History of the SMFA

*italicized text from Music for One Music for All by Mossie Hancock

The SMFA is very proud of its place in history as one of the province's oldest cultural organizations. Its structures and programs have been emulated throughout Canada. Inspired by Governor General Earl Grey's vision of a Dominion-wide festival and supported by Fred Chisholm and Frank Laubach, all Saskatchewan music groups were invited to Regina for the first provincial music festival in 1909.

The Association, established in 1908, was highly successful in achieving its objectives: to unite musical societies, individual musicians and groups in Saskatchewan into one organization for the purpose of holding annual music festivals.

The annual festival moved to Saskatoon, Prince Albert and then Moose Jaw. Excellent railway service allowed participants, including large ensembles, to come from all parts of the province. Eventually, the size of Saskatchewan (about that of Texas) along with its expanding population and transportation system promoted the creation of district festivals, the first in Unity in 1926. More and more district festivals sprang up, until there were 51 in 2002, including one fully bilingual event at Gravelbourg. Today, there are 44 active volunteer-run District Festivals.

The Concerto Competition (established in 1979) and the Gordon Wallis Opera Competition (established in 2000), administered by the SMFA, are held in alternating years. In addition to cash prizes, the winners are featured as guest soloists with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras.

The celebration of our Anniversaries strengthens the conviction that our festivals continue to provide Music for One...Music for All. In 2009, the SMFA celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the first Provincial Festival with a Centennial Re-enactment Concert held in Regina. In addition, special Centennial classes were heard at the SMFA Provincial Finals, and the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals (FCMF) AGM/Conference and National Music Festival Competitions were held in Saskatoon. SMFA also hosted the FCMF AGM/Conference and National Music Festival Competitions as part of our 110th Anniversary celebrations. It was a moment of great pride when Saskatchewan soprano, Emma Johnson, was chosen as the Grand Award winner that year.

We continue to further strengthen our organization after the global COVID-19 pandemic and look for adaptations to engage more young performers across Saskatchewan to find their voice, their discipline, and their passion.

To summarize, we will look to the wise words of Ms. Hancock: We give thanks for the vision and the effort of all of those who brought us this far in the service of music. We believe that the firm foundation on which the Association has been built will support the vision and effort of our present leaders and those of the future.






Board of Directors Liaison Map

Cultural Impact Statement

In 1905, Saskatchewan became a province. Since 1908, the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA) has grown with our province, always in step, always in tune. The SMFA reaches out to people of all ages and all backgrounds across the province of Saskatchewan.

Our mandate, which is "promoting excellence in music and speech through competition, performance, and educational opportunities for people of Saskatchewan", requires us to work closely with the many people who come together to keep the festival movement in Saskatchewan alive and well. These people include music and speech students, teachers, parents, volunteers, donors and audiences. There are 44 annual festivals across the province, therefore the impact that is created in all these 44 festivals and surrounding areas is significant.

These communities have embraced the festival concept because it provides:

- an element of educational growth as well as entertainment that brings their community together
- the opportunity for communities to acknowledge and support the success and endeavours of their young people
- encouragement for students to set goals and showcase their abilities while receiving constructive adjudication from professional musicians
- local volunteers an opportunity to be involved with young people in their community in a
 positive way
- participating students with the performance opportunity to develop confidence and selfdiscipline while demonstrating positive role models for their peers

Since its early days, the Association has provided competitive and non-competitive classes not only for solo performers and small ensembles, but also for community and school groups such as choruses, bands and orchestras. SMFA's continued expansion encouraged the formation of other provincial music organizations. Saskatchewan was not only the first to form a Provincial Music Festival Association, but also the first to use a common syllabus for all its member festivals. The use of the common syllabus assures that a high standard is maintained.

SMFA partners with the other music organizations across Saskatchewan to ensure that the programs we develop are relevant to the needs of our young people. Accessibility to programs and recognizing changing demographic circumstances within the province is a high priority. The broad-based volunteer component of SMFA allows the organization to operate at the grass roots level, thereby closely monitoring these changes and adapting to them. Every attempt is made to ensure that the experience attained by participants is beneficial and works in concert with the SMFA vision: "enhancing lives and community through music and the spoken word".

SMFA believes that the need for a culturally aware society is of increasing importance given the pressures exerted upon us by the rapid, electronic environment in which we live. Our organization is committed to cultivating that awareness by providing information, education, opportunity and a clear vision of the role we play in this task.



President's Report

In 2024-2025, SMFA continued to provide opportunities for musicians and spoken word artists to develop their skills through performance and feedback from many fine adjudicators. An adjudicator's conference was launched, and SMFA provided teachers, adjudicators and volunteers rewarding opportunities to connect and support each other.

We began our year with the 2024 AGM Zoom meeting on November 30, 2024. 31 festivals were

represented. Thanks were expressed to outgoing board members, Tammy Villeneuve (Meadow Lake), Clayton Braybrook (Kindersley) and Krista Brost (Meadow Lake). Three new board members were elected by acclamation: Abby (Fuller) Nagel (Last Mountain), Karen White (Saskatoon) and Laureen Kells (Quill Plains). The skills of these impressive women will be a great asset to the SMFA board.

Congratulations to Trena Wick of Estevan, as well as Jeanne Fetsch and Karen Young of Yorkton for receiving volunteer awards.

In 2024, several festivals celebrated milestone anniversaries. Congratulations to Assiniboia and District, 90 years; Estevan and District, 60 years; Eston, 75 years; Moose Jaw, 75 years; Qu'Appelle Valley, 65 years and Rosetown and District, 90 years.

Although in-person meetings have advantages, the virtual zoom AGM format allows more of our members to attend, be heard and vote about the discussed issues.

The January blues were eased by the Adjudicator's Conference, January 10-11, at the U of S Education Building. Guy Few was our dynamic and inspiring keynote speaker, reflecting on his experience as a festival adjudicator and performer. Other informative sessions were facilitated by Olivia Adams, Lynette Sawatsky,

Cherith Alexander, Dianne Gryba and Bonnie Nicholson. A Midwinter Concert featured soprano, Betty Allison with pianist, Naomi Suchan, speech artist, Heather Macnab, trumpeter, Hanna Hashi and pianist, Olivia Adams.

The 2025 SMFA Concerto Competition was held virtually on February 22. Eleven dedicated and accomplished musicians competed. The winner, Avery Guo, is a 16-year-old pianist who has been living in Saskatoon since moving from China five years ago. Graeme Scott, flautist originally from Regina (now living in Montreal, QC), placed 2nd. Elisha Ruo, violinist from Saskatoon, and Leah Macfarlane, pianist originally from Carnduff (now living in Victoria, BC) tied for 3rd place. The competition was judged by Audrey Sproule (violinist, Paris), Younggun Kim (pianist, Toronto), and Gordon Gerrard (conductor, RSO). We are delighted that Thomas Yu, internationally reknowned pianist, will be the Concerto Competition sponsor starting in 2027.

44 District Festivals were held between March and May, engaging 100 adjudicators and thousands of young participants. Many thanks to the many volunteers who spent hours planning and running their festivals, and to the sponsors who provided generous awards for the outstanding performers.

680 district festival entrants were recommended to the SMFA Provincial Finals in Regina, May 29-June 1. The record number of performers made for a wonderful celebration of joyful artistry. The





SMFA board arranged for videographer, Thom Hamilton, to make professional recordings at festival classes, which were then offered to the students and their families for purchase. It was a great addition to our event. Awards and scholarships presented at the provincial festival totalled \$26,550.

The addition of "JOY" awards presented by our adjudicators to students of their choice in district and provincial festival classes was fun for everyone.

SMFA hosted the 4th annual Canada West Performing Arts Festival, July 24-26, on the U of S campus. Competitors from British Columbia and Alberta joined 43 Saskatchewan artists in high level competitions. There were 146 entries in total. Students, teachers and parents found the workshop format of adjudications valuable. The CWPAF event concluded with a gala concert of 13 award winners at Convocation Hall.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association gratefully acknowledges the funding received through the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. We are indebted to the University of Saskatchewan for making venues available for many of our events. We also thank the numerous stakeholders that support festivals throughout the province.

