AUDREY SPROULE

Audrey Sproule is a Canadian violinist, string quartettiste, and community music initiator.

Born and raised in the village of Lafleche, Saskatchewan, Audrey studied violin with Ernest Kassian, Rudolf Sternadel, Mark Fewer, Ivan Zenaty, and Richard Schmoucler, and chamber music with members of the Cleveland Quartet, the Cavani String Quartet, and the Quatuor Arpeggione. She holds a Bachelor of Music from the Schulich School of Music (McGill University, Canada), a Master of Music from the Cleveland Institute of Music (USA), a Certificat d'aptitude (CA) from the Conservatoire Nationale Supérieur de Musique de Paris (the Paris Conservatory, France), and she is

the recipient of several major scholarships and awards, including the McGill Schulich Award, the Saskatchewan Music Festival Centennial Prize, and the JWF Peacock Scholarship.

Devoted to evolving from classical music norms, Audrey co-founded the Crimson String Quartet in 2009. With their debut album, Crimson Sunrise, the quartet pioneered their unique approach to concert programming. They perform annually on 'community residency' tours through rural villages across the Canadian Prairies.

Curious to discover classical music traditions overseas, Audrey relocated to Paris, France in 2014. One year later, she joined the Quatuor Naos. From 2015 to 2018, the Quatuor Naos won second prize in the Bellan International Chamber Music Competition in Paris, performed in the National Young String Quartet Weekend's pre-concert at Wigmore Hall in London, and honed their craft in the prestigious String Quartet Training Program at the Conservatoire à Rayonnement Régional de Paris.

Audrey is a core member of the contemporary-music-and-theatre collective, the Ensemble des Possibles, and she is a founding member of the Paris-based string quartet, the Quatuor Odyssée, receiving support from Naitways, Musiques Nouvelles en Liberté and the City of Paris.

Equally passionate for music outreach and pedagogy, Audrey was named a TD Scholar for her outstanding work in community leadership, and she was a finalist for the Canada National Millennium Award and for the US-Canada Fulbright Scholarship. Audrey has served as Educational Director of the Sistema-inspired CityMusic Kidz in Cleveland, USA, as section leader and assistant teacher at the Canada-India Youth Orchestra collaboration in Bangalore, India, as co-coordinator of a three-week intensive workshop focused on contemporary music in Bogotà, Colombia with the Batuta Foundation, and as teacher and artist-in-residence with the Judson String Quartet at the Interlochen Center for the Arts' Summer Academy. Audrey is co-founder, coordinator, and master clinician with the Est Ensemble's Inter-Conservatory String Quartet Training Program. In 2022, Audrey was named Professor of Violin and String Quartet at the Conservatorie à rayonnement départemental of Pantin, France, where she is currently on tenure track.







GORDON GERARD

For Canadian conductor Gordon Gerrard, music is an animating life force. He relishes the making of it. Takes pleasure in how it brings joy and comfort to audiences. Appreciates its potential to change how people perceive the non-musical aspects of their lives.

He's guest-conducted major Canadian orchestras (Vancouver, Quebec, Toronto, Victoria, London, Kitchener-Waterloo) and opera companies (Calgary, Hamilton, Edmonton). He loves working with emerging artists - at Calgary Opera, the Atelier Lyrique de l'Opéra de

Montréal, the Ban Centre, Opera Nuova (Edmonton), UBC Opera (Vancouver), Opera McGill (Montréal) and the Glenn Gould School (Toronto). And since 2016, he's delved into orchestral classics, contemporary works and programming that explores social change and community engagement as the dynamic music director of the Regina Symphony Orchestra. All rather unlikely for a kid who grew up on a farm just outside Brandon, MB.

Gordon began lessons at 7; by high school he was obsessed with music and decided to pursue it professionally. At 17, he left the farm for his undergrad at the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg before getting a master's at the Manhattan School of Music. He loved collaborating with singers, which led to a fascination with opera and the world of conducting.

"Music brings people together," he says. "I consider it a privilege to be part of that magic."



YOUNGGUN KIM

Younggun Kim is a pianist known for his blazing technical capacity and a lush sound supported by a natural phrasing sense (Timothy Gilligan, New York Concert Review), who has performed across North America and Europe. He is active as concerto soloist, recitalist, and chamber musician, and he teaches at the University of Toronto. Younggun has also been closely involved with the Health Arts Society (Concerts in Care) since 2011, playing in their concert series for those who may find it difficult to visit conventional venues.

His recent performance highlights include a solo appearance with Toronto Korean-Canadian Choir/Orchestra playing Beethoven's Choral Fantasy, a solo recital as a part of Faculty Artist Series at Queen's University, a duo recital with Sophie Dervaux who is a member of the Vienna Philharmonic, an appearance with the esteemed Isabel Quartet performing Robert Schumann's *Quintet*, a concerto performance with Niagara Symphony as well as recital engagements in Seoul, Korea.

Younggun is the winner of various prizes including San Antonio International Competition, Concours International de Piano Francis Poulenc, and Doctor of Musical Arts Recital Competition at the University of Toronto. Upon completion of the doctoral degree, Younggun was chosen as the recipient of the Tecumseh Sherman Rogers Graduating Award, which is the largest award offered by the Faculty of Music.

He is a Toronto-based Canadian from South Korea. After changing his career path in his early twenties from French literature to music, Younggun finished his undergraduate degree at the Glenn Gould School of the Royal Conservatory of Music, master's degree at Peabody Institute of Johns Hopkins University, and the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree at the University of Toronto. He studied with renowned artists such as Kyungrok Park, Roger Admiral, Boris Slutsky and the late Marietta Orlov.

History of the Concerto Competition

In 1979 three Saskatchewan organizations marked their 70th Anniversaries: the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA), the Regina Symphony Orchestra (RSO), and the Regina Cartage and Storage Co. Ltd. To celebrate this milestone, Kathleen Keple, then Executive Director of SMFA, initiated a Concerto Competition in partnership with the RSO, to be administered by SMFA and funded by Regina Cartage and Storage Co.

The three organizations held similar ideals of "enhancing lives through an appreciation for music". SMFA has played a vital role in the cultural life of Saskatchewan by "providing young musicians with educational opportunities to compete and perform". The Regina Cartage & Storage Co. President, Brian Keple, had long been supportive of community events throughout its history. The RSO, the oldest operating orchestra in Canada, also held a commitment to education in the province through the South Saskatchewan Youth Orchestra. The establishment of the Anniversary Concerto Competition was a broadening of this commitment. In addition to the monetary awards, the RSO provided the opportunity for the winner of the SMFA Concerto Competition to be featured as a guest artist in the upcoming season. In 2000 the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra (SSO), under conductor Earl Stafford, added their support by providing the winner with a performance opportunity with the SSO.

During the ensuing years generous sponsorship was provided by the City of Regina Arts Commission, CKIT FM Radio, and the Sister Geraldine Boyle and Goodfellow Trust Funds. From 1992-2007 Yolande Hodges Fitzgerald, a former Saskatchewan teacher, was the major sponsor for the competition, followed by the Lorne & Evelyn Johnson Foundation in 2009. Mr. William Shurniak became the event sponsor in 2013.

SMFA continues to play a major role in the development of our province's musicians. The SMFA Concerto Competition, now in its 36th cycle, is a tangible result of Saskatchewan co-operation. SMFA is delighted that the **Regina Symphony Orchestra** and the **Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra** provide guest appearance opportunities for the winner of this event.






GRAEME SCOTT
