix is balanced in a way that will help to decrease our risk during times of volatility. The rate of return during this fiscal year was 3.89%. During the same period, the Canadian Balanced Portfolio Benchmark was 5.25%. As has always been the case, a priority for the portfolio has been to reduce volatility by investing in multiple asset classes - specifically, the SMFA portfolio contains approximately 27% Canadian Equity, 26% US equity, 11% International Equity, 29% fixed income, and 9% Real Estate (less than 100% due to cash allocations). As discussed previously, we diversify the portfolio in these asset classes to limit the volatility over complete business cycles, not just over 1-year periods.

Though the SMFA portfolio did not outperform the benchmark over the last 1 year, when comparing the last 3 years, the SMFA Portfolio has performed as desired - returning 5.59% per year compared to the Canadian Balanced year. benchmark of 3.16% per This outperformance can be largely credited to limiting the downside volatility in the portfolio.

SMFA also holds 576 BCE shares, which continue to see steady returns with quarterly interest payments accounted for in restricted income.

SMFA is dependent on the operational funding from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, and we are grateful for this support. SaskCulture allocates lottery funds in the form of annual global grants. Last year, SMFA received \$185,000 for our Annual Global Funding Grant.

The SMFA Finance Committee continues to seek efficiences and funding opportunities in order to deliver the programs and services that serve our mission and mandate. Thank you for the SMFA Finance Committee for your work throughout the year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (the Entity), which comprise the statement of financial position as at July 31, 2023 and the statements of operations, statement of changes in net assets and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In my opinion, except for the effects, if any, of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as at July 31, 2023 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many non-profit organizations, Saskatchewan Music Festival Association derives part of its revenue from membership fees, donations and other fundraising activities, the completeness and classification of which are not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly my verification of these transactions was limited to accounting for the amounts recorded in the records of the Association and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to the revenues, statement of operations, assets and net assets.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:



Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is
sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement

1. Status and nature of activities

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan. Under present legislation, no income taxes are payable on the reported income of such operations. The purpose of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is to provide a classical, competitive music festival system of the highest standard at the local, provincial and national levels.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided on a diminishing balance method over the assets' estimated useful lives as follows:

Equipment	10 %
Furniture and fixtures	10 %
Leaseholds	25 months

Full amortization is recorded in the year of purchase.

Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting.

Grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are received out of the net proceeds of lottery ticket sales in Saskatchewan. These grants have been recorded as revenue by Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as approved by Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreations. Accordingly, amounts received that relate to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred revenue.

Grant revenue from other sources is recorded as revenue with amounts received that relate to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred revenue.

Unrestricted donations are recognized as revenue in the period received.

Externally restricted donations that have not been expended are shown as deferred revenue.

All other revenue is recognized in the period in which the income is earned.

Financial instruments

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments quoted on an active market, which are measured at fair value at the balance sheet date.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash, investments and accounts receivable. Financial assets measured at fair value are investments quoted on an active market. Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies cont'd

Management estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

8. Funds held in trust

Per the Association's by-laws in the event that a District Festival Association ceases operation or becomes inactive for a period of two consecutive years or more, all funds of that District Festival Association are to be transferred to the Provincial Association and be held in trust for a period of five years. If the District Festival Association is not reinstated within the five year period then the funds become the funds of the Provincial Association.

9. Interfund transfers

During the year \$18,300 was transferred from the Restricted Net Assets Fund to the Unrestricted Net Assets Fund for the funding of the operations of the Association.

10. Economic dependence

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association receives significant revenue in grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. As a result, the Association is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

11.Financial instruments

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association's exposure and concentrations at July 31, 2023:

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a party may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics that could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions, such that the organization could incur a financial loss. The Association is exposed to credit risk with respect to cash, investments and accounts receivable. The Association manages its credit risk by placing cash and investments with major financial institutions. Credit risk for accounts receivable is managed by the credit quality and diverse debtor base and creating an allowance for bad debts where applicable. There has been no change from credit risk exposure from 2022.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association may not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due or not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The Association is exposed to liquidity risk with respect to its investments and accounts payable but manages its liquidity risk by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash. There has been no change from liquidity risk exposure from 2022.

11. Financial instruments (continued)

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is a type of market risk that refers to the risk that the fair value of financial instruments or future cash flows associated with the instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Association is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to its cash and investments and its effect on interest income. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have a significant effect on cash and investments due to the fact that interest income is not a major percentage of total revenue. There has been no change from interest risk exposure from 2022.