On behalf of the SMFA board, I would like to thank our office staff, Nancy Toppings, Mariel Unger and Carol Donhauser, whose tireless work keeps us moving forward.

As we prepare for the 2026 festival season, we eagerly anticipate building more community amongst our participants, teachers, adjudicators, and volunteers. Together, we will "celebrate the joy"!

Executive Director's Report

The year 2025 marks five years since the Covid-19 pandemic that shut down almost all of our district festivals in March and live performing arts for several years. With the help of technology, we learned to adapt by going virtual with our festivals. Depression, drought, pandemic, world wars; you name it, we have survived it. The SMFA is, and continues to be, adaptable and resilient.

Unfortunately, we did not escape totally unscathed as Shaunavon, Redvers and Hafford dissolved, dropping our festival numbers and opportunities for Saskatchewan students from 47 to 44. Congratulations to the festivals that survived this difficult period and possibly came out stronger due to the adversity that was faced.

The SMFA volunteer base is the "secret sauce" to our success. As we look to become an even more inclusive organization in the years ahead, the role of volunteerism will become even more important.

Recent Statistics Canada survey findings provide an important update on giving and volunteering trends, providing a snapshot of how Canadians are engaging with charities and non-profits in the post-pandemic era.

Fewer Canadians are giving and volunteering, and they are contributing less of their time and money. These shifts look to be a combination of long-term trends and ongoing post-pandemic effects.

Some of the key findings include:

- Over the past decade, the percentage of Canadians donating has dropped from 82% to 54%.
- Total donations declined modestly to \$13.4 billion in 2023 from \$14.0 billion in 2018.

- This builds on a much more significant decline from \$16.4 billion in 2013 (all figures inflation-adjusted).
- The percentage of Canadians volunteering for nonprofits and charities dropped significantly, from 41% in 2018 to 32% in 2023. This is an additional decline from 44% in 2013.
- Total volunteer hours dropped to 1.2 billion, down by over a quarter from 1.7 billion in 2018 and nearly four fifths from 2.0 billion in 2013. In total, this is equivalent to a decline of roughly 451,000 full-time jobs.

These findings confirm what many in the nonprofit sector have been feeling for some time: we are at a critical juncture. With fewer donors, fewer volunteers and increasing community needs, organizations are being pushed to do more with less. Canada, and in particular Saskatchewan, has a longstanding culture of care and community spirit.

SMFA must once again find a way to adapt to these new trends. Recruiting and retaining volunteers will be crucial in our efforts to continue presenting our mission and mandate.

2024 AGM Minutes

The 2024 Annual General Meeting of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association was held virtually on November 30 @ 2:00pm.

President Jeri Ryba, welcomed everyone to the 2024 Saskatchewan Music Festival Association Annual General Meeting and appointed Nancy Toppings as recording secretary. Jeri explained the voting process.

The roll call was conducted by Past President Tammy Villeneuve. Representatives from 31 District Festivals were present: Battlefords, Central Sask, Estevan, Eston, Gravelbourg, Humboldt, Kindersley, Lafleche, Mountain, Lloydminster, Mainline, Maple Creek, Meadow Lake, Melfort, Moose Jaw, Moosomin, Outlook, Parkland, Potashville, Prince Albert, Quill Plains, Regina, Rosetown, Sand Hills, Sask Valley, Saskatoon, Twin Rivers, Unity, Watrous, Weyburn and Yorkton. Not attending were Assiniboia, Biggar, Borderland, Carnduff, Kipling, La Ronge, Lanigan, Nipawin, Prairie Sunset, Qu'Appelle Valley, Redvers, Spiritwood, Swift Current and Vanguard.

Jeri recognized that SMFA programs reach lands covered by Treaties 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 10, the traditional lands of the Cree, Dakota, Dene, Lakota, Nakota and Saulteaux peoples, as well as homeland of the Métis.

The meeting was called to order at 2:10pm.

A moment of silence was observed for departed volunteers and committee members. Special mention was made to honour Janet McGonigle and Sharon Penner.

Business Arising

Finance Chair Dianne Gryba presented a summary of the Investment Report from Leander Dueck of Beyond Wealth Management. The Trust Investment Portfolio was valued at \$506,773 at year-end.

Leander reports that the rate of return during this fiscal period was 12.20%. During the same period, the Canadian Balanced Portfolio Benchmark was 12.88%. The priority for the SMFA portfolio has been to reduce volatility while still investing the majority of the portfolio for growth - specifically, the SMFA portfolio contains approximately 21% Canadian Equity, 30% US Equity, 17% International Equity, 31% fixed income and cash (less than 100% due to rounding.) The asset mix is balanced in a way that will help to decrease our risk during times of volatility. Though the investment portfolio did not outperform the benchmark over the last year, when comparing the last 3 years, it continued to perform as desired - returning 4.04% per year compared to the benchmark of 3.19%.



SMFA also holds 576 BCE (Bell Canada) shares which continue to see steady returns with quarterly interest payments accounted for in investment segregated for future expenditures.

<u>Financial Statement Presentation</u> (as prepared by Marcia Herback and Associates

Statement of Financial Position (Page 73)

The statement of financial position reports on the total assets, liabilities and net assets of the Association. Cash has decreased mainly due to first payment for the 2023/24 year from Saskatchewan Lotteries being received early and the same not happening for the 2024/25 year. Assets held in trust have increased due to the investment change in January 2024. Deferred revenue has decreased over prior year due to receiving the 2023/24 Sask Lottery funding early, but not so for the 2024/25 funding.

Statement of Operations (Page 74)

The statement of operations reflects the revenue and expenditures from the day to day activities of the Association. Revenue has increased from the prior year mainly due to the realized gain on investments due to the January 2024 change. There was still a decrease in the market value of the investments which is shown as unrealized loss. There was also growth in Affiliation Fees and Provincial Finals revenue due to higher numbers of participants. There were fewer donations received in 2024 than in 2023. Total expenses have increased. The Association hired Mariel full time for the Assistant to the Executive Director position, thus increasing administration costs. There was a change in the insurance premium. The premium for a Festival has increased from \$50 to \$200, thus increasing insurance costs. 2023/24 was the Opera Competition year, which had a greater expense than the Concerto Competition of the 2022/23 year. To help with the known decrease in Sask Lottery funding by \$10,000 over the next three years, the Association vacated their office space in June 2024 to work from home.

Statement of Changes in Net Assets (Page 75)

The statement of changes in net assets shows the changes during the year for the various categories of net assets. After recognizing an operational surplus of \$40,866 last year, deducting the current year deficit of -\$25,990, adding \$706 in amortization and \$2,400 withdrawal from the Trust Investment for scholarships, unrestricted net assets are now \$17,982.

Cash Flow Statement (Page 76)

The cash flow statement shows how changes in the statement of financial position accounts and statement of operations affect cash and breaks the analysis down to operating, investing, and financing activities. It outlines the flow of cash in and out of the Association.

Notes and schedules to the financial statements (Pages 72 to 83)

The notes are additional information added to the end of the financial statements. The notes help explain specific items in the statements as well as provide a more comprehensive assessment of the Association's financial condition. The schedules are also additional information which provide a more detailed breakdown of the revenue and expenditure items presented in the statement of operations.

The Concerto Competition is a partnership project with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras. Prize amounts are \$2,000 (1st), \$750 (2nd), and \$500 (3rd) with the winner receiving an opportunity to appear as guest artist with the Regina and Saskatoon Symphony Orchestras.



<u>2025 Provincial Finals Competition</u> will take place May 29 to June 1, 2025 at the Conservatory of Performing Arts and Darke Hall in Regina.

4th Annual Canada West Performing Arts Festival will take place July 24-26, 2025 in Saskatoon and is held in partnership with Alberta and BC Music Festivals. Jeri acknowledged the long-standing support of U of S in providing venues and equipment.

SMFA Adjudicator Conference

Adjudicator training and recruitment is a priority for SMFA. This year's Adjudicator Conference was well attended and received.

In January of 2025, we tried something new: our first ever adjudicator conference! While we've held inperson adjudicator training in the past, we've never attempted something to the scale of a multi-day event. We kicked off the year with this conference, and reception from the adjudicators and presenters was overwhelmingly positive. Much of the positive feedback received focused on the quality of the sessions and the opportunity to network with colleagues. Most attendees indicated that if an event like this was to be held again, they would plan to attend. Our aim was to provide learning opportunities that would appeal to all, from prospective to seasoned adjudicators.

In total we had 44 adjudicators register and attend the conference. These attendees came from around Saskatchewan to join us from Friday to Saturday. Friday's programming included a keynote address from Guy Few and concert performances from Heather Macnab, Hanna Hashi, Olivia Adams, and Betty Allison. The conference continued on Saturday with workshops from Lynette Sawatsky, Olivia Adams, Cherith Alexander, Bonnie Nicholson, Dianne Gryba, and Guy Few on a variety of practical topics for adjudicators of all disciplines.

We are grateful to the University of Saskatchewan Music Department, as always, for the generous support they give us in the form of free use of their venues and instruments. As an extra show of thanks, we offered free conference registration to any current USASK Music student who was interested in learning more about adjudicating.

While our adjudicator conference will not be an annual offering, we hope to be able to host it on a biennial or triennial basis.





SMFA Concerto Competition

The top prize for this competition is \$2,000 and the opportunity to perform with both the Regina Symphony Orchestra and the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra in their upcoming seasons.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA), Dianne Gryba, President is pleased to announce the winner of the 2025 SMFA Concerto Competition. Avery Guo of Saskatoon won the competition with her performance of Robert Schumann's Piano Concerto in A minor, Op. 54. Avery was accompanied by Kathleen Solose.

Avery Guo is a 16-year-old pianist who has been living in Saskatoon since moving from Chongqing, China five years ago. She began piano lessons at the age of five and now studies with Kathleen Solose. Avery competes each year in her local music festival and has advanced to the SMFA Provincial Finals in several classes. Avery was also honoured to receive first prize at the 2024 Gordon C. Wallis Piano Competition, sponsored by the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers' Association. She recently completed her ARCT exam with the Royal Conservatory of Music. When not playing the piano or focusing on her

high school classes, Avery enjoys working as a lifeguard and swimming instructor.

Eleven musicians competed in the **SMFA** Concerto Competition, which was held virtually on February 22. Graeme Scott, flautist originally from Regina (now living in Montreal, QC), placed 2nd. Elisha Ruo, violinist from Saskatoon, and Leah Macfarlane, pianist originally from Carnduff (now living in Victoria, BC) tied for 3rd place. The competition was Audrey Sproule judged by (violinist, Paris), Younggun Kim (pianist, Toronto), and Gordon Gerrard (conductor, RSO).



The next SMFA Concerto Competition will be held in 2027.









Testimonial - Dr. Thomas Yu

Thomas Yu is one of the most recognized amateur musicians in the world. He has redefined what it means to be an amateur pianist, having performed with orchestras across five continents while maintaining a full-time career as a periodontist. In 2016, Yu was the unanimous winner of the prestigious 7th Cliburn International Amateur Piano Competition in Texas, taking home the gold medal as well as Press and Audience Awards. Ten years earlier, he also swept the Paris International Competition for Outstanding Piano Amateurs. In the span of this decade, Yu also won the 2015 CBC's Piano Hero, 2014 Honens Pro Am Competition (Calgary), 2012 International Amateur Piano Competition (Manchester), 2010 B&B International Piano Competition (New York), and 2009 Bösendorfer International Piano Competition (Vienna). Yu is also a winner of several national competitions, including the Canadian Music Competition and the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations Piano Competition. In addition to his musical pursuits, Dr. Yu obtained his DMD with Great Distinction from the University of Saskatchewan. He then completed a General Practitioner Residency at Mount Sinai Hospital in Toronto before obtaining his Master Degree in Periodontics at the University of Toronto. He owns a busy private practice in Calgary, teaches at the Foothills Medical Hospital, and is a sought-after lecturer across Canada. His passion for music was influenced by his two private teachers and mentors, Bonnie Nicholson in Saskatoon, and Marc Durand at the Glenn Gould School/Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

As a child, I remember the thrill of being dismissed from school—not for a doctor's appointment or a family trip, but to compete at the Saskatoon Music Festival. At the time, I thought that was the coolest thing ever. There was something magical about walking into those festival halls, my music books tucked under my arm, butterflies fluttering in my stomach. I remember sitting nervously before each class, listening to the other performers, hearing the quiet but distinct scratch of the adjudicator's pencil on paper. Every note mattered.

I'd try to interpret the adjudicator's comments to figure out whether they actually liked my playing. My eyes would dart toward the table where the assistant carefully wrote names on certificates, hoping to catch the pen forming the letters "Thomas Yu." For me, the festival wasn't just a competition—it was a way of life. But win or lose, the day always ended the same way: with a trip to Dairy Queen shared with my parents. Those small moments will stay with me forever.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival was the highlight of my year—every year. It wasn't just about performing; it was about growing. I remember my first time in the Senior Piano Provincial Finals. I played Chopin's First Ballade for adjudicator Dale Jackson. I didn't win that class, but I managed to earn enough elsewhere to qualify for the Grand Awards Competition. When Dale asked what I planned to perform, I said, without hesitation, "The First Ballade." He looked surprised and asked, "Are you sure?" I nodded. "Yes—I can fix what you told me by tonight."



I performed again that evening and won. Taking that risk—and following through—filled me with confidence and pride.

Another highlight for me was the SMFA Concerto Competition. I practiced every day with my teacher, Bonnie Nicholson, pouring everything into my preparation. I remember walking into the lobby of the Regina Inn, seeing other competitors arrive, all of us carrying the weight of hope and ambition. I felt like there'd be no chance for me to do well with so many great musicians. That was the first time I played on a truly great concert grand—a Baldwin piano generously loaned by Roger and Marie Jolly. Performing Rachmaninoff's Second Concerto on that instrument felt like the music had no limits. Because the competition spanned two days, my family drove back to Saskatoon that evening. The next day, I got the phone call: I had won. I can still picture myself leaping up and down on my bed, overjoyed and overwhelmed.

Looking back, I have nothing but gratitude for my festival days. The SMFA gave me more than just performance opportunities—it gave me purpose. The defeats made me hungrier to improve, and the victories motivated me to reach higher. I learned how to prepare under pressure, how to perform through nerves, and even developed a few backstage rituals—some of which I still cling to today.

I hope that SMFA continues to be as influential to young musicians as it was to me. Even now, as I type these words, the memories come flooding back—vivid, alive, and deeply meaningful. I owe so much of my musical journey to the SMFA. Thank you for giving me a stage, a reason to grow, and a lifetime of memories.





Testimonial – Laurel Teichroeb

Laurel Teichroeb holds an ARCT Teachers Diploma with the Royal Conservatory of Music, a Primary/Elementary Piano Pedagogy Diploma, and a Licentiate Diploma in Piano Pedagogy with the Canadian National Conservatory of Music. Laurel is an examiner for CNCM, clinician at provincial music conferences, and an adjudicator for festivals throughout Western Canada. Laurel is very active with, and currently the President of, the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers Association and plays an instrumental role in organizing workshops for continuing music education for teachers and students.



Ever since I can remember, music has been a part of my life. It began with singing.

When I was young, my mom would play the piano and my sister, two brothers and I would be singing for some event or wedding. My mom was an excellent seamstress, so we had matching home sewn outfits. I usually always got a case of the giggles before the end of the song, which was entertaining to everyone except my siblings.

We sang at school in music class. My favorites were the rounds.

We memorized words and they flowed naturally for every Remembrance Day service and Christmas concert. These special events at the town hall, were shared by our community and I always just thought that everyone loved to sing! In church, I would stand beside my mom and hear her rich alto voice sing out the harmonies. I naturally followed her and loved the rich full sound of hymns and quartets in four or more parts.

Everyone took piano lessons, or so it seemed. At least most of my friends did. I really can't recall the first time I played in the music festival.

It was a big event however, as we had to travel to Yorkton to play in Westview United Church. This event usually involved a new, home sewn dress and quickly became a special occasion year after year. My mom kept one of the first festival programs I was registered in, and there I am in a class of 34 students - all playing the same test piece!! My mom said I had fallen asleep, and she woke me up closer to my time to play. Looking back on that time now, what a nightmare for the adjudicator!! I'm not sure how they would have selected a winner.

I remember driving through many a blizzard to get to the festival. The weather in March was always a toss up between your spring outfit or mittens to keep your hands warm! Through the years, the class entries thinned and each year familiar faces reappeared, eventually becoming lifetime friends.

Festivals were wonderful learning times, especially for me as a young teacher. I still have many notes written throughout my music scores from adjudicators so willing to share their musical knowledge. They opened and inspired a love for historical knowledge of the pieces and the composers' intents of their works. I distinctly remember Robin Harrison sitting at the keyboard, relaying his own story of being seated at young Wolfgang's piano in Salzburg, emphasizing the difference in our




instruments today and the way the sonata would have sounded. His joy in sharing Mozart, and also Chopin, were so evident. Dr. (Sr.) Joan Miller was another welcomed and favoured adjudicator who very much imparted her love for teaching. Her thoroughness and detail made one aware that she was very much engaged in your presentation. Festival was a very important learning tool before the world opened up to us through the internet.

As an adjudicator, I have had the pleasure of meeting many wonderful volunteers and organizers who give of their time each year to see the festival in their community thrive and grow. Small towns are amazing for their ability to make this a community event and support their music students like no other. A special

thank you goes out to the teachers who impart their knowledge, inspiring their students to share their love and passion for the pieces they perform. Especially rewarding is the vast amount of Saskatchewan and Canadian music now available. Composers become personable and are only an email away to answer your questions or hear your thoughts.

We all learn by hearing one another share our unique sound – all in the joy of music making. As my home festival of Yorkton approaches its 100th Year of festival, we can all celebrate the beauty of a rich heritage passed from generation to generation - may festival be enjoyed for many more years to come!



The addition of the Notable and Joy Awards were warmly received by students and very much appreciated. In one instance, the adjudicator gave a Joy Award and remarked "how proud and professional the young student looked for his (first ever) festival performance!" He was speechless when he received this recognition! What a beautiful way to celebrate performance and the JOY of making music – not just the winning!

We held two awards and highlights concerts. Participants in spoken word, vocal, musical theater, band, strings and instrumental were featured and awarded in one concert and piano performers were honored in a separate concert. Our top award is the Murray GM Multi-Discipline award, which was won by Jacob Pyra after performing in the strings, vocal, spoken word and instrumental classes. The Dwight Thompson Memorial Multi-Discipline Runner-Up Award (donated by Hall Funeral Services) was awarded to Sarah Pyra. We are pleased to be able to award over \$10,000 in scholarships and awards, thanks to the many generous donors and businesses in our community. This monetary support provides encouragement and motivation to our many recipients and is greatly appreciated by winners and our committee alike.

Since our band entry numbers continue to be lower than pre-Covid years, we have many band awards that are not given out each year. This year's band adjudicator requested that we use this money (instead of carrying it forward, an accounting nightmare!) for a greater purpose, and a bursary was created for the Midale Band Program. After not having a band program for many decades, a dedicated teacher began the process of rebuilding the program. He even had all four bands enter the festival in this, their resurrection year! We were happy to accept Dr. Tse's suggestion and give this fledging program an \$1100 bursary.

We were also happy to send performers in more than one discipline to the Provincial Finals Competition - for the first time in many years - held in Regina the first weekend of June. Hudsyn Hozjan, Kensie Aspinall, Peyton Irwin and Jerome Kim were all eligible to represent our festival in piano classes, and Lucas Schott was eligible for his spoken word performances. We are so proud of these young musicians for continuing to challenge themselves and take part in the Provincial Festival. Humboldt Music Festival held its 88th festival from March 24-April 1. We were very excited to have our festival grow this year by an additional 44 entries, increasing to 311 entries overall from 267 in 2024 in the disciplines of piano, strings, band, vocal, musical theatre and spoken word. We also saw a large increase in the number of

spectators that came out to watch the performers on a daily basis. We were also strong again this year with the number of volunteers coming out to help with the festival and assisting with the positions of door steward and adjudicator secretary. Kindersley & District Music Festival March 17 to 26, 2025

Our 2025 Music Festival ran from March 17-26. We hosted 17 competitive sessions over 8 days all in one venue. We also had 2 band workshops in 2 high schools in our district: Eatonia and Kindersley Comprehensive School. Over 120 competitors were registered, as well as the 4 bands who were visited in their home schools. In total, we had 281 registrations.

Our first adjudicator was Doreen Renschler, who adjudicated junior and senior piano. We had new schedulers organize the piano sessions, and so had a mix of junior and senior throughout the 4 days at St. Paul's United Church. We had a full 4 days of piano, with 9 sessions overall. We had 2 performers advance to Provincials from our piano students, with Leif Bews and Kiersten de Coninck Smith both receiving the nod.

Garry Gable adjudicated spoken word, vocal and musical theatre sessions, which were also held at St. Paul's. **Sierra Gardiner** advanced to Provincials in 4 classes of voice and musical theatre. **Angela and Dominic Bosch** qualified for spoken word in 2 classes each. Our other provincial candidate was **Reid Silvernagle** in a voice class, but he had been recommended from an earlier festival.

Our second week saw Jennifer Tenford adjudicating instrumental sessions at St. Paul's United Church. We held 5 sessions: 3 of instrumental, one percussion and one strings. Jennifer was very gracious to use the third day we had booked to do workshops with our high school bands. 5 performances resulted in advancement to Provincial Finals, with woodwind players **Angela Bosch** and **Kaitlyn Herner** qualifying in one and two classes respectively. **Moira Padberg** qualified in two percussion classes.

We were pleased to continue with our "Adjudicator's Invitational Stars of the Festival" concert. Our last session was on Tuesday afternoon, so we had a little extra time to put together the concert for Wednesday evening. Adjudicators not only had the responsibility of choosing scholarship winners, but also the participants and the pieces they would perform in the concert. As we gave out 49 awards, it is not reasonable to have everyone perform, so our adjudicators followed the KDMF suggested number restrictions and put together a program of 21 performances across all disciplines. All scholarships winners were encouraged to attend, and we handed out \$3453 in awards, of which \$1850 was donated by local sponsors.

Though a number of regular sponsors and Friends returned this year, we did lose a few. Some of this was due to the postal strike right in the middle of our fundraising drive, so some follow-up letters were not sent, and possibly some people forgot to send their cheques, as they would have had to wait. However, during the festival, several people came to committee members and asked to be contacted next year! We had a silver collection at the door for all our festival sessions, including the Stars Concert. Other than that, the only other fundraising we have done was to host our annual Christmas Carol Festival in December, also with a silver collection at the door. This event continues to grow after a few years of cancellation. We are also applying for a community initiative grant (KCIP) from the Town of Kindersley.

One of our biggest highlights was having our local hockey team show up to support one of their teammates who competed in senior piano sessions. It was so great to have so many young people attend and bring their energy. Go Klippers!! The piano students all seemed very excited to be able to play on the grand piano, and several commented on the awesomeness of the venue. We set up a photo backdrop in the foyer for people to use to take pictures. Another highlight for our 2025 Festival was an increase in community volunteers coming out to work at the secretary and coordinator tables. A total of



11 people, 3 who were new this year, from outside the committee volunteered, some taking several sessions. All commented about how much fun they had and how great it was to see all the competitors and their talent. Again, we had people coming up to us during Festival asking to be put on the list for next year ②.

It has been said "Do the best you can until you know better. Then, once you know better, you can do better." We always reflect back on our year and see ways we have grown and ways we can improve. This year, we continued to have a mixture of printed programs and a QR code to our online program. Online is possibly losing popularity, so we will continue to use that, but we will increase our printed programs. This year we went from selling 30 programs last year to about 70 this year. Our Adjudicator Choice Concert is a success, and we will continue with that. Practice days, first time participant acknowledgement, and how we communicate with concert participants are evolving processes, as our community of participants also evolves. Our online registration program was the most successful to date, with only one using the paper registrations or the in-person drop off. Moving to accepting e-transfers was also a success. As we grow, we will possibly offer a training session for our community volunteers, a more comprehensive guide about festival etiquette, and improve our advertising in the community to draw in more audience. We look forward to continuing to Make Music Matter in Kindersley as we head into our 63rd year!

Mainline Music Festival (Wolseley) April 6 to 9, 2025

Mainline Music Festival successfully held a four-day event, April 6-9 in Wolseley's historic Town Hall/Opera House. Ron de Jager of Caronport adjudicated the first two days, when spoken word, voice, musical theatre, choral, percussion and choral speech entries competed. Audrey Watson adjudicated the final two days of competition, consisting of piano entries and

also delivered a piano workshop to an attentive group of students.

Total entries in 2025 were 131, which was again a slight decrease over previous years. However, we also saw the semi-retirement of a longstanding local piano teacher, so the entries we did see seem proportional to the private teachers in the area. School groups were well represented from Dr. Isman Elementary School. Twenty performers made a return to the stage for the Festival Finale on April 15, where \$1665 in prizes were awarded. Mainline sent seven representatives to the Provincial Finals Competition: Brynn Ager (voice & musical theatre), Jasper Beliveau (musical theatre), Thomas Kraushaar (spoken word), Joni Lamb (musical theatre), Natalie Malo (voice), Julia Miles (voice & musical theatre) and Jordan Sicard (voice).

Mainline ends the 2025 festival season with a financial surplus, thanks in part to ten generous patrons who stepped up to be Elite Sponsors, each donating over \$300. In return for their donations, each business/organization received a full-page ad in the festival program. Patrons that donated \$150-\$299 were recognized with banner advertising within the festival program. We have found that offering advertising in the program has incentivized patrons to be just a bit more generous.

Currently, we find ourselves lacking a dedicated board of directors. Key positions remain unfilled, although plans are in the works to possibly combine all operations of the Indian Head and Wolseley Festivals to ensure continuity for next year and beyond. Mainline Music Festival will return to Indian Head in 2026. Both festivals were represented by Penny Miles at the virtual 2024 SMFA AGM; her term on the Provincial Board will end at the upcoming 2025 Provincial AGM.





Maple Creek & District Music Festival April 7 to 11, 2025

The Maple Creek & District Music Festival was held from April 7-11 and included 21 solo competitors and five ensembles. The total number of entries was 133, with piano entries accounting for 54. This year we welcomed Alicia Vopni-Summach as our adjudicator for all disciplines. Alicia was well received by competitors and the committee. This year we did not have any non-competitive/workshop classes, and we regret that due to staffing changes and labour negotiations we did not have any school band entries this year.

Our awards concert was held on the evening of April 11, with 16 performers and ensembles. This year five of our competitors were recommended to the Provincial Competition: Evey White (voice, musical theatre, piano), Amara Weiss (voice, musical theatre), Sophia Uribe (voice), Allegra Sifert (voice), and Bria Sifert (spoken word). Fundraising is accomplished by an annual letter to donors, advertising space in the program, the Communities Grant and entry fees.

Our AGM was held on June 26, with six committee members in attendance. Plans are being made for long-term committee members who have been in their roles for many years to mentor other committee members in their duties, to make sure the hand-off is smooth, and that those long-term members are still around for questions and guidance.





Meadow Lake & District Music Festival

April 7 to 11, 2025

As a whole, our entry numbers have remained relatively steady for the last few years with slight fluctuations between disciplines. Financially, our festival is stable and we are very grateful to all our donors who contribute to provide awards to our participants. The Moose Jaw Music Festival proudly ran from March 31 to April 13, 2025, and what a vibrant, inspiring two weeks it was!

We began on March 31 with our choir classes, led by clinician Stewart Wilkinson. With only four choirs entered this year, we took the festival directly to the schools, listening to the groups in their own practice spaces. The students still dressed up for the occasion, making the experience feel special and celebratory.

Our voice and musical theatre disciplines ran April 6-12 with the wonderful Chris MacRae from Calgary as our adjudicator. His expertise, warmth, and energy made the week exceptional. We were thrilled to see a rise in vocal entries and a significant surge in musical theatre. For the first time, we had entries in every provincial musical theatre class - and subsequently a recommendation in each one. With musical theatre duets becoming increasingly strong and moving, we would love to see a duet category at the Provincial level. Running a multi-day band event is no small task, and we are incredibly fortunate to have the support of the Centennial Auditorium and the steady leadership of retired band teacher Janie Fries. Her organization keeps everything running smoothly, and we are very grateful.

We were delighted to welcome Lynette Sawatsky from Saskatoon for piano and organ

classes. As an accomplished pianist and published composer, she brought extraordinary musicianship and encouragement. Several students even performed her compositions. Lynette fostered a spirit of community - having students bow together, hold hands, and support one another - a beautiful reminder that musical paths often intersect in meaningful ways. This year also marked a historic moment: our first organ entry in more than 50 years. Camron Deans, who has been studying the Casavant pipe organ at Zion United Church, performed at our Sunday concert. Singing O Canada with the full, resonant sound of those pipes was truly unforgettable. Camron also shared his knowledge with the audience, and many commented online about how much they learned. Very few people in Moose Jaw ever get the chance to play this magnificent instrument, so hearing it in our festival was a privilege.

For strings and guitar, we welcomed Scott McKnight from Saskatoon. Although we have not had a dedicated string adjudicator for nine years, we hoped this would encourage more entries. While numbers remained small at twelve, we were grateful for the students who participated and for Scott's expertise and support.

Overall, entries grew again this year — 415 in total, an increase of 100 over last year. We had 12 Canada West entries, and 30 students qualified for Provincial Finals. This growth is encouraging and reflects the hard work of teachers, families, and performers.

Our festival continues to operate with a very small, extremely dedicated committee of just eight people. Organizing such a large event takes countless hours, and we are deeply appreciative of everyone's commitment. Our online 50/50 and raffle fundraisers made a small but welcome profit, despite licensing delays shortening our timeline. We plan to run both of these again for our 2026 festival.



One of the elements adjudicators our consistently praise is Scholarship our Competition. This year, eleven major scholarships were awarded across multiple disciplines. The eleven students recommended to compete are already winners in their categories, and the evening always brings excitement and celebration. While adjudicators deliberate, everyone enjoys a lovely downstairs luncheon before returning for the big announcements. It remains one of the most enjoyable evenings of the festival — for both performers and adjudicators.

In total, we awarded nearly \$9000 in scholarships — an achievement made possible through the generosity of our donors.

This year we welcomed several new patrons, and we are incredibly thankful. Entry fees alone cannot cover festival costs, yet without entries, we would not have a festival at all. We strive to keep fees reasonable while continuing to rely on the tremendous support of our community. We look forward to launching a larger donor campaign in the fall and building even more excitement around the festival.

The 2025 Moose Jaw Music Festival was filled with talent, growth, connection, and celebration. We are proud of every student who shared their music with us and grateful to everyone who helped make this year such a success.



Moosomin & District Music Festival March 24 to 27, 2025

The Moosomin & District Music Festival was held March 24 to 27. Both adjudicators received a fruit basket to welcome them to our festival. There were 147 entries this year, down from the previous year. These students were taught by sixteen teachers and represented five communities.

The piano section was held at the Baptist Church on March 24 & 25 with Sandra Poole as Festival Chairperson. There were 92 entries, including four duets and four six & under participants. Six & under participants received medals in lieu of a mark. Audience attendance was up from the previous year. We welcomed Adjudicator Janis Smith back to the festival for the 4th time in 25 years. She did well in instructing the students on how to play different styles in the different time periods in piano literature.

Vocal, spoken word and music theatre was held March 26 & 27 at Bethel United Church with Kendra Parrish as Festival Chairperson. Entries were: vocal – 15, musical theatre – 19 (including a children's chorus), and spoken word - 21 (including 6 elementary classrooms). We welcomed Anastasia Winterhalt to adjudicate for her first time. Anastasia took the time for mini vocal workshops for our vocal students. This helped to relax the students for their next performances. We would like to extend our sincere thanks and appreciation to both adjudicators for the encouragement and advice they provided to our participants.

The Awards Concert was held on Sunday, March 30 at Bethel United Church. Kendra Parrish was the emcee for the afternoon award concert. Students advancing to Provincials were: piano - **Anna Lynnes**; voice and musical theatre - **Olivia Brooks**, and spoken word was **Benjamin Fransen**. We wish them all a wonderful experience.

Outlook & District Music Festival March 31 to April 4, 2025

The Outlook & District Festival of Music was held March 31-April 4, with the Festival Finale taking place on April 6 at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Outlook. 2025 proved to be one of the most diverse years of the festival yet, with performers well into their eighties and as young as seven taking to the stage. After a long hiatus from the festival, we saw the return of the Outlook High School Bands (Grades 6-10), along with a first-time appearance of the jazz band from our other local high school, Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute (LCBI). Choral speech and singing groups (including 10 entries in the games classes) from singing Elementary School, Dinsmore Composite School, LCBI Concert Choir, LCBI Chamber Choir, LCBI Bel Canto Choir and the Outlook Men's Chorus, along with performances in piano, vocal, musical theatre, handbells, spoken word (poetry, prose and public speaking including original works), string woodwinds made for one of the most wellrounded festivals our community has seen post pandemic.



We were fortunate to have two extremely accomplished adjudicators in our midst this year. Deborah Buck presided over piano, choirs, choral speech, choral singing, spoken word, voice and musical theater, strings and Canada West Musical Theatre performances. Adjudicator Stacey Mortenson-Spokes joined us on April 3 to preside over the Outlook High School Band performances, the LCBI Jazz Band, the LCBI Handbell Choir, flute and saxophone solos. Both adjudicators provided invaluable advice and critique to performers, along with an abundance of encouragement and positive commentary on the scope of talent in our small community. We look forward to our artists using the lessons learned from Deborah and Stacey to take future performances to the next level.

We had a few unique aspects to the festival this year. One of the most popular performances was given by a resident of Outlook's Long Term Care Home, Keith Johnson. Keith's rousing rendition of the cowboy poem Bet at the Bar was an absolute inspiration to all present. Adjudicator Deborah Buck noted that our voices usually lose power as we age, but that Keith's performance was a wonderful exception to that notion. At 81 years old, he gave all the performers something to aspire to. Also new to this year's festival was the donation of a beautiful handmade inverted treble clef quilt to be raffled off. The quilt was made and donated by our recording secretary, Cathy McPhail. Raffle tickets were sold during the week of performances at all venues, and the draw was made on April 6 at the conclusion of the Festival Finale. Proceeds will go towards the scholarship fund.

We have the utmost gratitude to the volunteers who make the festival possible. Over 300 hours of time were invested by committee members and community members to plan and execute the 2025 season. The commitment of music teachers to festival performances cannot be underestimated. 20 teachers entered their

students this year. We had a total of 211 entries, and the number of participants in festival classes was 450. This includes children, adults, groups such as duets, trios, choirs, choral speaking classes, bands, handbell choir and school classes. We had a total of 1563 people attend the 14 sessions of festival (including the Finale), increasing our audience numbers from 2024 by over 500 people.

61 scholarships were awarded to participants, at a total value of just over \$3500. These scholarships are made possible by the generous donations of community businesses, individuals, churches and organizations. This support encourages our young people to continue their musical and performing arts journeys and fosters the cultural enrichment of our community.

We extended congratulations and wished the best of luck to our participants who qualified for provincial competition: LCBI Concert Choir, Isabella Theoret, Kisha Kamanzi and Abby Calvin.

Our festival committee members are Cathy McPhail, Krystal LeBlanc, Leslie Hicks, Conny Behenna, Kristy Ledene-Johnson, Melissa Theoret, Meagan Anthony and Amber Turton. This was the 43rd year for the Outlook and District Festival of Music, and if this year is any indication, our community can be assured that we will be celebrating the arts for many years to come

Potashville Music Festival (Langenburg) March 17 to 19, 2025

The 55th Annual Potashville Music Festival was held in Langenburg this year from March 17-19. We were pleased to have 109 entries from the communities of Langenburg, Esterhazy, Churchbridge and surrounding areas in band, choir, piano, voice, spoken word and strings. This has been our highest number of entries

since 2019 and an increase of almost 35 entries from 2024. We have been working to increase our entries since COVID-19 pandemic and this was another positive step in that direction. We were also pleased to have increased the number of full bands participating in our festival. One of the negative impacts, though, was that it reduced the amount of time our adjudicator had to spend with each group as we needed to work around bus and school schedules. This has led us to some discussion on how we can improve our band adjudications in the future.

They were both very knowledgeable in their respective areas of expertise and most importantly, were very encouraging and positive with our participants. We are very proud and excited that so many provincial recommendations came out of our festival! Liné continued on to Canada West representing PSMF in classical voice and speech, and Eliana represented PSMF in piano.

The committee was happy to see the schools from all three communities participate with many entries even up to the high school level. We appreciated having a strings adjudicator for instrumental as our students are primarily cello and guitar. The adjudicator was able to pass on helpful tips to the students.

Our festival had revenue of \$11,859.53 and expenses of \$10,714.79 for a profit of \$1.144.74. We are expecting a grant from Luseland Rec Board for \$300. We have agreed to pay partial registration fees totalling \$375.00 for Line Linde and Eliana Bakanec for their Canada West entries.

Prince Albert Music Festival March 3 to 21, 2025

The Prince Albert Music Festival was one to go down in our history books. We faced a challenging reality of not having a Festival Coordinator in place. Our efforts to find a new coordinator had initially resulted in a promising board member to take the position, but due to a work conflict, our potential festival coordinator was unable to take on the position. As a board, we decided that for this festival year, we would try to split up the responsibilities among the board. This had varying success. A major challenge came when our advertising coordinator ended up needing to step down, due to some personal challenges that prevented her from being an active board member, and of course the realities of board members having their regular work and personal responsibilities, regular festival committee responsibilities, with the new responsibilities on top...made for some seriously challenging times. However, thanks to team work and other board members stepping in to help one another, both in the festival preparation and in the carrying out of the festival, we were able to host and run a successful festival for the youth in Prince Albert.

Our committee for the 2025 festival year included Julie Abbs, Eric Bews, Colleen Bowen, Lauren Depadua, Donna Kreiser, Karen Langlois, Lauren Lohneis, Charlene Tebbutt and Jordana Thiessen. Jordana Thiessen was the Prince Albert Music Festival Association representative at the SMFA AGM.

Our total number of registrants was 1,204, in 258 entries. We had participants in each of the following disciplines: piano, voice (including solos, duets and trios), choir, musical theatre, instrumental and band. Piano was our first discipline, with Kathleen Gable adjudicating all levels of piano. Nick Fanner was our second adjudicator, for the instrumental discipline. Our third discipline was all of our vocal categories: voice, choral and musical theatre all adjudicated by Ron de Jager. The final discipline was band adjudicated by Daryl McKinnon.

Our adjudicators awarded 107 scholarships, totaling \$8,200 with the following amounts in each discipline:

Piano: \$2,500 (28 scholarships) Vocal/choir/musical theater: \$2,450 (39 scholarships) Instrumental: \$1,350 (21 scholarships) Band: \$1,900 (19 scholarships)

These donations are possible because of the generous donations of individuals, families and organizations. The Butler Family Foundation never wants an ad in the program, but their generosity is amazing; in fact, our adjudicator wasn't able to award \$200 of the money from The Butler Family Foundation, as we did not have enough competitors! In total, they donated \$1,575.

The Malcom J. Jenkins Family Foundation does an awe-inspiring amount for our community, including our festival, with \$1,000 donated for scholarships.



Of course, we could not continue on with our festival without the ongoing endowment left us from the Kiwanis Club of Prince Albert, whose chapter has folded, but generously made arrangements for us to continue to receive financial support.

The Optimist Club of Prince Albert and so many small businesses and individuals made a wonderful impact on our ability to award scholarships. Several small businesses and some school boards also supported us financially by purchasing ad space within our program.

Our festival did not do much active fundraising this year, due to not having a committee member in that position, so we had a significant loss in patronage donations this year (\$920 in 2024, to \$165 in 2025). We were able to save a significant amount of money by having our program be primarily digitally accessible, using two venues for free of charge, and the MFS subscription was lower. However, other expenses increased, including adjudicator fees, and the cost of accommodations. Total revenue was \$12,423.89 and total expenses were \$13,638.29. We plan to put more effort into finding new patrons in the way of individuals and corporate donors, possibly increasing registration fees, or having a session cost. We will look for ways to decrease expenses, such as lowering our mileage payout to be the SMFA recommendation.

This year we did not have a festival-wide grand concert, and our awards concerts were for individual disciplines, with the exception of bands and instrumentals, which share an awards concert.

We were so privileged to hear from some incredible young musicians, ranging from young beginners, to those graduating high school. Our youngest performer in instrumentals was not even old enough to be in band yet! Her flute had a bend in it, to allow her the ability to reach all of the keys. Although we did not have many senior piano participants, those we did hear from had spectacular

performances that captured the attention of the audience. They were absolutely incredible! We were able to hear from some vocalists who were recommended to go to Provincials as well-absolutely stunning performances.

District winners for choir were Ecole Vickers School Choir; Carlton Comprehensive School Choir; Resonate Choir; Big Noise Choir.

Vocal Soloist district winners were Tori Korczak; Alex Rensberry; Tazana Nilson; Adrianna Kowalski; Sara Veith; Elizabeth Chamberlain; Cohen Cantin; Leigha Dunn.

Instrumental district winners were **Chord Fehr**, on bass clarinet; **Cobain Roos** on trumpet; **Tiana Smith** on guitar.

As always, it is a great honour to be a part of music festival and in helping the young musicians in our community have the opportunity to perform and receive quality adjudications.

In the 2023–24 fiscal year, the Regina Music Festival launched a new marketing and branding campaign, made possible by a grant from the Community Services Recovery Fund. At the heart of the Regina Music Festival is always the performer. We continue to provide opportunities for musicians to learn and grow through public performance and thoughtful, professional adjudication. Our theme, "Growth Through Performance," remains our guiding principle.

Sask Valley Music Festival (Waldheim) March 25 to April 2, 2025

Our annual festival this year took place from March 25 to April 2 at Salem Church Waldheim. This was our first chance to be in Waldheim since 2019 due to Covid cancellation in 2020, video submissions only in 2021 then lack of a Waldheim venue due to storm damage. We had 223 entries, back to our average range since before Covid. The BOGO for first entrants entering 2 classes (an idea we borrowed from other festivals, thank you) attracted some new faces. We plan to continue this practice in 2026.

Adjudicators Wayne Toews, Garry Gable and Jhena Dela Cruz were very encouraging to our participants while also suggesting ways to improve. When we had fewer instrumental entries than we had hoped for, Wayne spent some good teaching time with our one band entry and accommodated our request for a violin workshop to fill his day with us. We were proud to have 30 performances recommended to Provincial competition in Regina. 3 of our 5 Canada West entries represented SK at the Canada West Festival in Saskatoon in July: Mia Gillingham in 17 & under voice, Emma Gillingham in 22 & under spoken word and Stefan Jones in 17 & under spoken word.

Since this was our 85th Anniversary, our Awards Concert on April 4 became a wonderful celebration with special balloons, posters, and cupcakes along with our usual fine performances by a variety of participants, awarding of trophies and scholarships, and draws for participant and audience door prizes. 41 awards totaling \$3660 were made possible by our donors to whom we give much thanks for their generosity. **Emma Gillingham** again won our Vocal Rose Bowl, but we were unable to award our Piano Rose Bowl as none of our competitors performed at a grade 9 level. We



are also grateful to local businesses and individuals who donate to support our expenses each year.

We have a very diligent committee with various skills, some financial, some on computers, some visually artistic, some experienced in teaching and adjudicating so they can advise the rest of us. Our fund raising consists of approaching interested individuals in person or by mail to make donations for awards or our general financial needs. Last year Linda Swab, Sanne Gillingham and Patricia Keefe attended the SMFA annual meeting on Zoom. Others attended the online workshops, taking the place of an in-person conference. We found them informative and helpful. While it was easy not to travel and participate from home, we missed the personal connections one makes and the ideas shared at the usual annual conferences.

Festival 2026 will take place in Rosthern between March 17 and 25.

Saskatoon Music Festival March 18 to 19, March 31 to April 12, and April 28 to May 4, 2025

The 2025 Saskatoon Music Festival was a well-attended and well-executed event! Spanning one and a half months, our programming got started on March 18 with choirs, which wrapped up on March 19. Dianne Gryba (SK) was our wonderful choir adjudicator and saw 10 groups during her two days. At the end of march Mark Ward (MB), Nadine Ghiglione (SK), and Glen Gillis (SK) joined us for our band week. We were very pleased to have 89 bands participate in the week, which was a significant jump from last year when so many had to cancel due to STF job action.

The following week, Marion Abbott (NS) joined us at the Salvation Army Temple for Kiwanis Musical Theatre, which was held from April 6 to 12. We had 271 entries in this discipline, which is exactly the same as in 2024! The Kiwanis Club of Saskatoon sponsors this week of music, covering everything from volunteer assignments to piano tuning to building rental. We can never thank them enough for everything they do for our musical theatre program.

Our general festival was held from April 28 to May 4 at the University of Saskatchewan. Here again our gratitude cannot be overstated. The Department of Music continues to lend us their space at no charge, which allows us to take full advantage of their excellent venues and beautiful grand pianos. We had 7 adjudicators join us this week: Nora Wilson (MB; brass, woodwind, percussion - 87 entries), Chris MacRae (AB; senior voice - 297 entries, three fewer than in 2024), Melissa Wood (SK; junior voice and spoken word - 2 entries in spoken word, decrease from last year), Han Ding (AB; senior piano – 778 registrations in piano, nearly 100 more than in 2024), Laurel Teichroeb (SK; intermediate piano), Cherith Alexander (SK; junior piano), and Mary-Elizabeth Brown (QC; strings/guitar – 180 registrations, slight decrease from 2024).

Our adjudicators worked for a total of 61 days over these two months of festival. Our committee of 16 people put in countless hours of work in the lead up to festival, and our onsite volunteer team put in hundreds more hours during our events. We had a total of 44 volunteers give at least 900 hours of their time – and this number is doubtless too low of an estimate.

This year we were able to award \$24,615 in scholarships to deserving competitors in the festival. These funds come from community groups, businesses, and individuals, and we are grateful for the ongoing support of all of these



donors. A large part of these funds are awarded at our final Kinsmen Awards Competition, which were held on May 4 this year. This is our final competition with senior students from 5 individual disciplines (strings, piano, classical voice, musical theatre, solo instruments) competing for top prizes of \$1,250 and runnerup prizes of \$750 in each discipline. As the name suggests, the top prizes for all disciplines except musical theatre are provided by the Kinsmen Club of Saskatoon, who have been funding these awards for over 50 years. The top prize in musical theatre is supplied by the Kiwanis Club. We continue to send committee members to the SMFA AGM. In 2024, Meaghan Dormuth (President), Karen White (Past President) and Mariel Unger (Coordinator) attended the Zoom meeting. This year we're looking forward to attending the conference and AGM once again! We were thrilled to see many first-time participants at our Saskatoon Music Festival events this year. It's wonderful to see the musical community of Saskatoon continue to grow and we are excited to continue to be part of it.

Here each of our students benefited from positive and constructive comments from the adjudicators.

With the recent change in age divisions we saw the junior division becoming much larger with large attendances. However, our senior division is now much smaller. Our teachers have also voiced their concerns with the syllabus changes and would certainly welcome reverting to the previous divisions, or at least to single age categories. The huge gap in junior piano between youngest and oldest (6-13) speaks for itself.

We send out huge thanks to our many volunteers for their time and effort. Many hours were spent by our TRMF team implementing and presenting a lovely program. Huge thanks to everyone!

Our festival wrapped up on Sunday afternoon with a great attendance at our Awards Concert where we all were encouraged with stellar performances and the presentation of about \$3,000 in awards. We also are pleased to see 11 students advance to Provincial Finals and 3 to the Provincial level of Canada West.

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (SMFA), presented the annual Provincial Finals Competitions and the Provincial Level of Canada West Competition at the University of Regina Conservatory of Performing Arts and Darke Hall from May 29 to June 1, 2025. Adjudicators for the competitions were: **Piano:** Michael Oike, MB; **Voice:** Allison Arends, ON; **Strings/Guitar:** Joan Barrett, AB; **Brass/Woodwind/Percussion:** Darryl Ferguson, MB; **Musical Theatre:** Darnell Thomas, ON; **Spoken Word:** Susan Duska, AB; **Choral:** Dr. Jamie Hillman, ON.

Prizes of nearly \$28,000 were awarded during the weekend's competitions, the most prestigious being the Garth Beckett/Gustin House Senior Piano Scholarship of \$1,500 for the most promising pianist under age 21 performing senior level repertoire, the Sister Geraldine Boyle Memorial Award of \$1,500 for the best overall pianist in the competition for 17 years & under, and the Joanne Messer Senior Vocal Scholarship of \$800 for the best overall vocalist in the competition for 28 years & under. Additional bursaries will be awarded to competitors participating in the Canada West Performing Arts Festival in Saskatoon in July.

Saskatchewan's representation was strong, with 41 solo entries by 39 competitors and 2 choirs participating virtually. A highlight of the event was the final concert held on Saturday afternoon, where all winners were invited to participate.



146 performances were heard in all disciplines from provincial festivals across British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan. Over \$30,000 in prize money was awarded.

Financial Report

The Finance Committee is responsible for financial oversight. This includes: establishing and ensuring the organization is compliant with proper financial systems and controls; regularly evaluating the organization's financial health; and ensuring that the organization is on a financially sustainable path.

The Finance Committee consists of myself, President Dianne Gryba, Past President Jeri Ryba, Second Vice-President and Executive Director Carol Donhauser.

This year the Association has changed its yearend from July 31 to August 31 to help ensure that all income and expenses related to the hosting of Canada West Performing Arts Festival is captured.

The detailed audit can be found following my report. The statement of financial position (Page 72) reports the total assets, liabilities and net assets. The statement of operations (Page 73) reflects the revenue and expenditures from the day to day activities. The statement of changes in net assets Page 74) summarizes the changes during the year for the various categories of net assets. The 2025 column indicates that after recognizing a surplus of \$17,984 in the previous year, less the restricted net assets of \$44,297, adjustments to capital assets and transfers from our Trust account brings our current year deficit to -\$9,580. The notes and schedules added to the end of the financial statements help explain specific items in the statements as well as provide a more comprehensive assessment.

The SMFA Trust investment portfolio is managed by Leander Dueck of Beyond Wealth in Regina. Leander reports that the rate of return during the new fiscal period ending Aug 31 2025 was 11.69%. During the same period, the Canadian Balanced Portfolio Benchmark saw a return of 9.49%. The mandate of the SMFA portfolio continues to be to minimize volatility, while ensuring the majority of the portfolio is invested for growth – currently, the portfolio is heavily diversified, with assets comprising of 22% Canadian Equity, 31% US equity, 16% International Equity, 31% fixed

income and cash. To summarize, the portfolio is approximately 69% invested in the stock market for growth, and 31% invested in fixed income markets (cash and bonds) for stability. The SMFA portfolio has evidently performed very well, given its mandate, as it has outpaced or matched returns of the Canadian Balanced Portfolio Benchmark in the last 1 year (11.69% vs 9.49%), 3 year (9.95% vs 9.98%) and 5 (7.87% vs 6.17) year periods annualized.

SMFA also holds 576 BCE (Bell Canada) shares, which continue to see steady returns with quarterly interest payments accounted for in investment segregated for future expenditures.

SMFA is very dependent on the operational funding from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation, and we are grateful for this support. SaskCulture administers the allocation of lottery funds in the form of annual global grants which are set every three years after an adjudication process reviews a detailed Trust Submission. Last year, SMFA received \$175,000 for our Annual Global Funding Grant.

The SMFA Finance Committee strives to balance efficiencies and seek funding opportunities in order to deliver the programs and services that serve our mission and mandate. Thank you to the SMFA Finance Committee for your work throughout the year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association (the Entity), which comprise the statement of financial position as at August 31, 2025 and the statements of operations, statement of changes in net assets and statement of cash flows for the period of August 1, 2024 to August 31, 2025, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In my opinion, except for the effects, if any, of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as at August 31, 2025 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the period of August 1, 2024 to August 31, 2025 in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many non-profit organizations, Saskatchewan Music Festival Association derives part of its revenue from membership fees, donations and other fundraising activities, the completeness and classification of which are not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly my verification of these transactions was limited to accounting for the amounts recorded in the records of the Association and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to the revenues, statement of operations, assets and net assets.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, 1 exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the



audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is
 sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement
 resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery,
 intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

1. Status and nature of activities

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan. Under present legislation, no income taxes are payable on the reported income of such operations. The purpose of Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is to provide a classical, competitive music festival system of the highest standard at the local, provincial and national levels.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided on a diminishing balance method over the assets' estimated useful lives as follows:

Full amortization is recorded in the year of purchase.

Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting.

Grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are received out of the net proceeds of lottery ticket sales in Saskatchewan. These grants have been recorded as revenue by Saskatchewan Music Festival Association as approved by Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreations. Accordingly, amounts received that relate to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred revenue.

Grant revenue from other sources is recorded as revenue with amounts received that relate to the next fiscal period are shown as deferred revenue.

Unrestricted donations are recognized as revenue in the period received.

Externally restricted donations that have not been expended are shown as deferred revenue.

All other revenue is recognized in the period in which the income is earned.

Financial instruments

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments quoted on an active market, which are measured at fair value at the balance sheet date.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash, investments and accounts receivable. Financial assets measured at fair value are investments quoted on an active market. Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.



2. Summary of significant accounting policies cont'd

Management estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

- \$26,738 5 year, annual interest rate of 4.25%, matures July 2028

7. Deferred revenue

Funding received relating to specific projects has been deferred and will be recognized as revenue in the year the related project or event occurs.

8. Funds held in trust

Per the Association's by-laws in the event that a District Festival Association ceases operation or becomes inactive for a period of two consecutive years or more, all funds of that District Festival Association are to be transferred to the Provincial Association and be held in trust for a period of five years. If the District Festival Association is not reinstated within the five year period then the funds become the funds of the Provincial Association.

9. Interfund transfers

During the year \$16,500 was transferred from the Restricted Net Assets Fund to the Unrestricted Net Assets Fund for the funding of the operations of the Association.

10. Economic dependence

The Saskatchewan Music Festival Association receives significant revenue in grants from Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. As a result, the Association is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

11. Change in fiscal year

During the year the Association made a motion and changed the fiscal year from July 31 to August 31.

12. Financial instruments

Saskatchewan Music Festival Association is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association's exposure and concentrations at August 31, 2025:

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a party may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics that could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions, such that the organization could incur a financial loss. The Association is exposed to credit risk with respect to cash, investments and accounts receivable. The Association manages its credit risk by placing cash and investments with major financial institutions. Credit risk for accounts receivable is managed by the credit quality and diverse debtor base and creating an allowance for bad debts where applicable. There has been no change from credit risk exposure from 2024.



12. Financial instruments (continued)

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association may not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due or not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The Association is exposed to liquidity risk with respect to its investments and accounts payable but manages its liquidity risk by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash. There has been no change from liquidity risk exposure from 2024.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is a type of market risk that refers to the risk that the fair value of financial instruments or future cash flows associated with the instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Association is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to its cash and investments and its effect on interest income. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have a significant effect on cash and investments due to the fact that interest income is not a major percentage of total revenue. There has been no change from interest risk exposure from 2024.

13. Comparative figures

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the current year's financial statement presentation.
